17. Public Hearing and Consideration of Business Development Grant Agreement for Infosys

Mr. Chris Dillon, Wake County Assistant County Manager, said that the request for the Business Development Grant is a result of Wake County staff, Wake County Economic Development, and the legislative delegation.

He said Infosys qualifies for a grant consistent with the state match provision of the Wake County Business Development Grant Policy. In order to receive grant payment from the County, Infosys must meet performance criteria as outlined in the County's agreement. These performance criteria include:

- 1. New investment (> \$5 million)
- 2. New job creation (at least 25 new jobs with average wages of 100% of Wake County's average wage)

3. Payment of property taxes

Chairman Hutchinson opened the public hearing. No one came forward. Chairman Hutchinson closed the public hearing.

Mr. Dillon said that staff recommends the approval of the Business Development Grant.

Commissioner Burns asked for clarification of the amount and terms of the grant. Mr. Dillon said that there will be an announcement next week about Infosys location. He said the total Wake County grant amount will be under \$93,000. He said the state grant is \$22.4 Million for the location of 2,000 jobs in Wake County.

Commissioner Burns confirmed that the grant is contingent on the payment of taxes to the county and jobs secured. Mr. Dillon agreed.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Calabria, that the Board of Commissioners hold a public hearing and approve a Business Development Grant Agreement with Infosys, subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Denise Foreman, Wake County Assistant County Manager, shared information about a Business Development Grant with ABC Phones of North Carolina, Inc.. Ms. Foreman shared the following information about the grant.

A Wireless must meet performance criteria as outlined in the County's agreement. These performance criteria include:

- 1 New investment (> \$5 million)
- New job creation (> 225 new jobs with average wages of \$84,330 or greater)
- 3. Payment of property taxes

A Wireless was awarded a JDIG Grant from the State of North Carolina up to \$3.3 million in value and an incentive from the City of Raleigh. She said

the grant is 35 percent reimbursement over a five year period.

Ms. Foreman said that staff recommends approval of the grant.

Chairman Hutchinson opened the public hearing. No one came forward. Chairman Hutchinson closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Ford moved, seconded by Commissioner Burns, that the Board of Commissioners hold a public hearing and approve a Business Development Grant Agreement with ABC Phones of North Carolina Inc., DBA A Wireless, subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Chris Snow, Wake County Parks, Recreation and Open Space Director, shared information about Wake County Parks.

- 1976 became a Division within Wake County Government
- 1988 Opened our first "County" Park Lake Crabtree
- Seven parks, the American Tobacco Trail and two Nature Preserves
- Three future parks:
 - Little River
 - Lake Myra
 - South East

Mr. Snow said Turnipseed Nature Preserve is scheduled to open in the fall. He said the request includes adding additional land to the southeast county park site. The proposed park's southern boundary fronts along Highway 42 about one mile east of the Johnston County line. Middle Creek bisects this area with a drainage area of greater than 40,000 acres (40,469 acres, over 63 square miles).

Mr. Snow shared information about the Southeast County Park proposal.

- 2004 began land acquisition
- Seven parcels
- 259 acres

- Two through RLDO donation
- Adams property 43.58 acres
- Total acres = 302

He said the land is a mix of farmland and forest and has an agriculture lease.

Mr. Snow said the 43.58-acre property has been recently appraised by Richard C. Kirkland, Jr., MAI, with a value of \$15,000/acre, or approximately \$653,700. Staff estimates the total acquisition cost at \$670,000. The acquisition will be funded with a combination of the \$228,276 in Recreation Area Land Contribution Funds and Open Space Funds appropriated in this item, plus \$441,724 in funds already appropriated for the South East County Park. The purchase of this property will bring the total acquisitions for this future park to over 300 acres. Commissioner Holmes asked for clarification of the distance between the Crowder Park proposal, Southeast County Park project, and the Crooked Creek property.

Mr. Snow said the Open Space and Parks Advisory Committee (OSAPAC) reviewed this transaction at its March 2017 meeting and unanimously recommended moving forward with the acquisition.

Mr. Snow said they are all in the same general area of the southeast part of Wake County. Mr. Snow said there is a 7-10 minute drive time between Crooked Creek and Crowder Park.

Commissioner Holmes asked if there would need to be future acquisitions to move forward with the Southeast Raleigh Park project and how long before the construction would begin. Mr. Snow said there is enough acreage to plan the park and construction would be a 6-9 month process.

Commissioner Portman asked about the use of the farmland. Mr. Snow said the Adams Family owns the property and there is a vineyard on the adjacent property. He said the family has a year-to-year ag lease and desires to continue farming the property.

Commissioner Portman asked about the long range use of the property. Mr. Snow said it is a highly developable parcel of land. He said the parcel is similar to Blue Jay Point Park which allows for open play fields, building development, or education center.

Commissioner West asked how the vision in the Master Plan meets the needs for that section of the county. He asked if there was an overlap or duplication with the Southeast Raleigh Park project and Crooked Creek property. Mr. Snow said both properties have positive aspects for development.. Mr. Snow said evaluation of needs in the community and a conceptual plan would be needed.

Commissioner Burns said the current parks Master Plan did not include future parks, only the existing parks. Mr. Snow said the 2008 comprehensive Master Plan only included existing parks.

Mr. Frank Cope, Wake County Community Services Director, said the Master Plan only included existing parks and there would be a comprehensive package that includes cost information brought before the Board of Commissioners. He said that if the remaining land can be acquired for the Southeast Raleigh Park proposal it will be the county's largest park.

Commissioner Burns asked what efforts are in place that the entire county has considered for parks so that areas are not over or under served.

Mr. Cope said that the county is normally contacted by the municipality about a park and looks to the municipality for assistance to where parks need to be located.

Commissioner Ford said that a Northern Wake park is needed. Mr. Snow said that this area of the county is being evaluated.

Commissioner Ford asked what funding has been spent toward the property. Mr. Snow said that \$2.5 Million has been spent toward the property.

Commissioner Portman said that the population will increase in Wake County and asked about the total investment per capita in order to double open space. He said there may be consideration for bonds for new parks. He said that it is important to evaluate what is needed in the future.

Mr. Cope said that there are Wake County open space, greenways, and parks. He said there are municipal, state, and U. S. Army Corp of Engineer land. He said it is difficult to determine what is county owned and acquired, but the process is a work in progress.

Commissioner Portman asked for the focus to be on the current investment and future consideration of parks for new locations. He said that growth should dictate parks, schools, and projects that are important to the citizens of Wake County. He said that the other parks are complimentary to the needs of Wake County residents.

Commissioner Holmes asked if the Town of Fuquay-Varina has had input on the park project. Mr. Cope said the proposal is for a county park and the town has not provided input.

Vice-Chair Calabria asked if the costs presented is for land acquisition cost with operating cost included. Mr. Cope said that the future Master Plan would include the development and operating costs.

Commissioner Holmes said that parks, greenways, and open space are needed in Wake County and the Crooked Creek and Southeast Raleigh Park proposals do not conflict. She said in addition to parks that there are also needs in the county such as schools, affordable housing, and mental health.

Commissioner Ford moved, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, that the Board of Commissioners:

1. Appropriate \$116,842 in Recreation Area Land Contribution Funds and \$111,434 in Open Space Funds;

2. Authorize the County Manager to execute an agreement to purchase the Adams Family Property, subject to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. The motion passed unanimously.

Public Comments

Mr. Ron Nowojszyk, (5700 Creekfall Lane Fuquay-Varina, NC), Crooked Creek HOA representative, said that he spoke before the Board of Commissioners at the last Regular meeting about the use of the Crooked Creek property in Wake County. He said the property would be perfect for a park. He said that a park has not been added to the county's Master Plan in the past ten years. He encouraged the Board of Commissioners to move forward with approving a park on the Crooked Creek property.

Chairman Hutchinson asked for the supporters of the park to stand and be recognized.

Mr. Tim Beck, (1420 Marketview Lane Fuquay-Varina, NC), said he is a developer in Raleigh. He spoke of a cemetery that he was a part of the development. He read a poem that his daughter wrote about the cemetery. He noted that the Crooked Creek park idea is about nature, inspires creativity, and is good for the citizens of Wake County.

Mr. Jeff Honeycutt, (5761 Brushy Meadow Drive, Fuquay-Varina, NC), spoke of his lifestyle changes he has made because of his health and improvements as a result of exercise and diet. He said that his lifestyle has changed because of having access to walking trails. He said that "highest and best use" is a term that is used when preserving the use of county funds. He said the term references funds being fiscally possible, appropriately supported, financially feasible, and results in the highest value. He spoke of the "highest and best use" of the park proposal. He said like the county's financial state, the decision of the park deserves the highest and best use of the property. He encourage the Board of Commissioners to improve the lives of the citizen of Wake County.

Ms. Phyllis Pickett (4721 Shady Green Drive Raleigh, NC) said that the South Wake Park project is about the needs for the community. She said that she lives in the Crooked Creek Subdivision. She said that the park is about needs instead of wants. She said that providing healthy living is important. She said that the property is perfect for passive recreation.

Ms. Jessica Chniclewski, (2623 Brighton Bluff Drive Apex, NC), said that she lives four minutes from the Crooked Creek property. She asked for a park in the area for her three children. She said that future generations will benefit from a park.

Mr. David Carter, (5216 W Oaks Drive, Fuquay-Varina), said he was the former Director of Wake County Parks, Recreation, and Open Space, from 1984-2006. He said during his tenure 16 parks were built. He said that one park has been built since 2000. He read a quote from a 2012 Board of Commissioner's meeting. He compared the City of Raleigh and Wake County Parks allocations for parks. He encouraged the Board of Commissioners to move forward with converting the Crooked Creek property to a county park.

Mr. David Warren, (113 Oak Ridge Lane Chapel Hill, NC 27517), Co-Chair of the NC Freedom Park, said that an educational and commemorative space that will honor African American Freedom will be constructed in Raleigh. He asked for support from Wake County on the efforts.

Mr. Reg Hildebrand, (319 Whitney Lane Durham, NC), said that the structure and architecture of the NC Freedom Park project will reflect values and aspirations of African American Freedom.

Mr. Craston Aris, (3516 Pinkham Way Raleigh, NC), Community Equity Leadership Team, said the strategic plans connect with what the school districts need for addressing equity in education. He said there has been engagement by stakeholders toward the work of counselors and social workers. He said accountability is important to enhance the lives of the citizens of Wake County.



Tax Committee Recommendations for Value Adjustments, Late Filed Applications, Collections Refunds and Tax Collections

That the Board of Commissioners approves the attached recommendations by the Tax Committee

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be hand-delivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31st of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.

WAKE COUNTY

BUSINESSDEVELOPMENTGRANTAGREEMENT

This Business Development Grant Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of the ______day of ______, 2017 by and between INFOSYS LIMITED, d/b/a INFOSYS LIMITED OF INDIA, a business corporation incorporated in the country of India and authorized to transact business in the State of North Carolina (the "Company") and WAKE COUNTY, North Carolina, a body politic and corporate and political subdivision of the State of North Carolina (the "County"). The County and Company may from time to time be referred to in this Agreement individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Local Development Act of 1925, as amended, (Article 1 of Chapter 158 of the North Carolina General Statutes) grants counties the authority to make appropriations for the purposes of aiding and encouraging the location or expansion of certain business enterprises in the county or for other purposes which the county's governing body finds, in its discretion, will increase the population, taxable property base and business prospects of the county; and

WHEREAS, N.C. Gen. Stat. § 158-7.1(b) lists specific economic development activities which a county may undertake, which list is not exclusive; and

WHEREAS, in Spring 2017, the Company began discussions with the State of North Carolina (the "State"), and thereafter with the County, to explore the possibility of expanding the Company's business operations in the County to include a regional operations facility located in Wake County which will serve as a physical location for management and operations (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, on June 9, 2017, the Board of Commissioners of the County met in closed session regarding the Company and its location possibilities and determined that (i) the Project would tend to increase the population, taxable property base and business prospects of the County, (ii) an incentive grant would encourage the Company to locate and provide jobs in the County, and (iii) it would be in the public interest to provide assistance as authorized by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 158-7.1 and approved the negotiation of a business development grant agreement for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Company has decided to locate the Project within the County; and

WHEREAS, the Company has decided to hire no fewer than 25 new employees at average wages above 100% of the County average and invest or cause to be invested no less than \$5,000,000 for acquisitions of tangible personal property and improvements to real estate related to the Project no later than December 31, 2018.

WHEREAS, the State of North Carolina (the "State") has awarded the Company a Job Development and Investment Grant ("JDIG"); and

WHEREAS, N.C. Gen. Stat. § 153A-449 authorizes the County to contract with and appropriate money to any person, association, or company in order to carry out the public purpose in which the County is authorized by law to engage; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County found that the consideration that the County will receive, based on prospective tax revenues to be generated over a five-year period due to investment in the Project, will exceed the amount of the grant offered in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County, following a public hearing on September 5, 2017, approved the execution of a business development grant to the Company for the Project on the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the reasons recited above, and the mutual covenants and obligations contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. <u>Real Estate Improvements and Machinery, Equipment, Furniture and Fixture Acquisition</u>. The Company shall purchase and/or make or cause to be made improvements at the site chosen for the Project in Wake County, North Carolina, (the "Property") and shall produce documentation for improvements which have been made to the Property and receipts showing proof of acquisitions of machinery, equipment, furniture and fixtures by the Company for use at the site of the Project. The Property shall be improved in accordance with the following:

(a) All construction undertaken, or caused to be undertaken, shall be or has been designed, constructed, and completed in accordance with applicable standards established by federal, State, local, and County regulations and laws; and

(b) The County shall not be responsible for any aspect of the design or construction of the premises.

2. <u>Performance by the Company</u>. This Agreement and the expenditure of County funds under this Agreement is expressly contingent upon the Company achieving the performance requirements within the time periods set forth below:

(a) <u>Investment in Real Estate Improvements and Tangible Personal Property</u>. The Company shall make, or cause to be made, investments for improvements to real estate and for acquisitions of tangible personal property (collectively, the "Investments") in the County in connection with the Project which shall total at least \$5,000,000 on or before December 31, 2018.

(b) <u>Employment</u>. By December 31, 2018, the Company shall have employed in Wake County no fewer than 25 new employees with an average annual wage of no less than \$53,783, which the Parties agree is 100% of the 2017 average annual wage for the County as determined by the North Carolina Department of Commerce's Finance Center. The Company shall maintain employment of the new employees for any years of the Grant Period beyond 2018.

The Parties agree that for purposes of calculating the "annual wage" of an employee of the Company "wage" shall have the meaning it has for purposes of the North Carolina Department of Commerce's Finance Center's calculation of "average annual wage" and that such meaning is the gross wage subject to reporting to the Division of Employment Security of the North Carolina Department of Commerce.

The Parties agree that the term "new employee" as used in this Agreement means a full-time employee who represents a net increase in the aggregate number of employees employed by the Company in connection with the Project. A full-time employee is a person who is employed by the Company for at least thirty-five (35) hours per week and whose wages are subject to withholding. The Company agrees to include residents of the County in recruiting for such job positions.

(c) <u>Use</u>. The Investments shall be made to accommodate an office facility that allows the Company to open a new technology and information hub focusing on cutting edge technology areas.

(d) <u>Payment of Taxes by Company</u>. The County must receive confirmation from the County tax assessor's office that the Company has paid, in full, the annual ad valorem taxes based on the increased value resulting from Investments in the Project.

3. <u>Documentation from the Company</u>. In connection with each request for reimbursement, the Company shall deliver to the County Manager a performance letter in substantially the form of the attached Exhibit A (the "Performance Letter"), certifying that (1) the Company has taken the actions described in Section 2(a) and (b) of this Agreement, (2) as of the date of the Performance Letter, the Investments for which the request is made have been completed, and (3) the Company qualifies for Jobs Development Incentive Grant program monies in such Grant Year. If the Company does not meet all of the conditions required to be certified in the Performance Letter, the Company shall not qualify for a grant payment from Wake County for that calendar year. Upon the request of the County Manager, the Company shall present to the County such evidence as may be reasonably requested to confirm the facts in the Performance Letter. To the full extent allowed by law, such requested evidence shall be kept confidential by the County and shall remain the property of the Company to be returned after the County's review.

It is agreed that the County, through its auditors, shall have the right upon reasonable notice and during normal business hours, to inspect and audit the Company's records pertaining to Investments made with respect to the Project. All records revealed by the Company to the County's auditors shall remain confidential and may be used by the County only for audit purposes to the full extent allowed by law.

The Company acknowledges that it has been informed by the County that the County is required by law, upon request, to disclose "Public Records" as that term is defined by N.C. Gen. Stat. §132-1. Notwithstanding the immediately preceding sentence, the County acknowledges that some or all of the information made available by the Company to the County pursuant to this Agreement may be exempt from disclosure as a "Public Record" pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §§ 132-1.2 and/or 132-6(d), and that all such information may be proprietary.

Some or all of the information made available to the County pursuant to this Agreement may be designated by the Company as confidential and as a trade secret at the time of disclosure to the County. The County, to the fullest extent allowed by state law, will hold such designated information as confidential. The County shall, if it receives a request for disclosure of any such information, notify the Company of such request so that the Company may defend any claims or disputes arising from efforts of others to cause such trade secrets to be disclosed as a Public Record, and the County shall refrain from making any such disclosures unless or until it (i) receives the Company's written permission to do so; or (ii) is compelled to do so by the final order of a court of competent jurisdiction. The Company shall have the right to direct any litigation of such dispute and shall indemnify the County for any legal fees and expenses incurred by the County in opposing such request for disclosure. The Company acknowledges that the County has met the disclosure requirements set forth in N.C. Gen. Stat. § 132-1.11(b).

4. <u>Payment of Grant.</u>

(a) Upon the terms and conditions herein, the County agrees to partially reimburse the Company for the Investments that the Company makes in the Project in order to provide an incentive to the Company to make such Investments and create such jobs within the County. A cash grant will be paid to the Company in an amount equal to a percentage of the additional County property tax revenue attributable to the assessed value of the Investments, as determined by the County tax assessor as more specifically set forth in Section 4(c).

(b) Once the Company has met the performance requirements set forth in Section 2 of this Agreement and the Company has submitted the required documentation under Section 3, the Company shall be eligible to receive the grant payments described in this Agreement. The grant payments shall begin in the year after the taxable property base of the Investments attributable to the Project as determined by the County tax assessor first exceeds \$5,000,000. The exact date of payments during each Grant Year shall be at the discretion of the County but shall be made during the period from January 1st through March 31st.

(c) The amount of the grant payments to be paid by the County to the Company shall be thirty-five (35%) of the additional County property tax revenue attributable to the assessed value of the Investments as defined in 2(a) of this Agreement as of January 1 of the preceding calendar year, as verified by the County Manager. The grant payments shall be paid each year (each a "Grant Year") for a period of five (5) consecutive years (the "Grant Period"). In no event shall the grant amount paid by the County in any Grant Year exceed the amount of ad valorem taxes actually paid in the preceding year for Investments in connection with the Project. The Parties agree that any payment of ad valorem tax made before January 6 following the due date of the tax shall be deemed to have been paid in the year the tax was due.

(d) Grant payments are to be made directly to the Company and mailed to directly to [address to come] or at such other address as shall be provided by the Company to the County in writing.

5. <u>State and Local Incentives</u>. This Agreement is expressly contingent on the Company's ability to qualify for matching funds from the State of North Carolina's part of the JDIG

program. Company shall not qualify for County Grant payments in any years of the Grant Period in the event that in such year the Company does not qualify for the JDIG program monies. This contingency only applies in those years when matching funds are available to the Company from the JDIG program.

6. <u>Amendments to Agreement</u>. This Agreement may be modified or amended only with the mutual written consent of the Parties.

7. <u>Parties</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the Parties and their heirs and successors and assigns. As used herein, words in the singular include the plural and the masculine includes the feminine and neuter genders, as appropriate.

8. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the Parties and there are no other representations, inducements, or other provisions other than those expressed in this writing. This Agreement may be executed in two or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which together shall constitute but one and the same instrument. All changes, additions, or deletions to this Agreement must be in writing and signed by all Parties.

It is specifically understood and agreed that the Company will be subject to applicable County ordinances, policies, procedures, and other regulations.

9. <u>Laws of North Carolina to Control This Agreement</u>. The Parties agree that this Agreement is to be controlled by the laws of the State of North Carolina.

10. <u>JurisdictionandVenue</u>. Any controversy or claim arising out of this Agreement shall be settled by an action initiated in the appropriate division of the General Court of Justice in Wake County, North Carolina.

11. <u>Termination</u>. Except as otherwise provided herein, this Agreement shall terminate on December 31st of the last year in which the County makes grant payments to the Company under this Agreement.

12. <u>Assignment</u>. With the consent of the County which shall not be unreasonably withheld, The Company may assign all or part of its rights, benefits, and/or obligations under this Agreement to one or more Affiliates designated by the Company; provided that no such assignments shall relieve the Company of its obligations or Company specific performance requirements under this Agreement which are a condition of County Grant Funding. For the purpose of this section, an Affiliate means the Company or any other entity that directly or indirectly through one or more intermediaries, controls, or is controlled by, or is under common control with, the Company. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties have executed this Agreement as of the day and year first above written.

Public Hearing and Consideration of Business Development Grant Agreement for ABC Phones of North Carolina Inc., DBA A Wireless

That the Board of Commissioners holds a public hearing and approves a Business Development Grant Agreement with ABC Phones of North Carolina Inc., DBA A Wireless, subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

WAKE COUNTY BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT GRANT AGREEMENT

This Business Development Grant Agreement (the "Agreement") is made and entered into as of the 5th day of September, 2017 by and between ABC PHONES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC. D/B/A A WIRELESS, a North Carolina corporation (the "Company") and WAKE COUNTY, North Carolina, a body politic and corporate and political subdivision of the State of North Carolina (the "County"). The County and Company may from time to time be referred to in this Agreement individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Local Development Act of 1925, as amended, (Article 1 of Chapter 158 of the North Carolina General Statutes) grants counties the authority to make appropriations for the purposes of aiding and encouraging the location or expansion of certain business enterprises in the county or for other purposes which the county's governing body finds, in its discretion, will increase the population, taxable property base and business prospects of the county; and

WHEREAS, N.C. Gen. Stat. § 158-7.1(b) lists specific economic development activities which a county may undertake, which list is not exclusive; and

WHEREAS, in April 2017, the Company began discussions with the State of North Carolina (the "State"), and thereafter with the County, to explore the possibility of locating the Company's headquarters in the County (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, on June 19, 2017, the Board of Commissioners of the County met in closed session regarding the Company and its location possibilities and determined that (i) the Project would tend to increase the population, taxable property base and business prospects of the County, (ii) an incentive grant would encourage the Company to locate and provide jobs in the County, and (iii) it would be in the public interest to provide assistance as authorized by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 158-7.1 and approved the negotiation of a business development grant agreement for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Company has decided to locate the Project within the County; and

WHEREAS, the Company's hiring and investment plans satisfy the County's threshold requirements for a State Match business development grant; and

WHEREAS, N.C. Gen. Stat. § 153A-449 authorizes the County to contract with and appropriate money to any person, association, or company in order to carry out the public purpose in which the County is authorized by law to engage; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County found that the consideration that the County will receive, based on prospective tax revenues to be generated over an eight-year period due to investment in the Project, will exceed the amount of the grant offered in this Agreement; and WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County, following a public hearing on September 5, 2017, approved the execution of a business development grant to the Company for the Project on the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the reasons recited above, and the mutual covenants and obligations contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Real Estate Lease, Facility Construction, and Machinery and Equipment</u> <u>Acquisition</u>. The Company shall make or cause to be made improvements at the site chosen for the Project in Wake County, North Carolina, (the "Property") and shall produce documentation for improvements which have been made to the Property and receipts showing proof of acquisitions of machinery, equipment, furniture and fixtures by the Company for use at the site of the Project. The Property shall be improved in accordance with the following:
 - (a) All construction undertaken, or caused to be undertaken, shall be or has been designed, constructed, and completed in accordance with applicable standards established by federal, State, local, and County regulations and laws; and
 - (b) The County shall not be responsible for any aspect of the design or construction of the premises.
- 2. <u>Performance by the Company</u>. This Agreement and the expenditure of County funds under this Agreement is expressly contingent upon the Company achieving the performance requirements within the time periods set forth below:
 - (a) <u>Investment in Real Estate Improvements and Tangible Personal Property</u>. The Company shall make, or cause to be made, investments for improvements to real estate and for acquisitions of tangible personal property (collectively, the "Investments") in the County in connection with the Project which shall total at least \$5,000,000 on or before December 31, 2021.
 - (b) <u>Employment</u>. By December 31, 2021, the Company shall have employed 250 new employees, with a minimum job creation of 225 jobs, with an average annual wage of no less than \$84,330, which the Parties agree is more than 150% of the 2016 average annual wage for the County as determined by the North Carolina Department of Commerce.

The Parties agree that for purposes of calculating the "annual wage" of an employee of the Company "wage" shall have the meaning it has for purposes of the North Carolina Department of Commerce's Finance Center's calculation of "average annual wage" and that such meaning is the gross wage subject to reporting to the Division of Employment Security of the North Carolina Department of Commerce.

The Company shall maintain employment of the 250 new employees, with a minimum job creation of 225 jobs, at its headquarters in Wake County for any years of the Grant Period beyond 2021.

The Parties agree that the term "new employee" as used in this Agreement means a full-time employee who represents a net increase in the aggregate number of employees employed by the Company at its headquarters in Wake County in connection with the Project. A full-time employee is a person who is employed by the Company for at least thirty-five (35) hours per week and whose wages are subject to withholding. The Company agrees to include residents of the County in recruiting for such job positions.

The Company commits that at the conclusion of its construction and refurbishment program at December 31, 2021, 250 new employees of the Company shall work and have a physical work location at 8510 Colonnade Center Drive, Raleigh, NC 27615.

- (c) <u>Use</u>. The Investments shall be made to accommodate a refurbished office facility that will allow the Company to bring talent together to provide a variety of executive and business support functions ranging from information technology and marketing to finance and accounting and other corporate functions including legal, real estate, and human resources.
- (d) <u>Payment of Taxes by Company</u>. The County must receive confirmation from the County tax assessor's office that the Company has paid, in full, the annual ad valorem taxes based on the increased value resulting from Investments in the Project.
- 3. Documentation from the Company. In connection with each request for reimbursement, the Company shall deliver to the County Manager a performance letter in substantially the form of the attached Exhibit A (the "Performance Letter") certifying that (1) it has undertaken the actions enumerated in Section 2(a) and (b), (2) that as of the date of the letter, the Investments for which the request is made have been completed, (3) the Company qualifies for Jobs Development Incentive Grant ("JDIG") program monies in such Grant Year, and (4) the Company qualifies for a similar incentive from the City of Raleigh, North Carolina in such Grant Year (the "Performance Letter"). . If the Company does not meet all of the conditions required to be certified in the Performance Letter, the Company shall not qualify for a grant payment for that calendar year. Upon the request of the County Manager, the Company shall present to the County such evidence as may be reasonably requested to confirm the facts in the Performance Letter. To the full extent allowed by law, such requested evidence shall be kept confidential by the County and shall remain the property of the Company to be returned after the County's review.

It is agreed that the County, through its auditors, shall have the right upon reasonable notice and during normal business hours, to inspect and audit the Company's records pertaining to Investments made with respect to the Project. All records revealed by the Company to the County's auditors shall remain confidential and may be used by the County only for audit purposes to the full extent allowed by law.

The Company acknowledges that it has been informed by the County that the County is required by law, upon request, to disclose "Public Records" as that term is defined by N.C. Gen. Stat. § 132-1. Notwithstanding the immediately preceding sentence, the County acknowledges that some or all of the information made available by the Company to the County pursuant to this Agreement may be exempt from disclosure as a "Public Record" pursuant to N.C. Gen. Stat. §§ 132-1.2 and/or 132-6(d), and that all such information may be proprietary. Some or all of the information made available to the County pursuant to this Agreement may be designated by the Company as confidential and as a trade secret at the time of disclosure to the County. The County, to the fullest extent allowed by state law, will hold such designated information as confidential. The County shall, if it receives a request for disclosure of any such information, notify the Company of such request so that the Company may defend any claims or disputes arising from efforts of others to cause such trade secrets to be disclosed as a Public Record, and the County shall refrain from making any such disclosures unless or until it (i) receives the Company's written permission to do so; or (ii) is compelled to do so by the final order of a court of competent jurisdiction. The Company shall have the right to direct any litigation of such dispute and shall indemnify the County for any legal fees and expenses incurred by the County in opposing such request for disclosure. The Company acknowledges that the County has met the disclosure requirements set forth in N.C. Gen. Stat. § 132-1.11(b).

- 4. <u>Payment of Grant.</u>
 - (a) The County agrees to partially reimburse the Company for the Investments that the Company makes in the Project in order to provide an incentive to the Company to make such Investments and create such jobs within the County. A cash grant will be paid to the Company in an amount equal to a percentage of the additional County property tax revenue attributable to the assessed value of the Investments, as determined by the County tax assessor as more specifically set forth in Section 4(c).
 - (b) Once the Company has met the performance requirements set forth in Section 2 of this Agreement and the Company has submitted the required documentation under Section 3, the Company shall be eligible to receive the grant payments described in this Agreement.

The grant payments shall begin the year after the property tax base of the Company first reflects the value of the improvements made to the building at 8510 Colonnade Center Drive, Raleigh, NC 27615.

The exact date of payments during each Grant Year shall be at the discretion of the County but shall be made during the period from January 1st through March 31st.

- (c) The amount of the grant payments to be paid by the County to the Company shall be thirty-five percent (35%) of the additional County property tax revenue attributable to the assessed value of the Investments as defined in 2(a) of this Agreement as of January 1 of the preceding calendar year, as verified by the County Manager. 

Teaching and Research Statement

Caring for underserved populations and teaching have helped center me throughout my career. These interests have been the primary theme of my academic career and have maintained my passion and commitment.

Taking care of patients who have no insurance, who have little formal education, who face multiple social stressors can be gratifying but also exhausting. My clinical work at the Prospect Hill Community Health Center has allowed me to better understand the needs of underserved populations and serve patients who might otherwise go without care. But I have been able to balance this work with my role as medical director of our Community Care network and as consultant to Medicaid and the Carolina Health Net project here at UNC. In these roles, I have been able to contribute to systems redesigns for uninsured populations that are directly informed by my clinical work. I believe that my work at a systems level has been enriched by my clinical work but I also suspect that this work at a systems level has prevented me from "burning out" as a clinician at Prospect Hill. For me there is no feeling like realizing that you have successfully built a trusting therapeutic relationship with a patient across wide socioeconomic and cultural barriers. At the same time I feel immense satisfaction when I have contributed to a system that improves care for an entire community. I will strive to maintain this balance as I move forward in my career. I encourage students interested in care for underserved populations to do the same.

This desire to inspire others to care for underserved populations has developed into a passion for teaching. Since joining the faculty, I have taught residents, faculty fellows, as well as medical students at every level of training. I feel comfortable teaching in all settings including presentations to 160 students as ICM course director, leading small group seminars as the campus director of the FM clerkship, and one-on-one clinical teaching in my office in the Prospect Hill Community Health Center. My teaching evaluations by students and peers have consistently been high and I have been recognized as a teacher through a number of awards. But for me, teaching is much more than a list of courses that I have taught or awards that I have received. It has become one of the central pillars of my professional being. Teaching parallels my role as a physician and centers on adjusting the goals and methods of my instructions to the needs of the students and developing bidirectional and meaningful connections with them. Parker Palmer describes this as developing "communities of learning" with our students. In his book, "The Courage to Teach", he describes good teachers as weaving a complex web of

connections among themselves, their subjects, and their students so that students can learn to weave these connections for themselves. Developing such communities with my learners is one of the most rewarding things I do professionally. These moments happen in formal teaching settings but just as readily and sometimes more readily, they happen in less formal advising and mentoring relationships. I will remain actively involved in all forms of teaching but will continue to actively seek out such less formal interactions with students.

Developing communities of learning has extended to my colleagues as well. When I joined the faculty and began leading faculty groups preparing for the ICM seminar sessions, I realized that sharing my passion for teaching with others had a catalytic effect on enthusiasm of my fellow teachers. As we shared successes and challenges we created a "community of learning" among ourselves that improve our skills as educators. My work on the STFM Steering Committee for the Group on Predoctoral Education, on the Family Medicine Task Force for the NBME, and with the Alliance for Clinical Educators has extended my efforts to create "communities of learning" nationally.

Caring for underserved populations and teaching are my passions but I have also come to understand the power of scholarship. While I have never been a "researcher" in the traditional sense of the word, I have worked hard to share my discoveries as a teacher and more recently my experiences working with systems of care for underserved populations. I have presented regularly at national meetings, written chapters in textbooks and published in peer reviewed national journals. I will continue to contribute to this "community of learning" that is created virtually through such scholarship so that I can influence care for the underserved and teaching on a bigger scale.
