On the night of March 16, 2017, a fire broke out at The Metropolitan, a five-story apartment building on Jones Street that was under construction in downtown Raleigh. The massive blaze burned through the complex quickly and then began to spread to other nearby buildings. Firefighters rushed to the scene of what had become a five-alarm fire. It took three hours for firefighters to control the fire.

Chairman Hutchinson said that numerous local departments and agencies dutifully assisted with the skillful response to this fire. They include: City of Raleigh Fire Department, City of Raleigh Police Department, City of Raleigh Transportation Department, City of Raleigh Development Services, Cary Fire Department, Garner Fire Department, Garner Fire Department, Rolesville Fire Department, Swift Creek Fire Department, Wake Forest Fire Department, Wendell Fire Department, Wake County Emergency Medical Services, and Wake County Fire Services.

Chairman Hutchinson requested that all the first responders come forward that responded to the five-alarm fire in Raleigh a month ago. Chairman Hutchinson commended the firefighters for their heroism.

The board recognized the first responders.

Mr. Ed Morris, Chair, Wake County Historic Preservation Commission, said that National Historic Preservation Month is an annual nationwide observance celebrating the nation's diverse and irreplaceable heritage. He said it is sponsored nationwide by the National Trust for Historic Preservation and co-sponsored in Wake County by the Wake County Historic Preservation Commission (WCHPC) and Capital Area Preservation, Inc. (CAP) He said the Historic Preservation Commission

has twelve citizens. He said for the third year in a row, the commission is the recipient of a federal Historic Preservation Fund Grant awarded by the State Historic Preservation office through the National Parks Services Certified Local Government Program. He said the grant serves the purpose of a survey update of Urban Service Areas for the Towns of Apex, Fuquay-Varina, Holly Springs, and the Falls Lake Water Supply Watershed in Northwestern Wake County. He said that Wake County has 75 landmarks in Wake County. He introduced Mr. Gary Roth, CEO, Capital Area Preservation, and Mr. Jeremy Brantham, Office Assistant, Capital Area Preservation.

Mr. Roth thanked the Board of Commissioners for supporting Historic Preservation in Wake County. He invited the board to attend an upcoming event on Sunday, April 30, 2017 from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. at the Dr. Nathan Blalock House. He said plaques will be given to the owners of newly designated Local Historic Landmarks and the National Historic Preservation Month in Wake County Proclamation will be presented.

Mr. Tom Covington, Wake County Facilities, Design, and Construction

Project Manager, said this project is the first orphaned roads project in this status. He said the subdivision is located in Southern Wake County off US-401 and Banks Road.

Mr. Covington said that on April 6, 2015, the Wake County Board of Commissioners adopted a Water, Sewer and Orphaned Roads Financial Policy. This policy was adopted to help guide the county in determining when to consider public financing of community infrastructure projects. He said on January 4, 2016, staff presented the petitions and the request from property owners to the Wake County Board of Commissioners. The board in accordance with NCGS 153-A-190. adopted a Preliminary Assessment Resolution that describes the nature and location of the project, basis for making the assessment, and the terms and conditions for financing the project. On February 4, 2016, the board held a public hearing and approved the Final Assessment Resolution which allowed the county to move forward with design, bidding, construction, and assessment of the Banks Pointe Subdivision road repairs, in accordance with North Carolina General Statutes Article 9 of Chapter 153A. On February 8, 2017, bid proposals were received from three general contractors in accordance with the NC General Statutes.

He shared a map of the 89 lots and a map of the repairs.

Mr. Covington said there will be more similar projects coming in the future.

Commissioner Burns asked if there were any additions to curb and gutter and whether there were repairs to the culvert only. Mr. Covington said the Department of Transportation will prepare a punch list that is good for 60 days that outlines the minimal standards. He said no additional funds are needed for the project and the Department of Transportation will take responsibility for the upkeep of the roads.

Vice-Chair Calabria said this has been an ongoing issue and will allow for residents to pay over time for repairs. He commended Commissioner Burns for addressing this issue on the Growth, Land Use, and Environment Committee.

Chairman Hutchinson said it is a win win for Wake County citizens and the neighborhoods that can provide this type of funding.

Commissioner Portman said Wake County is standing in the gap to assist the neighborhood. He asked if there was a clear notation to residents that there are private roads and private water and sewer systems.

Mr. Scott Warren, County Attorney, said that Wake County does not get involved in these type matters and covenants typically govern these matters. Mr. Warren said the plat review outlines the responsibility of homeowners including information provided by realtors.

Chairman Hutchinson said Wake County does not take responsibility for the roads and the Department of Transportation will handle this.

Commissioner Burns said the process began with the residents in the neighborhood asking staff to take a lead in assisting with the issue.

Public Comments

Mr. Steve Rao, Mayor Pro Tem, Town of Morrisville, said the town received an award from the National League of Cities. He said the town accepted an east meets west cultural diversity award and was selected from eight applicants for the cities under 50,000 residents. He spoke about a project called the Remarkable Journey about an Indian American community highlighted on PBS. He said the premier will be on August 28th at 7 P.M.

He distributed lapel pins to the Board of Commissioners.

Ms. Ashley Thomas, Founder and Executor, Bridge II Sports, said that the organization has been a long-time partner with the Lake Crabtree Park for adaptive programming. She said that she learned to para-kayak at Lake Crabtree County Park. She said there are accessible pathways at Lake Crabtree. She said Metlife has built an American Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible deck but more are needed. She asked that the Board of Commissioners consider funding for additional decking for a kayaking program.

Commissioner Burns asked how much funding is needed. Ms. Thomas said \$40,000 is needed.

Mr. Hartmann said there would be a staff report in the future about the request.

Other Business

Commissioner West shared the following comments:

"Thank you very much and good afternoon. I want to make a few comments in relation to some things that will help us be more effective as a board. I want to set the record straight that purpose of me speaking today is not to blame or to criticize. As boards there are things I have picked up on, having been here for a while, and having served six consecutive times on the Raleigh City Council, in relation to rules and procedure. How we run our meetings can cause a lack of order and continuity and at times confusion and we want to eliminate that confusion. My aim is to avoid future conflicts and confusion and create a more positive environment so that we can successfully get our work done.

Currently, the boards' rules of procedure apply to our Regular Meetings and not to our monthly Work Session. I would like to share a few observations that I think will aide to our effectiveness as a team and to what I perceive to be a misunderstanding about how we conduct our work session which is the more creative process that we undertake in our work sessions.

Being the Chair of the Wake County Board of Commissioners is not an easy job. It is very difficult and challenging, but also very rewarding. It is important to remember each chair brings a different value system and style to the table just as each elected member of this board brings a perspective to the table as well. There is an issue that affects our process and relationships as it cuts across our regular meetings and work sessions. One of those is the proper recognition of the chair to ensure our meetings go smoothly. Our chair Mr. Hutchinson and I had a good discussion related to this issue, which also presented me some challenges when I served as chair recently. We feel there is a simple solution to this one issue in particular. We followed up with the County

Attorney regarding consistent and standard means of addressing the chair in order to get the floor and to speak. We have good intentions and the gestures, signs and silent means aren't fair to the chair or to members, as they are vague. Rules state that we should recognize the chair and be recognized before speaking. My suggestion is that we include a verbal recognition of the chair in order to get clear direction before our board members. I feel we can reach consensus this way and I hope to work toward that. I have been in local politics and city council for some time in the role of leader and follower for 20 years. I have found it is very important to show respect for the elected chair and leader. It is said that respect is recognition made visible. I think we can try to live that out. As leaders we need to be sensitive to our followers and to ensure our leadership is relational. Also, I believe that leadership is a fair exchange among equals as we work together. It is a two way street with shared responsibilities and a serious matter. I believe we can do extraordinary things when we have trust, engagement that leads to ownership and positive environments that motivate and help us do our job, and the ultimate job of serving the citizens.

Mr. Stephen Covey said "90 percent of the time families are off track but there needs to be courage to get back on track," and I think there is courage on this board. Mr. Bill Bradley said the issues that divide us are self-defeating; differences that bring us together enhance and unite us."




Richard began employment with Wake County Government in June, 1991. He was hired as the Physical Plant cabinetmaker at the General Services Center.



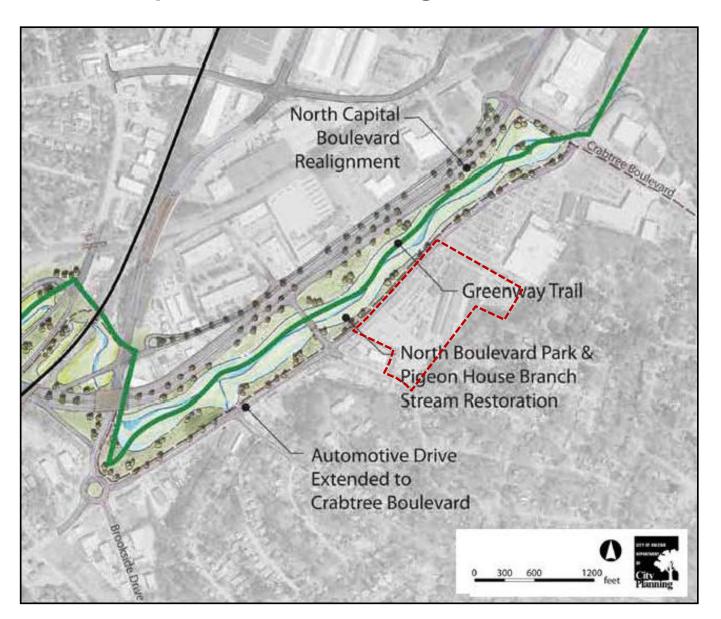

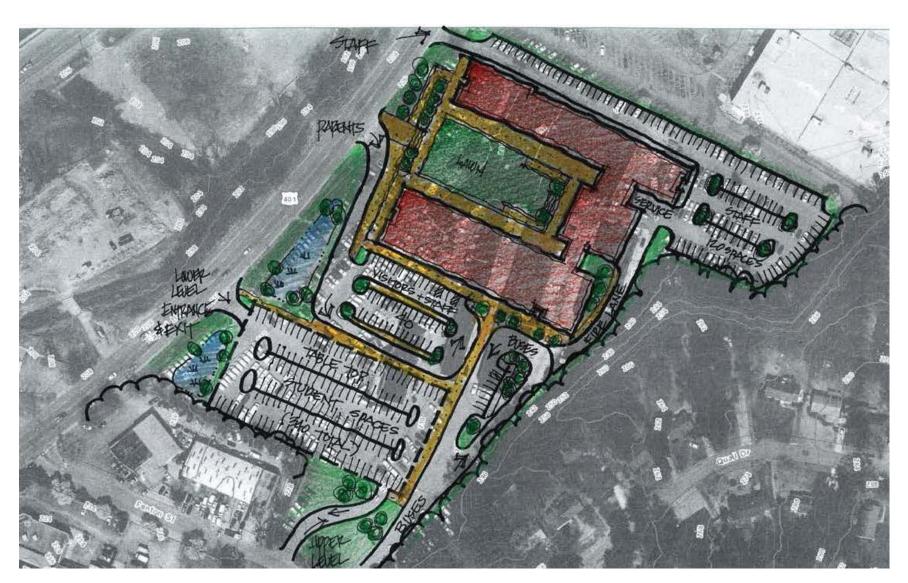
City of Raleigh Capital Blvd. Corridor Study: North Capital Boulevard Realignment and Park



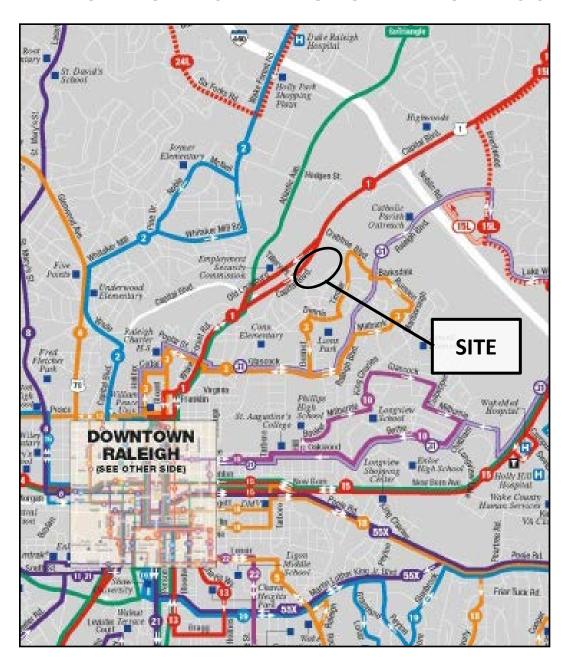
Concept Plan: Adaptive Reuse

FINAL ASSESSMENT RESOLUTION

Banks Pointe Subdivision Road Improvements

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute 153A-205 allows Wake County to finance the cost of improvements to subdivision roads located in the county and outside of a municipality in order to bring those roads up to the standards required for acceptance into the NC Department of Transportation maintained highway system; and

WHEREAS, Wake County shall levy and collect that portion of the costs of improvements to subdivision roads financed by the County by making a special assessment against benefitted property, pursuant to Article 9 of Chapter 153A of the North Carolina General Statutes; and

WHEREAS, on the 6th day of April 2015, the Wake County Board of Commissioners adopted a policy to evaluate and consider making special assessments against benefitted property for all or part of the costs of certain community infrastructure projects, including subdivision roads, for which the County has the authority to make special assessments pursuant to North Carolina General Statute 153A-185; and

WHEREAS, on the 4th day of January 2016, property owners within the Banks Pointe Subdivision petitioned the Wake County Board of Commissioners to make a special assessment against benefitted property for the costs of improvements to the roads within the subdivision (Phases 1, 2 and 3) in order to bring those roads up to the standards required for acceptance into the NC Department of Transportation maintained highway system, and to assess 100% of the cost thereof to the owners of benefitted property by making a special assessment; and

WHEREAS, on the 4th day of January 2016, the Wake County Board of Commissioners adopted a Preliminary Assessment Resolution that describes the nature and location of the project, basis for making the assessment, and the terms and conditions for financing the project; and

WHEREAS, the County finds that the project to improve the Banks Pointe Subdivision roads for acceptance into the NC Department of Transportation maintained highway system is in the public interest in regards to establishing safe public and emergency access within the subdivision as originally intended when the subdivision roads were platted and recorded as public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Wake County Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Wake County hereby intends to undertake the project to be known as the repair and improvement of roads within the Banks Pointe Subdivision Phases 1, 2, and 3 to the standards required for acceptance into the NC Department of Transportation maintained highway system through the special assessment process.
- 2. The specific roads within Banks Pointe Subdivision Phase 1, 2, and 3 that are included in the repair and improvement project include Chelsea Drive, Sorrell Brothers Court, Bankshire Lane, Cotten Road, Banks Stone Drive, Bankscrest Drive, and

Bankswood Drive. The project shall include all work required to repair and improve the roadways to the standards required by the NC Department of Transportation for acceptance into their maintained highway system.


- 2. Banks Pointe Subdivision, built in three phases between 2004 and 2005, consists of 89 lots that front the aforementioned roads. The subdivision roads were designed, platted and recorded by the developer as public roads but the developer failed to turn the roads over to the NC Department of Transportation for maintenance.
- 3. 76.4% of the property owners within Banks Pointe Subdivision Phases 1, 2, and 3 have signed and submitted a petition requesting the improvements representing 78.5% of the lineal frontage of the lands abutting all the roads. This exceeds the minimum requirement of 75% as required by NC General Statute 153A-205.
- 4. The special assessment will be based on the number of lots served (89) at an equal rate per lot as provided for in Article 9 of Chapter 153A of the North Carolina General Statutes.
- 5. That 100% of the project cost shall be assessed to each lot, at an equal rate per lot.
- 6. No special assessments shall be held in abeyance.

Adopted this 1st day of February, 2016.


7. Special assessments shall be paid within 30 days of public notice of the assessment roll to avoid interest charges. Otherwise the special assessment may be paid in annual installments for a period up to 10 years at a fixed interest rate up to 3.5%.

THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that this project be undertaken in accordance with North Carolina General Statutes Article 9 of Chapter 153A *Special Assessments*.




Banks Pointe Area Map





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
