Finish Study

- Wake Transit Plan is a revenue stream for public transportation investment
 - Voters approved funding package in 2016
 - Started collecting taxes and fees in April 2017
 - Wake Transit Plan started funding new transit service in August 2017
- Wake Transit Plan investments are organized around four big moves:

Connect All Wake County Communities





- Wake Transit Plan is updated every four years
 - Retains the Four Big Move
 Structure
 - Establishes priorities and investment direction for 10-year period
 - Built on community and stakeholder input
 - Includes financial and technical data about performance and outcomes





Wake Transit Plan 2016-2027

Developed with significant engagement and participation

- Phase 1 Interactions = 15,000+
 - Advisory Committee meetings, community meetings, online videos, social media and surveys
- Phase 2 Interactions = 2,000+
 - Statistically valid surveys and polls, focus groups and outreach events

Achieve Four Big Moves Built with Strategies and Recommendations

- Commuter Rail: Durham and Garner
- Bus Rapid Transit: North, South, East, West
- Community Funding Areas Program
- Connections from suburbs to Raleigh/Cary
- Longer hours and more days of bus service
- More frequent bus service
- More regional bus service













Wake Transit Plan 2021-2030

- Coordinate schedule of updates to Wake Transit Plan with MTP Schedule
- Confirm costs and cost-curves of major and future investments
- Continued focus on stakeholder and community input
 - In-person Interactions = 4,200+
 - Pop-ups, public meetings, presentations and community events
 - Online and Survey Participation = 7,800+
 - Completed surveys, visits to the website and

Updates to Strategies and Recommendations

- Advance Commuter Rail even with higher costs and potentially lower federal participation
- Advance Bus Rapid Transit: North, South, East, West
 - Potential expansion to Research Triangle Park
- Potential of Commuter Rail and Bus Rapid Transit expansions to Johnston County (Clayton)
- Continued investments in additional routes, increased service spans and frequency, and in the Community Funding Area Program




 Wake Transit Plan is ambitious and is taking on several major projects at the same time

Changing Transit Demand in a Growing Region





- Wake Transit Plan revenues have been consistently strong
 - Nearly \$750 million raised to date (2017 2023)
- Expected to raise another \$700
 million to \$1 billion over next ten
 years (2026 2035)

What are your transit priorities for the next ten years?






What is the State of the Plan?

\$200 million invested since 2017.

Funds invested in more bus service, new buses, Bus Rapid Transit, more stops and stations, and local funding programs.

Also invested in staff, leadership and financial management.






Scheduled to spend \$350 million in next 2-3 years.



Strengths and Success: Leveraging Federal Funds


Transit agencies and municipalities have earned nearly \$182 million in federal funds

- Build park and ride




Connect Regionally





Commuter Rail

- Connect Durham, RTP, Cary, Raleigh, and Garner.
- Completed feasibility studies help better understand costs and implementation.
- Findings suggest higher costs, less federal funding, and longer time to finish.




Bus Rapid Transit

- Advancing over 20 miles of corridor service that begins/ends in Raleigh
 - New Bern Corridor (East) to WakeMed Campus and New Hope Road
 - Southern Corridor to Garner
 - Western Corridor to Cary
 - Northern Corridor along Capital
- Costs and timelines are extending, but projects are advancing with federal funds.
- Potential extensions to Johnston County and Research Triangle Park



Connect all Wake County Communities





New/Expanded Bus Service completed in 2020

- Garner, Fuquay-Varina, Knightdale, Rolesville, Wake Forest, Wendell, and Zebulon have (or had) connections to Raleigh.
- Apex, Holly Springs, and Morrisville have connections to Cary.
- Post-COVID low ridership is leading to new service ideas (microtransit).



Established Community Funding Area Program

- 11 communities have received funding.
- Major Questions we're asking:
 - How do we create a path for projects to "graduate" to Wake Transit Plan?
 - How do we support local autonomy and create a seamless rider experience?



Community Funding Area Program

Program Successes

- Three Operating Projects
 - Wake Forest Circulator 2nd Bus added through CFAP
 - Morrisville Smart Shuttle App-based on-demand microtransit service started in 2021; over 11,000 riders in 2022
 - GoApex Route 1 New local bus route serving the Town of Apex, connecting various destinations throughout Town
- Capital and Planning Projects
- Morrisville, Apex, Knightdale, Garner, Fuquay-Varina, RTP, Wendell, Zebulon

Program Management Plan Update

- Community Funding Area Program Management Plan is being updated
 - Provide clarity on application eligibility, scoring, funding
 - Update will be complete for FY 2026 CFAP Funding Cycle

Advancing Bus Rapid Transit

Investments in frequent service

- 51.5 miles of frequent transit service (2023)
- +12 miles in 2024

Added evening and weekend service

Purchased more buses

80% of new buses are cleaner fuel vehicles

Invested in maintenance facilities to accommodate larger and clean fuel fleet



Enhance Access to Transit







- Improvements to over 500 bus stops, park and rides, and enhanced transit centers
- Raleigh Union Station Bus Facility
- Downtown Cary Multimodal Center
- Regional Transit Center




Top Three Transit Priorities:

Revisions from Draft Work Plan

Operations Budget

- Draft Work Plan: \$45,591,851
- Recommended Work Plan: \$49,008,005
 - Key Changes: GoTriangle Bus Route Improvements, Addition of GoWake Access SmartRide NE Microtransit service (funded through CFAP)

Capital Budget

- Draft Work Plan: \$196,780,083
- Recommended Work Plan: \$203,147,110
 - Key Changes: Additional funding for Vehicle Acquisition, Addition of BRT Concept of Operations Study, Split of Northern Corridor BRT into two corridors: Midtown and Triangle Town Center

Commuter Rail Placeholder Scenario

Commuter Rail Process and Assumptions: As of the publication of the Recommended FY 2025 Wake Transit Work Plan, the technical analysis for the Greater Triangle Commuter Rail (GTCR) Phase 2 Feasibility Study had concluded. This study reported significantly higher costs and larger technical challenges associated with completing the full commuter rail corridor than anticipated and programmed in previous Adopted Wake Transit Work Plans. The Study also noted challenges, based on expected costs and anticipated ridership, with the 50% federal match assumption. While the Study recommended that no matching federal grants be programed for the commuter rail project, there is potential for federal funding in subsequent phases of the project or a different regional rail project. To reflect that no decision has been made on how (or if) the project should move forward, and that decision-makers wished to explore potential options for implementation, the FY 2025 Wake Transit Work Plan includes capital and operating "place-holder scenarios" for rail funding.

Financials included in the FY25 Recommended Work Plan include the similar metrics included in the Adopted FY24 Wake Transit Work Plan. The Greater Triangle Commuter Rail (GTCR) Phase 2 Feasibility Study introduced the potential need for a phased approach for implementing the full ~38 miles from West Durham to Garner. The Study presented the following potential segments with the following track length and costs. This assumption is the current basis of the "place-holder scenario":

- Western (End Points: West Durham to RTP | Miles: ~12 | Capital Cost: \$1.6B);
- Central (End Points: Ellis Road or RTP to Raleigh Union Station | Miles: ~20 | Capital Cost: \$800M -\$1B); and
- Eastern (End Points: Raleigh Union Station to Auburn Station in Garner | Miles: ~10 | Capital Cost: \$600 - \$700M)

The FY 2025 Wake Transit Work Plan commuter rail "place-holder scenario" allocates funding for two segments, anticipating a build out of approximately 80% of the corridor by 2037 at a total cost of \$2.1B, \$1.4B of which is assumed to be the Wake County Share of the project. The operating regional rail "place-holder scenario" allocates \$16.1 million for the Wake County share of the first full year of annual operations in FY 2033. It is expected that the capital and operating "place-holder scenarios" will be updated in the Wake Transit Financial Model after key decisions are made.

Operating Budget Overview

Operating Highlights

The Draft FY25 Work Plan allocates \$49 million to the Wake Operating Budget. \$38.6 million of that would be designated for the continuation of services that were funded in previous years. New projects include:

- Service Improvements to the following Raleigh routes:
 - Avent Ferry Route 11
 - Glascock Route 3
 - Method Road Route 12
 - Carolina Pines Route 7L
 - Replace Raleigh Route 401X with the Rolesville Microtransit Connector
 - Funding for implementation of a Low Income Fare Pass Program for GoTriangle and Raleigh



Operating Highlights

- Add a new East Cary Route 11 (1/2 Year Operation)
- Convert Apex-Cary Express Route from ACX to Route 12 (1/2 Year Operation)
- Provide funds to GoWake Access to initiate a Youth Pass Program for the SmartRide NE service
- Improvements to GoTriangle Routes 305 and 300
- Continue Wake Transit Community Funding Area Program contributions to Apex Route 1, Morrisville's Smart Shuttle, and the Wake Forest Circulator
- Allocate CFAP funds to continue GoWake Access SmartRide NE Microtransit service serving Wendell, Knightdale, Zebulon and Wake County



Capital Budget Overview

Capital Highlights

The Draft FY25 Work Plan allocates \$203.1 million to the Wake Capital Budget. \$85.9 million of the total comes from federal funding allocated for the Wake BRT: Southern Corridor, and up to \$10 million may be allocated from the Wake Capital Fund balance. Capital funds will be used to support:

- Construction phase of the new shared GoRaleigh Access and GoWake Access paratransit operations and maintenance facility
- Wake County's share of GoTriangle's expansion of the bus operations and maintenance facility
- Phase II (land acquisition, design and construction) of the new Regional Transit Center
- Improvements to GoTriangle's park-and-ride facilities



Capital Highlights

- Design and construction of new bus stops / improvement of amenities and access to existing stops
- Maintenance at GoRaleigh's transit facilities including bus stops, park-and-rides, stations and centers
- Repowering buses & purchasing paratransit vehicles and/or buses to support transit expansion & replacement
- Funding to finalize design and begin Right-of-Way and construction activities for the Wake BRT:
 Southern Corridor
- Funding to complete the Wake Transit Plan Update
- Funding for a BRT Concept of Operations Study for the Western and Southern BRT Extensions



Next Steps on Rail



Triangle Strategic Rail Infrastructure Investments Study (Joint MPO Study)

- Conduct a regional visioning discussion for desired future passenger rail services and validate the study geography
- Assess funded and non-funded projects to identify needed/desired rail infrastructure projects
- Develop a logical project implementation strategy (critical path projects, funding eligibility, project sponsors, etc.)
- Recommend a decision-making framework to advance the region's strategic rail program
- Identify and recommend additional planning studies necessary to refine recommendations or advance projects
- Develop mapping/visualization to explain recommended implementation strategy
