Defining "Advocacy"

- Sharing information with our County team, legislators and other stakeholders
- Leveraging partnerships
 - NCACC
 - Other counties and municipalities
 - Professional groups, interest groups
- Lobbying

Wake's Advocacy Model

Manager's Office Role

- "Air traffic control"
- Identify legislation needing attention
- Coordinate staff analysis
- Share information and advise Board on policy
- Facilitate Board prioritysetting

Lobbyist Role

- Advocate to legislators and legislative staff
- Identify legislation needing attention
- Advise Board on political and legislative matters
- Liaison to State, Federal agencies

Three Prong Approach to Legislative Priorities

General Guidance

- Policy guidance to CMO and contracted lobbyists to:
- reflect ongoing Board interests, and
- allow discretion to react quickly to legislative actions

Top Three Asks

 To speak with a single, clear voice, Board will set a short list of top priorities

- Repeal provision requiring physical signage at lien properties
- Not helpful or safe




The Biennium Cycle

Current Environment

- State legislatures following national lead
 - Lowering tax rates
 - Spending reductions
 - Eliminating selected programs
- State House and Senate have significant disagreements
- And...

...Legislature Continues to Take Critical View of Local Government Roles

- Development Regulation
- Housing shortage
- Property taxes
- Other issues







Themes and Bills

Development Regulation

S205 - the "Homebuilders bill"

- Mandated densities, review timelines, penalties for local governments, easier to sue localities
- Significant local government opposition
- Currently in House committees
- Opinion Statewide focus on this bill allowed other adverse legislation to advance uncontested

Development Regulation

H173 - Wake County ETJ

- Prohibits any municipal ETJ extension through 2028
- We assessed low impact, took no position
- Enacted law

H376 - Well and Septic Regulations

- Impairs local ability to regulate new wells, water quality
- Uniquely harmful for Wake radionuclides
- Passed House

Development Regulation

S587 - Repeal the "No Downzoning" law

- Bill to fix the "no downzoning" law passed with Helene relief in December 2024
- Downzoning now prohibited, impairing local control over development and public health
- Passed Senate

Taxes and Finance

S349 - Property Tax Modifications

- Marcus has contributed to working group
- Raises thresholds for Homestead and Circuit Breaker programs,
- Under circuit breaker, taxes cancelled instead of deferred
- BOC Opportunity List
- Would add 16,000 to 20,000 households to tax relief
- Estimated revenue loss of \$13M to \$17M
- Introduced, not advanced

Taxes and Finance

H659 – Local Government Transparency

- Requires localities to publish all invoices
- In House committees

H593 - Annual Audits

- New regulatory requirements for accounting firms working with local governments
- Introduced, not advanced

State Budget Appropriations

- ???
- Potential "re-direction" of local sales tax for SHP 800 mhz (VIPER)
- Chambers have significant disagreements
- Now, Legislature may consider how to address Congress' shifting of Medicaid and SNAP costs and additional administrative requirements
- Appropriations bills sometimes contain surprise policy provisions

Other Policy Bills

H171 - DEI Bill

- Prohibits local governments from using any public funds for DEI initiatives
- Opponents argue that prohibited activities not clearly defined
- Unclear if this supersedes existing nondiscrimination laws?
- Easier to sue local governments; penalties for officials
- If it becomes law, may prompt years of lawsuits
- Passed Legislature, Vetoed by Governor, awaiting override vote

Other Policy Bills

H612 – Foster Care

- New law brings DSS reporting requirements
- Lots of process changes
- No new resources

H781 - Homeless Encampments

- Authorizes designated camp sites
- May encourage litigation
- Passed House

H219 - EMS franchises

- Impair counties' abilities to regulate EMS franchises
- In House committees

S153 – Immigration bill

- Prohibits services to noncitizens
- Could present operational challenges, depending on implementation
- Vetoed by Governor

What's Next

Unfinished Business

State Budget

- Chambers must work together to resolve budget
- Must decide to what extent State will "make up" for federal SNAP & Medicaid cost shifting and new requirements
- 8-digit problem

Other bills?

- Homebuilders bill?
- Repeal the "No downzoning" law?
- Something new?
- Legislative tactics

Veto Overrides

- Governor has vetoed over a dozen bills
- Legislature has overridden eight

Housing Affordability

- Advocate for new State policy and programs
- Changes to existing programs

Foster Care

- Clarify roles and responsibilities for placement of youth with acute needs
- State supported facilities
- Kinship care supports
- Supports for foster families

SNAP and Medicaid

- Continue State participation in SNAP and Medicaid Expansion
- Cover unfunded mandates from HR1
- Use State funds to cover SNAP admin and benefit cost shares

1. General Guidance

Staff and lobbyist assume this covers the following:

- Oppose bills that would shrink tax base or present financial challenges
- Oppose bills that reduce the Board's options to regulate growth and development
- Sustain or increase funding for public schools and community colleges
- Sustain or increase funding for State-funded services in HHS and other departments

2. Top Three Asks

- Propose setting a Top 3 list for State asks, and a Top 3 list for Federal asks
- There is one bucket of political "capital" for Wake County
- Prioritizing...
 - Concentrates the Board's limited "capital" on highest needs
 - Gives our lobbyists a clear message to deliver
 - Allows CMO and lobbyist to reserve capacity for unforeseen needs
 - Easier for you and staff to explain
- Staff recommend focusing on County government needs

3. Opportunity List

- Approve a list of policy issues that gives CMO and lobbyists discretion to act quickly when opportunity knocks.
- Capture policy items that did not make Top 3
- No advocacy is guaranteed, depends on what issues come up next year
- Board doesn't need to specify the outcome desired

Opportunity List - State

Advocacy work not guaranteed, but CMO staff have discretion to pursue if opportunity

- Support for public schools
 - Instructional Assistants
 - Teaching Fellows Program
 - Social and emotional resources
 - Universal meals
- Property tax relief
- Continuing Medicaid coverage for incarcerated individuals

- More funding for:
 - Veterans services
 - Orphan roads
 - Broadband access and affordability, digital literacy
 - JCPC programs
 - Clerks of Court
 - SmartStart / Childcare programs

Recommended Top 3 - Federal

Earmark Requests

- Criteria-based requests
- Adapt to new 2025 congressional map

Housing Affordability

- Preserve block grants
- Expand LIHTC
- Permanently fund pilot programs

EMS Medication and Supply Challenges

- National shortage of EMS medications
- Need federal leadership to address market failures

Opportunity List - Federal

Advocacy work not guaranteed, but CMO staff have discretion to pursue if opportunity

- Policy and programs that complement Wake Transit plans
- Fire sprinkler incentives
- "Benefits cliffs"
- Admin and reporting relief
- Nationwide public health data tracking
- Well and septic regulation

- Water source long-term planning
- Early childhood education
- WIOA flexibility and upward mobility
- Veterans services
- Broadband access and affordability, digital literacy
- Rights for persons with disabilities
