Chairman Hutchinson said that the country has been devastated by recent hurricanes in Texas, Puerto Rico, Florida and the deaths in Las Vegas. Ms. Eleanor Oakley, President/CEO, United Arts Council of Raleigh and Wake County, thanked the Board of Commissioners for supporting arts and humanities across Wake County.

Vice-Chair Calabria commended Ms. Oakley and United Arts for being a partner for the arts. He said the arts are important in Wake County in its meaning, self expression and contributes to the economy. He said the one percent for arts ordinance will assist with promotion of the arts in Wake County.

Vice-Chair Calabria read aloud the Proclamation for Arts and Humanities Month.

Ms. Sonya Reid, Wake County Health Promotion Program Manager, shared the breast cancer statistics in Wake County. She recognized Ms. April Davis, Sales and Marketing Manager, Raleigh Radiology; Ms. Caroline Sullivan, former commissioner; the Pink Ribbon Campaign Committee, and Ms. Regina Petteway, Human Services Director.

Ms. Davis shared that Raleigh Radiology will provide a free screening on October 20, 2017 for awareness and participation in National

Mammography Day. She said on the third Friday of every October since 2004 Raleigh Radiology has held free screening for mamograms to uninsured women. She explained the programs that are supported through Wake County Human Services. She thanked the board for the support of breast cancer and cervical cancer program.

Ms. Sullivan shared her family history with cancer and her own treatment for breast cancer. She encouraged women to not delay annual screenings or potential issues and be tested for breast cancer.

Commissioner Jessica Holmes read aloud the Proclamation and asked all the survivors and fighters of cancer to stand and be recognized.

Commissioner Holmes moved, seconded by Commissioner Portman, that the Board of Commissioners proclaim October 2017 as Breast Cancer Awareness Month in Wake County. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Katherine Williams, Wake County Cooperative Extension Director, said that she has worked toward the development of YouthThrive and in the work it performs in the community.

She asked that the guests from the YouthThrive Board be recognized by the Board of Commissioners. She said that Ms. Regina Petteway, Human Services Director, and Deputy Juan Collado, Deputy Sheriff Investigator, both serve on the YouthThrive Board.

Ms. Sheila Reich, Executive Director, YouthThrive, shared information about the program and thanked the board for the recognition of Bullying Prevention in Wake County. She said all twelve municipalities have indicated they are willing to adopt a proclamation for the recognition of Bullying Prevention.

Commissioner Ford said that being a former administrator and school teacher brings the bullying issue to the forefront. He said that bullying is a community issue.

Commissioner Ford read the proclamation aloud.

Commissioner Ford moved, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, that

the Board of Commissioners proclaim October, 2017 as Bullying Prevention Month and encourages stakeholders across the community to educate our children, parents and the broader community to stand up, speak out. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner West said "recognition is respect made visible." He introduced Reverend Shawn J. Singleton, incoming pastor of Martin Street Baptist Church. He said on October 22, 2017 Reverend Singleton will be installed as pastor of Martin Street Baptist Church.

Commissioner West read aloud the Proclamation.

Pastor Singleton thanked the board for their leadership and said that he is a humble servant of the Lord and looks forward to serving the community and the citizens of Wake County.

Vice-Chair Calabria said that Reverend Singleton will be the pastor of a leading church in the community.

Commissioner Ford welcomed Reverend Singleton to the community.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Portman, that the Board of Commissioners recognize Dr. Shawn J. Singleton and approves a resolution for his installation as pastor of Martin Street Baptist Church. The motion passed unanimously.

Public Comments

Ms. Dale Threatt-Taylor, District Director, Wake County Soil and Water Conservation, asked the board to recognize two employees that were hired with the Urban Agriculture Grant. She complimented the two new employees, Lindsay Carver and Tonya Taylor. She asked that they be recognized by the Board of Commissioners.

Mr. Jason Joyner, Wendell Town Commissioner, commended the Board of Commissioners for their work. He said that a few Wendell Commissioners met with Wake County Public Schools about item #14. He said that the town officials are unanimously opposed to the school expansion onto four lots. He said that he and the elected officials desire additional meetings with Wake County Public Schools' staff about the proposal.

Dr. Jean Spooner spoke about the Lake Crabrtree County Park, representing the Umstead Coalition. She said she is in support of item #19 on the agenda. She commended the programs available for hiking, biking, and trails.

Ms. Natalie Lou thanked the board for preserving Wake County Crabtree Park. She said that she coaches a mountain bike team and will begin a girls program for mountain biking. She said programs are positive for children that are not into main stream sports. She thanked the board for supporting Umstead State Park and RDU properties.

Mr. Joel Sugarman, 4700 Tee Box Court, Fuquay-Varina, spoke of the health benefits of walking. He supports the Crooked Creek Property being a park for walking abilities.

Ms. Beth Greene, 5424 Willow Bridge Ln, Fuquay-Varina, resident of Crooked Creek, said that she supports a park at Crooked Creek. She asked the Board of Commissioners to support a park on the property.

A youth from Fuguay-Varina spoke in support of a park.

Mr. Hank Dickson, 504 Sandy Point Way, Holly Springs, spoke of the leachate resolution. He serves on Holly Springs Town Council and said it was a concern for residents. He complimented the county Solid Waste staff and asked the Board to support an odor management system.

A youth from Fuguay-Varina shared reasons why he would like a park.

Mr. Steve Burke, 104 Laurie Lane, Cary, said his comments are related to item #19. He said the Odd Fellows tract will assist with his business and retain employees. He said preserving the land is important.

Ms. Nancy Ferrell Unwin, 4705 Linaria Lane, Fuquay-Varina, spoke of a study on green spaces encourages activity, reduces stress, and improves health. She supports the SouthWake Park project.

Mr. Ron Nawojczyk, 4347 Halliwell Drive, Raleigh said that education about the Crooked Creek property is important to the decisions that are made.

Ms. Patti Goodwin, Brighton Bluff Drive, Apex, supports the SouthWake Park project and the legacy that it would bring to Wake County.

Mr. Bob Barker, 401 N. Woodrow St., Fuquay-Varina, NC, spoke of his company and its success. He said that growth attracts amenities and that southern Wake County needs a park.

Mr. Chad Moose, 4804 Dembrook Court, Fuquay-Varina, said he owns and operates a lawn care business and spoke of the turf at the Crooked Creek property.

Mr. Jay Pontier, 201 Accolade Drive, Cary spoke about disc golf in Wake County. He supports the SouthWake Park and the addition of disk golf on the property.

Mr. David Anderson, 1209 Anora Drive Apex, thanked the board for their leadership. He supports the RDU partnership. He expressed his appreciation for the bike trails in Wake County.

Mr. Frank Eagles, Mayor of Rolesville, said that the town just purchased 110 acres of farm land that will be developed into a sports complex and a park. He said Rolesville expects the same share of support for their park as other municipalities receive.

Commissioner Holmes requested that item #12 (approval of funding agreement for the Town of Fuquay-Varina Fleming Loop Park) be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately.

Commissioner Holmes asked for a brief summary of this project.

Ms. Denise Foreman, Assistant County Manager, said this project is funded by the hospitality tax funds. These funds are collected througout the county and can only be used for projects related to sports, arts, culture, or convention related activities. Ms. Foreman said the Town of Fuquay-Varina submitted a proposal for their Fleming Loop park athletic complex and received approval from the Board of Commissioners. These funds will be used along with County and grant fund to develop seven multi-purpose fields, parking, greenways and a playground at Fleming Loop Park. Ms. Foreman stated the Town of Fuquay-Varina approved the funding agreement two weeks ago. Ms. Foreman said fourteen projects submitted requests for funding and seven received commitments from the county.

Vice-Chair Calabria moved, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, that the Board of Commissioners approve a funding agreement in the amount of \$500,000 with the Town of Fuquay-Varina subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. The motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Betty Parker, Senior Director, Real Estate Services, WCPSS, shared a map and aerial view of the site.

Ms. Parker said the school is currently at 109 percent capacity. It is in consideration for renovation but is not currently on their seven year plan.

She shared the contract terms and information.

- Seller: Anthony M. Gerardi and Stephanie S. Gerardi, who acquired the property in 2014.
- Location: 226 West Academy Street, Wendell, NC, adjacent to Wendell ES.

- Asset Description: ±1.083 acre residential tract from which a single family residential structure and appurtenances were removed in 2015.
- Negotiated Purchase Price: \$74,800.
- Valuation: Appraised value is \$68,000. Current Wake County Tax value is \$35,100.
- Proposed Utilization: Direct access from Wendell ES to Thompson Field, aids design flexibility for the future Wendell ES major renovation, provides opportunities to expand parking.

Commissioner Portman asked if conversations have taken place with the Town of Wendell regarding this acquisition. Ms. Parker said she was aware of the town's concerns and staff has had meetings with them.

Commissioner Burns stated he received a letter expressing lack of coordination with the Town of Wendell for Academy Street. He asked that she address those issues when she returns for the second reading. Ms. Parker said she was prepared to address this issue now.

She said Wendell Elementary was considered for renovation due to its age. She said immediate needs were examined for appropriateness for renovation. Staff discovered that other schools needed renovation sooner, but decided to pursue this property for future use. She said a feasibility study was completed and was favorable. She said the feasibility study affected adjacent homeowners and that was discussed with them. She said that the renovation of Wendell Elementary is not currently on their seven year plan. Ms. Parker said that prior to approaching WCPSS about purchasing the property, the homeowner offered it to the Town of Wendell, but they were not interested, therefore; WCPSS pursued the purchase to provide design flexibility in the future.

Commissioner Ford asked how the staff currently accesses Thompson Field. Ms. Parker said there may not be current access, but she is uncertain. She said there is no safe pedestrian access from the school to the field.

Commissioner Ford asked the impacts on homeowners if WCPSS would pursue the renovation plans. Ms. Parker explained all the options that were discussed. She said options would be related to feasibility. She said staff would need to ensure storm water and parking were addressed appropriately.

Chairman Hutchinson asked why the elected officials of Wendell were opposed to expanding the school onto those four lots. Ms. Parker said that one home has a historic component to it and the properties are near the

historic part of the town.

No action was taken by the board since the item is a first reading.

Ms. Alicia Arnold, Wake County Human Services Division Director, said the proposed grant supports administrative and capital needs of the transportation services program.

Ms. Arnold said the requested match amounts are funded through the 2018-2019 transportation budget.

Ms. Arnold said the Transportation Advisory board approved this item at their September 26th meeting.

Commissioner West said that this item came forward for discussion at the Human Services Board last week. He said the vulnerable populations this program serves is importance. He said that funding requirements are in place and transportation issues will not be solved with the grant.

Ms. Arnold said this is the only program in the county that provides medicaid demand response transportation. She said these are shared

rides, which helps reduce the cost and the program is a model for connectivity of the larger transportation plan for rural parts of the community.

Chairman Hutchinson opened the public hearing.

No one came forward.

Chairman Hutchinson closed the public hearing.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, that the Board of Commissioners hold a required public hearing on the Community Transportation Program grant and authorize the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners to sign the Resolutions to Apply, Certifications and Assurances and affix the signatures of local officials as required. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Tim Maloney, Wake County Planning Development and Inspections Director, shared the primary function of PDI (Planning Development and Inspections Department).

- Protect the public health, safety, and welfare in accordance with the NC Building Code
- Provide services including building permitting, plan review, and inspections for multiple jurisdictions and areas

Mr. Maloney provided a list of the various entities that PDI provides services to.

- Unincorporated areas of Wake County
- Towns of Knightdale, Rolesville, Wendell, and Zebulon
- RDU International Airport and Research Triangle Park
- Wake County Public School System Projects in all municipal jurisdictions
- Wake County and Wake Tech projects in all municipal jurisdictions (except Fuquay-Varina)

He shared a chart of the building inspections in Wake County. He said that

one inspection per day is the goal and inspections are occurring in a two day span. He said the work load level has increased greatly since 2012 and will be met by increasing staff.

He said the additional plans and permit technician will improve services. He shared the permit technician work and the key workload information. He said that three business days is the goal and currently it is taking 5 to 10 business days for plans and permits.

He shared the costs and revenues.

FY 2018 costs are \$189,319

- Salary and benefits, telephone or cell phone, fleet charges, and fuel
- One-time charges (vehicle, computers, wireless devices)
- Full year annualized costs are \$220,243

Revenue source is building permits

No fee changes are required

He shared the action requested.

Commissioner Ford asked why the positions were not included in the county manager's budget. Mr. Maloney said that staff wanted to see a stable trend before requesting additional FTE's.

Commissioner Portman applauded staff for bringing the additional positions forward so there is no delay in projects and allowing the board to approve the positions.

Vice-Chair Calabria thanked Mr. Maloney and the Planning Department for their work. He added that he has always received excellent feedback from the Community about the Planning Department.

Commissioner Portman moved, seconded by Commissioner Burns, that the Board of Commissioners appropriates \$189,319 of additional building permit revenue in the FY 2018 General Fund, and establishes 1.0 FTE for a Plans and Permit Technician position, and 2.0 FTEs for General Inspectors within the Planning, Development and Inspections Division. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Chris Snow, Wake County Parks Recreation and Open Space Director, provided information on a request for proposals recently released by the Raleigh Durham Airport Authority.

He shared information about the Raleigh-Durham Airport.

- Raleigh-Durham Airport (RDU) has played a central role in the growth of the Research Triangle Region.
- 2016 more than 11 million people traveled through RDU.
- Vision 2040 Master Plan
 - · assess expected growth in airport activity and in the region
 - gauge existing facilities ability to meet that future demand
 - identify development solutions.

He shared the Airports 2040 vision master plan.

- Airfield Expansion
- · Terminal Development
- Ground Transportation
- General Aviation Development
- Land Use (as it relates to non-aeronautical use)

Mr. Snow said the airport owns over 5,000 acres and the vision 2040 master plan recognizes that not all the land is needed for the airports primary purpose.

He shared information about the non-aeronautical land use.

Along I-40 between Lake Crabtree County Park and William B. Umstead State Park

Commissioner West asked for clarification on sanctioned versus non-sanctioned recreation. Mr. Snow said the sanctioned areas are under agreement with the airport, but the non-sanctioned areas are not. He said the non-sanctioned areas have been developed over the years by individuals and groups as a place to ride, but there is not a written agreement with the airport for that use.

He outlined the recent request for proposals (RFP)

- Issued: September 8, 2017
- Proposals Due: October 9, 2017
- · May propose to lease one, two or all three parcels
- Minimum term = 25 years,
- Maximum term of the lease = 40 years, and in no event can the lease exceed 40 years
- Proposed use cannot adversely affect the safety, utility or efficiency of the airport."
- "fair-market value"

Mr. Snow said staff would like to respond to the RFP for land lease, but cannot do so by the October 9th deadline. He said there was also an offer by the Conservation Fund to purchase the Odd Fellows tract and add it to the existing Umstead State Park. He is requesting the following board actions related to this item:

- Authorize staff to obtain an appraisal on Parcel 2 (approximately 60 acres) and Parcel 3 (approximately 90 acres) as identified in the Raleigh-Durham International Airport Land Lease Request for Proposals; and
- 2. Adopt a resolution supporting The Conservation Funds purchase of the Odd Fellows/Crabtree Creek property.
- 3. Authorize the County Manager to send a letter to the Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority expressing:
 - a. the County's interest in leasing Parcel 2 and Parcel 3;
 - b. a request for a 90 day extension of the Land Lease Request

- for Proposals to allow the County time to develop a proposal; and
- c. The County's support of The Conservation Fund's offer to purchase the Odd Fellows/Crabtree Creek property (Parcel 1) for \$6.46 million to preserve the land and have it added to the Umstead State Park property.

Commissioner West asked if the airport is interested in selling instead of leasing the property. He asked about the ownership of the property.

Mr. Scott Warren, County Attorney, said the property is owned and managed by the Airport Authority.

Chairman Hutchinson said North Carolina Parks have expressed interested in the Odd Fellows tract but they are not willing to lease it. He said there is a petition with over 7,000 signatures showing support of the sale of the land to Umstead State Park. He said the Conservation Fund is willing to buy the land and transfer it to Umstead State Park when they have funds available. Chairman Hutchinson shared a letter of support from Senator Jay Chaudhari in favor of this transaction. He also said the County is interested in leasing the remainder of the land included in the RFP.

Commissioner West asked if this is standard operating procedure for the county. He said communication is important when determining the language of the request.

County Manager, Jim Hartmann, said the county has been studying this land for the past year and the Board approved a feasibility study, which was completed. He is in support of the 90 day extension to allow the county to provide due diligence in getting the land appraised and drafting a proposal.

Chairman Hutchinson said it is very important to preserve this land in its natural state.

Commissioner Portman said he is in support of the process and it is important to preserve open space to ensure the beauty of the area. He said the Odd Fellows tract was preserved for recreation and open space prior to being acquired by the Airport. He said the 2040 plan now shows there is no need for the land, and it is appropriate for the county to preserve it for its

original intent.

Commissioner Holmes asked if the airport may have a need for the land in the future since they limited the lease term to 40 years. Mr. Snow said he is not able to answer for the airport.

Commissioner Holmes said she is in support of the county leasing the space, but she is concerned about asking the airport to sell land that they do not intend to sell. She also said it is important to keep all park projects in mind when making these decisions.

Vice-Chair Calabria asked if pursuing this would cause a planning and zoning issue in the future. Scott Warren, County Attorney, said he does not foresee that occuring, but it is a possibility.

Chairman Hutchinson suggested revising the resolution to address Commissioner Holmes concerns regarding the request to sell property that is not for sale. He read aloud the motion.

Chairman Hutchinson moved that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Authorize staff to obtain appraisal on Parcel 2 (approximately 60 acres) and Parcel 3 (approximately identified in the Raleigh-Durham Airport Land Lease Request for Proposals; and
- 2. Adopt a resolution supporting The Conservation Funds purchase of the Odd Fellows/Crabtree Creek property.
- 3. Authorize the County Manager to send a letter to the Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority expressing:
 - a. the County's interest in leasing Parcel 2 and Parcel 3;
 - a request for a 90 day extension of the Land Lease Request for Proposals to allow the County time to develop a proposal; and
 - c. the County's support of The Conservation Fund's offer purchase the Odd Fellows/Crabtree Creek property (Parcel 1) for \$6.46 million to preserve the land and have it added to the Umstead State Park property.

Commissioner Burns suggested amending the motion to include the following language to paragraph 3 c. of the Resolution: "and requests the Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority to re-consider the purchase offer."

Commissioner Holmes said she supports those changes. She also said communication is important and she wants to make sure we understand the Airport Authority has a right to make their own decisions.

Commissioner Ford asked about the estimated cost of the appraisal. Mr. Snow said he estimates \$2,500.00 to \$3,000.00 based on prior appraisals. Mr. Hartmann said it will be under \$10,000.00.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Chairman Hutchinson, that the Board of Commissioners:

Mr. Chris Dillon, Wake County Assistant County Manager, said that the

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners proclaims October 2017 as Bullying Prevention Month and encourages stakeholders across the community to educate our children, parents and the broader community to stand up, speak out.

Item Summary:

In October 2016, Wake County's primary convener of youth development providers in the County, YouthThrive, stood side by side with the Chair of the Wake County Board of County Commissioners, County Manager, Chair of the Wake School Board, and the United Way Director to issue a "Call to Action" to our community to help increase the high school graduation rate and to eliminate youth suicides. Since that time, YouthThrive has mobilized more 40 individuals representing 25 committed organizations to work on action teams to develop and implement aligned actions that support educational success and emotional well-being for all youth in Wake County.

Bullying is one issue in our community that affects both a young person's ability to engage in learning and their long-term emotional well-being. Partners involved in YouthThrive have worked together to launch a new Bullying Prevention Campaign and are working with schools, community and faith-based organizations, parents and students to encourage victims, peers, caring adults and parents to *stand up*, *speak out*. Too often, victims suffer while caring adults try to figure out what is happening with their young person and peers stand by in silence.

YouthThrive has released a Tool Kit that shares research, encourages meaningful activities, recommends policy to promote a culture of safety and connection in all the spaces where our young people live, learn, work and play. Wake County Public Schools, Alliance Behavioral Health, Wake County Human Services, 4-H Youth Development, Interact, YMCA, the Family Resource Center and the Poe Center for Health Education are a few partners directly involved. The Board of County Commissioners, municipal leaders from across the County and the School Board are all valued partners in raising awareness and encouraging everyone to take action.

Cooperative Extension Director, Katherine Williams chairs the YouthThrive Board. Along with Human Services Director, Regina Petteway, and Wake County Sheriff's Office Juvenile Investigator, Juan Callado, they represent Wake County on the YouthThrive Board to bring about collective impact for youth across Wake County. The organization has a new Executive Director, Shelia Reich, who will be introduced along with this agenda item.



- 1. Authorizes the County Manager to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with the Town of Morrisville for a Joint Use Master Plan and Feasibility Study associated with Convenience Center #3 and Morrisville Public Works Facility subject to conditions acceptable to the County Attorney;
- 2. Accepts the amount of \$20,000.00 from the Town of Morrisville for their share of the Joint Use Master Plan and Feasibility Study; and
- 3. Appropriates the \$20,000.00 received from the Town of Morrisville into the Solid Waste Enterprise Capital Projects fund to be used for the Joint Use Master Plan and Feasibility Study.

Item Summary:

Wake County initiated the creation of Convenience Centers in the 1980's to offer disposal services to all Wake County residents living in the unincorporated areas of the County. There are currently 11 Convenience Center sites throughout Wake County. Due to the County's population growth and city limits expansions, staff determined a need to reinvestigate the population demands and functionality of the convenience centers. In April of 2014, a County Convenience Center Master Plan was presented to the Wake County Board of Commissioners at a Work Session. The purpose of the Master Plan was to evaluate each existing site and provide a long range comprehensive convenience center plan to assist in providing necessary waste disposal and recycling services. The Convenience Center Master Plan recommended the expansion of Convenience Center #3 located at 266 Aviation Parkway in Morrisville. Due to the future NCDOT Aviation Parkway widening project and a restriction by the watershed easement associated with the Crabtree Creek Site#23 flood control structure at the rear of the County property, the expansion of Convenience Center #3 on the existing site cannot be accomplished.

The Town of Morrisville prepared a Public Works Master Plan and Needs Study in 2014; however, a number of significant changes have occurred since that time, such as NCDOT's proposed widening of Aviation Parkway. This widening will result in the need to demolish the existing Public Works Facility located at 414 Aviation Parkway. The Town's property at 414 Aviation Parkway is 13+ acres and is large enough to construct a new Public Works Facility on the existing Public Works site. The Town Public Works property is contiguous to the Wake County Convenience Center #3 property and is adjacent to Cedar Fork District Park, which the Town of Morrisville leases from the

County and operates as a Park. The location of these properties and their relation to one another is shown on the attached aerial map.

The Town and Wake County desire to jointly coordinate their master planning efforts to expand/relocate their respective facilities, potentially on a co-located site, owned by the Town. Wake County staff has worked closely with the Town to develop a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to proceed with a Joint Use Master Plan and Feasibility Study. The draft MOU outlines the cost sharing and responsibilities of both parties. Wake County Environmental Services Department Solid Waste Management Division has budgeted \$50,000.00 for the County's share of the cost. The Town has budgeted \$20,000.00 for their cost of the Joint Master Plan. Wake County will manage the contract for the Master Plan. The joint Master Plan will review up to four alternative designs. One of the alternatives will include the Convenience Center and Public Works developing their sites independently of each other.

Morrisville Town Council unanimously approved this MOU on September 12, 2017. Staff requests that the Board authorizes the County Manager to execute this MOU, recommends that the Board accepts \$20,000.00 from the Town of Morrisville for their share of the Joint Use Master Plan and Feasibility Study, and appropriates the \$20,000.00 received from Morrisville into the Solid Waste Enterprise Capital Project fund.

County and the Town being jointly referred to herein as "the Parties".	

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County created Convenience Centers in the 1980's to offer disposal services in the unincorporated areas of the County, available and open to all Wake County residents; and

WHEREAS, there are currently 11 Convenience Center Sites throughout Wake County; and

WHEREAS, the County Convenience Center Master Plan was presented to the Wake County Board of Commissioners at a work session on April 14, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the County Convenience Center Master Plan recommends the expansion/relocation of Convenience Center#3 at 266 Aviation Parkway in Morrisville; and

WHEREAS, the expansion onto a neighboring property or relocation of this facility to a nearby property would best satisfy the needs and demands of Wake County residents; and

WHERAS, the Town Public Works Facility at 414 Aviation Parkway is adjacent to the County Convenience Center#3; and

WHEREAS, the Town Public Works Facility Master Plan, dated December 2014 supports the expansion/relocation of the Town Public Works Facility; and

WHEREAS, the Town also desires to improve access and connectivity to the Cedar Fork District Park; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires to construct a new facility on the existing Public Works site; and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Department of Transportation is widening Aviation Parkway which will significantly impact both the County owned property at 266 Aviation Parkway and the Town owned property at 414 Aviation Parkway

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to jointly coordinate their master planning efforts to expand/relocate their respective facilities, potentially on a co-located site.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and mutual understandings, the parties hereby agree to the following terms and conditions:

MOU for Master Plan for Wake County CC #3 and Town of Morrisville Public Works Facility

1. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is to set forth the understanding and mutual agreement of the Parties as it relates to the conditions that must occur in order to proceed with a Joint Master Plan to investigate the feasibility for the County to construct a new Convenience Center and the Town to construct a new Public Works Facility on property currently owned by the Town at 414 Aviation Parkway in Morrisville, North Carolina.

2. GENERAL CONDITIONS

- A. The Parties' obligations with respect to proceeding with the joint design and construction of a new County Convenience Center #3 and the Town Public Works Facility (hereafter referred to as "the Joint Master Plan Project" "Joint Master Plan" or "Project") are expressly conditioned upon and subject to the Parties receiving proper approval and appropriation of funding from their governing boards to enter into mutually acceptable written agreements as to all aspects of the funding, site evaluations and master planning for the Project ("Agreements"). Accordingly, except to the extent that specific responsibilities of the Parties are set forth herein, this MOU shall not impose obligations on either Party to proceed with the Joint Master Plan Project, its associated components or otherwise bind the Parties to enter into future Agreements with respect thereto.
- B. Unless and until superseded by written amendment or final Agreements signed by all Parties, this MOU contains the entire understanding of the Parties with respect to proceeding with the Joint Master Plan Project.
- C. <u>Description of Project:</u> The Joint Master Plan Project will consist of an evaluation of alternatives for the Convenience Center #3, the Morrisville Public Works Facility and additional access to the Cedar Fork District Park. The Joint Master Plan shall evaluate available land located in the vicinity of the existing Convenience Center #3 and the Morrisville Public Works Facility and evaluate various combinations/alternatives that take into account the widening and raising of Aviation Parkway as well as the floodway and flood hazard designations. The Joint Master Plan should also provide some general cost estimating associated with the Project.
- D. Ownership of Master Planning Documents. The County and Town shall retain ownership or use of the work product for the Project, including drawings, renderings, etc.

3. TERM

The term of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be for a period of eighteen (18) months from the date of execution by the last party, or until such time as all documents set forth in Section 6 herein shall be fully and finally executed, whichever is shorter. The Parties may extend this Term by separate written agreement or addendum executed by both Parties. If the Parties agree and obtain all required approvals and appropriation of funding to proceed with the Joint Master Plan, then the Parties contemplate execution of a more formal and detailed Interlocal Agreement or Funding Agreement to

replace this Memorandum prior to or at the end of the term. Either Party may terminate this MOU by providing the other (45) days advance written notice of said termination.

4. RESPONSIBILITIES OF WAKE COUNTY

- A. <u>Design Funding.</u> The County shall appropriate funding for the Joint Master Plan preparation in an amount not to exceed \$50,000.00.
- B. Engage Design Consultant. The County shall engage a design consultant pre-qualified by Wake County Facilities Design & Construction to provide master planning services for the Project, as per the standard Wake County Professional Services Agreement, with any applicable amendments and attachments that may be necessary. In addition, the County may hire other consultants to investigate and evaluate alternative sites that may be researched as part of this process.
- C. <u>Include Town of Morrisville in the Master Plan Process</u>. Wake County will work collaboratively with the Town on the due diligence, site evaluations and preparation of the Master Plan.
- D. <u>Acceptance of Design</u>. The County shall present the Joint Master Plan Project to the Wake County Board of Commissioners, for their review, input, and final approval.

5. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TOWN OF MORRISVILLE

- A. <u>Design Funding</u>. The Town shall appropriate funding for the Joint Master Plan preparation in an amount not to exceed \$20,000.00.
- B. <u>Coordination.</u> To provide staff to work with Design Consultant and County as needed during the Master Plan Process. The Town will be actively involved in reviewing and approving work product submitted by the Design Consultants.
- C. <u>Acceptance of Design</u>. The Town shall present the Joint Master Plan Project to the Town Council, for their review, input, and final approval.

6. ADDITIONAL AGREEMENTS WHICH MAY BE REQUIRED TO BE EXECUTED BY THE PARTIES TO EFFECTUATE PROJECT

- A. Interlocal Agreement defining the responsibilities of the parties based upon a scope of work to be established based on the results of the Joint Master Plan.
- B. Any needed rights of entry, Utilization and Cross Access Agreements as determined to be necessary.
- C. Memoranda of any enumerated document requested by the other party for the purpose of recording in the Wake County Registry. The necessary agreements may be consolidated.

7. CONTEMPLATED SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

- A. Morrisville Town Council authorizes the Town Manager to enter into this Memorandum of Understanding.
- B. The Wake County Board of Commissioners authorizes the County Manager to enter into this Memorandum of Understanding.
- C. The County engages design consultants to complete the Joint Master Plan pursuant to this Agreement.
- D. The Master Planning consultant makes a presentation to the County and the Town for action related to the Joint Master Plan.
- E. The Town and the County staff each determine if it is feasible to proceed with recommending the Joint Master Plan to their respective boards. If a decision is made by either party not to proceed, the events set forth in F through H inclusive shall not occur.
- F. If the decision is made to proceed, the County and the Town prepare, negotiate and finalize the terms of a proposed Interlocal Agreement, the scope of which will be defined based on the results of the referenced Joint Master Plan. The Parties will reach a mutually agreeable solution to the land rights needed for each of their respective needs.
- G. The Town and County seek approval and appropriation of funding from their respective Boards, as appropriate, to enter into the Interlocal Agreement.
- H. The Parties shall proceed upon the terms established by the Interlocal Agreement, which shall provide for the procurement, construction and use of the facilities to be constructed as part of the Project. The Interlocal Agreement shall replace and supersede all previous documents, agreements, and understandings with respect to the subject matter.

<u>Item Title:</u> 2017 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Application

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners authorizes the Wake County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the City of Raleigh, to apply for the 2017 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG).

Item Summary:

The Office of Justice Programs of the US Department of Justice offers funding opportunities by awarding formula grants to support law enforcement activities in state and local jurisdictions and to implement programs that improve the criminal justice system. The 2017 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant is a formula grant program. The County has received funds every year from the Justice Assistance Grant program between 2005 and 2016.

The Wake County Sheriff's Office and the Raleigh Police Department are jointly applying for the 2015 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant. The total grant allocation of \$146,847 has been divided between the two agencies by a disparate agreement providing Wake County \$66,081 and the Raleigh Police Department \$880,766. There is no match requirement for this grant. Funds must be spent by September 30, 2020.

The City of Raleigh and Wake County have a Memorandum of Agreement that outlines each party's participation in and responsibilities under this grant. Pursuant to this agreement, the City of Raleigh, as the lead agency, will receive the proceeds of the grant. Wake County is a sub-recipient of the grant and will invoice the City for its portion of the grant as it is spent.

This Memorandum of Understanding is made and entered into this the ____day of ______, 2017, by and between the CITY OF RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA, (hereinafter referred to collectively as the "Fiscal Agent"), by and through its governing body, City Council and the COUNTY OF WAKE, NORTH CAROLINA (hereinafter referred to as the "Agency") acting by and through its governing body, the Board of Commissioners.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the parties to this Memorandum of Understanding are jointly eligible to receive grant funding in the amount of \$146,847.00 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance JAG Program (hereinafter, the "Program") to combat violence against women, to fight internet crimes against children, to improve the functioning of the criminal justice system, to assist victims of crime, and to support youth mentoring; and,

WHEREAS, the governing body of each party to this Memorandum of Understanding finds that the performance of this Agreement is in the best interests of both parties, that the undertaking will benefit the public, and that the division of costs fairly compensates the performing party for the services or functions under this agreement; and,

WHEREAS, each governing body, in performing governmental functions or in paying for the performance of governmental functions hereunder, shall make that performance or those payments from current revenues legally available to that party; and

WHEREAS, the AGENCY and FISCAL AGENT believe it to be in their best interests to reallocate the JAG funds; and,

WHEREAS, the JAG Award of \$146,847.00 is be allocated jointly to the AGENCY and the FISCAL AGENT and that the total amount of the grant will be deposited with the FISCAL AGENT and that the allocation and disbursement of funds shall be conducted as set forth herein,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE AGENCY AND FISCAL AGENT AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1.

The FISCAL AGENT agrees to pay the AGENCY \$66,081.00 of JAG funds.

Section 2.

AGENCY agrees to use JAG funds (\$66,081.00) for in-car cameras by September 30, 2020.

Section 3.

FISCAL AGENT agrees to use \$80,766.00 for community outreach, youth education and crime prevention, community problem-solving and intelligence-led policing projects by September 30, 2020.

Section 4.

AGENCY may elect to receive disbursement from FISCAL AGENT of the full amount of their respective grant shares prior to expenditure as set forth in Section 2 above. AGENCY electing to receive its advance disbursement hereby agrees to comply with all Program requirements for the maintenance, accounting, and reporting of funds and interest, and shall provide FISCAL AGENT with monthly account information as applicable.

Section 5.

Each party to this Memorandum of Understanding will be responsible for its own actions in providing services under this Memorandum of Understanding and shall not be liable for any civil liability that may arise from the furnishing of the services by the other party.

Section 6.

The parties to this Memorandum of Understanding do not intend for any third party to obtain a right by virtue of this Memorandum of Understanding.

Section 7.

By entering into this Memorandum of Understanding, the parties do not intend to create any obligations express or implied other than those set out herein; further, this Memorandum of Understanding shall not create any rights in any party not a signatory hereto.

Section 8.

The parties to this Memorandum of Understanding acknowledge and agree that any and all performances and obligations set forth herein shall be contingent upon and conditioned upon approval of this Memorandum of Understanding by the governing bodies of all parties and award of funding by the Program in the amounts contemplated herein.

Section 9.

NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT: In consideration of the signing of this Memorandum of Understanding, the parties hereto for themselves, their agents, officials, employees and servants agree not to discriminate in any manner on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, sex, age, handicap, or sexual orientation with reference to the subject matter of this Memorandum of Understanding, no matter how remote. The parties further agree in all respects to conform with the provisions and intent to City of Raleigh Ordinance 1969-889, as amended. This provision is hereby incorporated into this Memorandum of Understanding for the benefit of the City of Raleigh and its residents, and may be enforced by action for specific performance, injunctive relief, or other remedy as by law provided. This provision shall be binding on the successors and assigns of the parties with reference to the subject matter of this Memorandum of Understanding.

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners approves a funding agreement in the amount of \$500,000 with the Town of Fuquay-Varina subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

Item Summary:

In April 2016, the Wake County Board of Commissioners authorized a competitive process to award up to \$3.35 million of "2 for 1" funds available to Wake County as a result of the Interlocal Agreements governing the Occupancy and Prepared Food and Beverage Tax Revenues. In June 2016, 14 proposals were received for consideration by the County. A team of representatives from the Community and Wake County reviewed and scored each proposal. The Board of Commissioners received information regarding each project and subsequent presentations from the top scoring projects. On October 17, 2016 the Board of Commissioners committed funding to seven projects, including \$500,000 for the Town of Fuquay-Varina Fleming Loop Park Project.

County funding for the Fleming Loop Park Project will assist in the development of the 36-acre outdoor multisport complex. The project is planned to include seven lighted full-sized soccer/multisport fields, permanent concession and restroom facilities, an expanded and paved parking area with curb and gutter, an extensive walking trail network, and a playground and picnic area. The total project cost for the athletic complex is \$2,700,000.

Staff has worked with representatives for the project and has developed a funding agreement for Board approval. The key terms of the funding agreement include:

- Provides funding for completion of park development.
- Funding to be provided upon receipt of satisfactory documentation of project completion and readiness for operation.
- Sets project completion date of September 2019.
- Establishes project performance goals to track local and out of county visitors and special events.
- Performance goals expire upon achievement of goals or seven years.
- Defines repayment schedule if facility ceases operation.

The Fuquay Varina Town Board approved the agreement on September 19, 2017.

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

WHEREAS, pursuant to Session Law 1991-594, Wake County authorized a prepared food and beverage tax of up to 1% of the sales price of prepared food and beverages sold at retail; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Session Law 1991-594, Wake County and City of Raleigh subsequently entered an Interlocal Agreement ("ILA") designating funds from the Occupancy and Prepared Food/Beverage Taxes for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, or financing convention centers, civic centers, performing arts centers, coliseums, auditoriums, and facilities related to sports and cultural events; and

WHEREAS, the terms of the ILA and subsequent amendments provide a basis for distribution of funds by the City and County consistent with the enabling legislation; and

WHEREAS, in April 2016 the Wake County Board of Commissioners approved a competitive process open to any non-profit or for-profit organization to allocate up to Three million three hundred fifty thousand and no/100s Dollars (\$3,350,000.00) of the Major Facilities Capital Trust Fund established with hotel/motel and prepared food and beverage taxes and subsequently issued a Request for Proposals ("RFP #16-045") for projects meeting the criteria set forth in the ILA; and

WHEREAS, Town submitted a response to RFP #16-045 on or before June 15, 2016 for the construction of a project described as the Fleming Loop Recreational Park Proposal (the "Park Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Park Project meets all criteria of RFP #16-045; and

WHEREAS, the County selected the Park Project after due consideration of all proposals submitted through the use of a competitive selection process; and

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2016 the Wake County Board of Commissioners authorized a funding commitment to the Town in the requested amount of Five Hundred Thousand and no/100s Dollars (\$500,000.00) ("Funding Commitment") for capital costs related to the construction and development of the Park Project contingent upon the terms and conditions set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, Town has accepted the Funding Commitment for capital costs related to the construction and development of the Park Project contingent upon the terms and conditions set forth herein.;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, County and Town agree as follows:

ARTICLE I SCOPE AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PARK PROJECT

The Park Project shall be located in Fuquay Varina, Wake County, North Carolina. The purpose of the Park Project is to develop 36-acres of Town owned land located at 301 Fleming Loop Road, Fuquay Varina, NC into an outdoor park with multi-purpose fields and amenities to be owned by the Town that will positively impact hotel occupancy and prepared food/beverage sales in Wake County. The park will be managed by Fuquay Varina through its Parks, Recreation and Cultural Resources Department to support local programming and regional and national sports tournaments and special events such as the WRAL Balloon Festival.

The Park Project shall consist of constructing seven full sized multi-purpose lighted fields, a walking trail/path with a length of at least one mile, playground, picnic shelter, storage/maintenance building, improved and paved parking for 320 vehicles with curb, gutter and stormwater management structures. The original Park Project Proposal is attached to this Agreement as **Exhibit "A"** and incorporated by reference.

ARTICLE II PARK PROJECT SCOPE

Town, as Owner of the Park Project, is solely responsible for all Park Project costs, decisions, the preparations of all plans and specifications, and for developing the Park Project in accordance with this Agreement and the incorporated Park Project Proposal. Any comments or suggestions provided by the County, except as otherwise provided by the Agreement, shall be given solely for the purposes of monitoring compliance with the terms of the Agreement, and shall not in any event be construed as a representative or directive regarding the Park Project decision.

ARTICLE III OWNERSHIP of REAL PROPERTY

Town currently owns the 36 acres of real property required to construct the Park Project. Town shall retain full ownership and control of the Project structures, land, equipment, revenues, and any other related land values or profits, unless otherwise expressly provided for in this Agreement. Notwithstanding the provisions of this Section, Town shall be required to notify the County as soon as practicable but in any event within three (3) business days of the execution of a contract for sale of the Park Project or any Phase

of the project; or if there is no contract, if any interest in the Park Project or any phase of the Project is transferred to an owner other than Town.

ARTICLE IV TOTAL FUNDING FOR PARK PROJECT

- A. The total of estimated funding needed for the Park Project is Two Million, Six Hundred Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$2,682,549.00) as set forth in the Town's presentation to the Wake County Board of Commissioners on October 10, 2016. In addition to County committing funding in the amount of \$500,000 pursuant to this Agreement, the Town will provide funding from the following sources:
 - NC Parks and Recreation Trust Fund (PARTF) Grant \$500,000
 - Town Recreation Unit Fees \$1,182,549
 - Capital Area Soccer League (CASL) Facility Use Agreement \$500,000

The County Funding Commitment shall be delivered to Town based on the conditions defined in Article V of this Agreement. The above-listed descriptions of both dollar amounts and funding sources are for illustrative purposes to show the funding required by the Town for the Park Project relative to the County's grant. Nothing herein shall bind the Town to draw specific dollar amounts from any particular funding source as described.

- B. County shall only provide the applicable funding when due and upon satisfaction of conditions as outlined in Article V of this Agreement. Any funds not paid by County to Town under this Funding Agreement shall be returned to the Major Facilities Capital Trust Fund.
- C. The Park Project is under design with construction to be completed within twenty (20) months. County and Town agree that the Park Project shall be completed on or about May 19, 2019(the "Completion Date"). This date is intended to be tentative and Town shall not be subject to any penalties or liquidated damages related to the Completion Date, therefore time is not of the essence with respect to the Completion Date for purposes of this Funding Agreement. Prior to or on the Completion Date, Town may request, and the Wake County Manager may reasonably grant, extensions of time for the completion of the Park Project, subject to the conditions of funding set forth in Section V. Any such extensions of time shall not be unreasonably withheld by the Wake County Manager.
- D. If requested by Town, County agrees to use best efforts to provide additional documentation to evidence the County's Funding Commitment as outlined herein for the purpose of Town financing the Park Project. This includes, but is not limited to, providing a written affirmation of County's contribution to the Park Project. In no event shall the County be required to guarantee any commercial or private loan, or provide any manner of commitment or financing beyond what is set forth in this Agreement.

- E. Town represents that this Park Project shall not require the on-going support of Wake County's general operating funds. Nothing herein shall obligate County to provide operating funds for the Park Project after completion.
- F. County shall not fine or penalize Town in any way, unless specifically permitted in this Agreement.
- G. Town agrees to abide by any review, reporting, or other legal requirements established by state or local law, County resolution, or Interlocal Agreement relating to the use of these funds.

ARTICLE V CONDITIONS OF FUNDING

Subject to Town' performance of the obligations of this Agreement, County shall tender the Funding Commitment in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand and no/100s Dollars (\$500,000.00) for the construction of the Park Project upon the following terms:

- A. The County shall tender the total Funding Commitment of Five Hundred Thousand and no/100s (\$500,000.00) to Town at such time as Town has provided:
 - 1. Satisfactory documentation of total Park Project budget and Town funding commitments at time of funding request.
 - 2. A letter from the Town Manager certifying that all seven multi-purpose fields are operational, including working permanent field lighting for nighttime use, the playground and picnic shelter are complete and a permanent certificate of occupancy has been provided for the concessions/restroom/storage facilities. This letter shall include a copy of the certificate of occupancy and confirmation of all scheduled tournament dates and special events and details of the events.
 - 3. The County reserves the right to conduct a site inspection to verify completion of the Park Project and its individual component field readiness prior to authorizing disbursement of payment to Town.
- B. All requests for disbursement of the Funding Commitment under this section must be made within twenty-four (24) months of the effective date of this Agreement unless the parties have entered into a written agreement for an extension of this date.
- C. If Town does not make a request for disbursement or does not meet the conditions precedent to disbursement under this section such that all or part of the funds committed are not disbursed, then such funds shall remain a part of the Major Facilities Capital Trust Fund free and clear of any further obligation to Town under this Agreement.

ARTICLE VI PERFORMANCE GOALS

Town acknowledges that by accepting the County's Funding Commitment and by signing the Agreement, the Project, is subject to certain Performance Goals as described below in Table 1:

Year of Operation shall be defined as a 12 month period beginning July 1, 2019 or the date of the first Planned Event Day after the completion of the Project, whichever comes sooner.

- a. Performance Reporting. Town shall agree to provide annual reporting to the County Manager including a list of events held at the park with number of Event Days, number of spectators and/or number of teams competing in a sporting event where the members (and spectators for that team) are from outside a 50 mile radius of the facility. Annual performance reporting shall be submitted using attached forms. In the event that the facility performance does not achieve the target event days at the end of each Performance Reporting Period, Town must submit a plan to the County Manager to achieve performance goals. For the purpose of calculating performance goals, any Event Days exceeding the required number in a reporting period may be rolled over and counted towards the performance goals for other reporting periods. For the purpose of calculating performance goals, any target event days exceeding the required number in a reporting period may be rolled over and counted towards the performance goals for other reporting periods.
- b. Expiration Of Performance Goals. After the Park Project has reported seven (7) years of operations or the Total Number of Event Days exceeds the cumulative total of target Event Days, whichever is sooner, the Park Project shall no longer be bound by Performance Goals of any kind and any such provision herein or in the Agreement shall expire.
- c. Good Faith. The Parties agree to enforce and abide by the terms of this agreement in good faith and shall, in addition to Table 1, annual reports, and applicable performance plans, review all reasonable and good faith efforts made by Town to fulfill all Park Project requirements in any evaluation of Performance Goals, and in the event project goals are not met, commit to discuss further mitigation efforts. Furthermore, the Parties hereby agree that Article VIII of the Agreement shall also apply to this MOU and any evaluation of Performance Goals.

ARTICLE VII INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

The parties acknowledge that Town is an independent contractor, and that nothing in this Agreement is intended, and nothing will be construed, to create any form of partnership or joint venture relationship between Town and the County, or to allow either to exercise control or direction over the other; notwithstanding that each party is bound by the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Neither party is an officer, agent, or employee of the other party for any purpose.

ARTICLE VIII LIABILITY FOR DELAY IN PERFORMANCE

Neither party shall be liable to the other, or be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement, for any failure or delay in rendering performance arising out of causes beyond its reasonable control and without its fault or negligence. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or of a public enemy, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, strikes, freight, embargoes, or unusually severe weather. Date or times of performance, including the term of this Agreement or eligibility for funding, may, but are not required, to be extended by the County to the extent of delays excused by this section, provided that the party whose performance is affected notifies the other promptly of the existence and nature of such delay.

ARTICLE IX TERMINATION OF PARK PROJECT PRIOR TO COMPLETION

Should the Park Project or any Phase thereof become terminated prior to completion, Town shall remain the sole owner of the Park Project property, including all land, structures, and equipment. County shall have no funding obligation and no ownership claim to any part of the Park Project unless expressly described in this Agreement.

The County's obligation to fund under this Agreement is not transferrable to any subsequent owner or interest holder of the Park Project or any Phase of the Park Project.

ARTICLE X INTERRUPTION OF PROJECT OPERATION AFTER COMPLETION

Should the Park Project or any part thereof cease to operate at any time after the County has tendered the Funding Commitment but before performance goals are met, and the Town transfers all or part of the property upon which it is located to an owner who does not operate the property for the purpose intended under this Agreement such that the performance goals of the Funding Agreement are frustrated ("Subsequent Operation"), then the Town shall require the new owner to repay the County all or part of the Funding Commitment to the County based on the year of operation in which operation ceases per the schedule below.

Regardless of ownership of the Property, if the property continues in Operation for the purpose intended under this Agreement such that the performance goals of the Funding Agreement are not frustrated, there will be no adjustment required. "Operation" shall be defined as a state of readiness of the Park Project that allows the facility or facilities to be open and ready for intended operations in the ordinary course of business.

ARTICLE XI NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

This Agreement is not intended to and shall not be interpreted to inure to the benefit of any third parties.

ARTICLE XII MODIFICATION

This Agreement may only be modified in writing signed by both Parties; provided that any change in the scope of the Park Project or manner or amount of the payment obligation of the County hereunder shall require approval of the Board of Commissioners.

ARTICLE XIII ASSIGNMENT

Town shall not assign this Agreement, either in whole or in part, without the prior written approval of the County. County shall not assign any of its duties under this Agreement to any private or public agency, corporation, firm, or individual without the prior written approval of Town.

ARTICLE XIV MISCELLANEOUS

1. <u>Notices</u>. All notices or other communications hereunder to Town and the County shall be sufficiently given and shall be deemed to have been received five (5) Business Days after deposit in the United States mail in certified form, postage prepaid, to the County and Town, as the case may be, at the following addresses:

- 2. Severability. In the event any provision in this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.
- 3. <u>Execution</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.
- 4. Applicable Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of North Carolina. Jurisdiction for the resolution of any conflict arising from this Funding Agreement shall lie with the General Court of Justice of the State of North Carolina with venue in Wake County, North Carolina.
- 5. <u>Headings</u>. Paragraph or other headings contained in this Agreement are for reference purposes only and are not intended to affect in any way the meaning or interpretation of the Agreement.

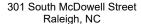

Tax Committee Recommendations for Value Adjustments, Late Filed Applications, Collections Refunds and Tax Collections

That the Board of Commissioners approves the attached recommendations by the Tax Committee

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result
 of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful
 attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the
 audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The
 recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be handdelivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31st of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.





One of the primary functions of Planning, Development and Inspections (PDI) is to protect the public's health, safety, and welfare in the built environment by administering and enforcing the North Carolina Building Code as created by the International Code Council and adopted by the North Carolina Building Code Council.

This program is mandated by the State of North Carolina. All building, electrical, mechanical, and plumbing construction must be permitted and inspected. The North Carolina Building Code and North Carolina General Statues regulate most functions of the inspections division. PDI is charged with permitting and inspections for: 1) the unincorporated area of Wake County; 2) the contracted Towns of Knightdale, Rolesville, Wendell and Zebulon; 3) Wake County Public School System construction and renovation projects in all municipal jurisdictions; 4) Wake County and Wake Technical Community College construction and renovation projects in all municipal jurisdictions except Fuquay-Varina; and 5) Raleigh-Durham International Airport and Research Triangle Park.

Since FY12, workload demands within the Planning, Development and Inspections Division have steadily increased. In FY17, the number of permits and inspections reached levels which have impacted the Division's ability to deliver services to the development community within expected timeframes. Community Services gauges the effectiveness of Wake County's permitting and inspections program through various performance measures. These methods have been in place since 2007 and are effective in evaluating the need for expansions and reductions in this work area.

Plans and Permit Technician

The effectiveness of this service is measured by: 1) maintaining turnaround time of three business days to finalize a permit once all department reviews are complete; and 2) the administration of a quality control program.

There are currently five Plans and Permit Technicians on the Plans and Permit's team - the last addition to this team was in FY15 by an increase of one FTE. These five employees need to maintain an average of 3.0 residential and/or commercial permits per staff per day to keep the turnaround time commitment of three business days to finalize a permit. This commitment is expected by the development community, which is comprised of homebuilders, engineers, surveyors, developers, etc.

The work load demands in recent months are significantly exceeding the maximum average of 3.5 residential and/or commercial permits per staff per day, which is not sustainable. The staff is now struggling with nearly 20% of all permits taking over ten days to finalize and deliver to the customer. Both Community Services and Environmental Services are now receiving complaints from customers about the excessive time that is currently needed to provide permitting services as the workload continues to trend upward.

This request is to add 1.0 FTE (Band 5) to the Plans and Permits team that will allow the team to maintain an average of 3.23 residential and/or commercial permits (below the 3.5 maximum average) per person per day.

The estimated cost of adding 1.0 FTE to the Plans and Permit's team in FY18 is \$38,678 - assuming a December 1, 2017 hiring date. The costs include salary and benefits for seven months, operating costs (salary/benefits, software licensing fees and supplies), and one-time charges (computer and phone). The full year operating cost for the position is \$60,836 and will be included in future operating budgets (beginning FY19 if approved).

General Inspector

The effectiveness of this service is measured by: 1) maintaining customer response of one business day to conduct a requested inspection and conducting plan reviews for contracted municipalities within desired response times (e.g. one day for residential renovations, three days for new residential, five days for commercial); and 2) the administration of a quality control program.

There are currently 17.9 Inspectors on the Area Inspections team. The last addition to this team was in FY15 by an increase of 2.0 FTEs. Area inspectors are expected to maintain an average of 12 inspections per day in order to maintain the one business day response time for requested inspections. Inspectors are now averaging 15 inspections per day, which impacts their ability to maintain the target of one business day response time for requested inspections and complete plan reviews for contracted municipalities. Currently, 91.5% of all inspections are completed within one business day and 84.3% of new residential plan reviews are performed within three business days (each below our 95% target). Delayed response times result in inspections and plan reviews being conducted further out, affecting our overall customer service.

This request is to add 2.0 FTEs (Band 7) to the Area Inspections team that will allow the team to maintain an average of 13.4 inspections per day per inspector; meet the one business day response time for requested inspections; and conduct residential renovation plan reviews within one business day, new residential plan reviews within three business days, and commercial plan reviews within five business days.

The estimated cost of adding 2.0 FTEs to the Area Inspections team in FY18 is \$150,641 - assuming a December 1, 2017 hiring date. The costs include salary and benefits for seven months, operating costs (salary/benefits, software licensing fees and supplies), and one-time charges (vehicle, computer and phone). The full year operating cost for the two positions is \$159,407 and will be included in future operating budgets (beginning FY19 if approved).

Revenue

As a result of the increased workload, revenue from permit fees is also up. Staff is recommending appropriating \$189,319 of additional building permit revenue in the FY 2018 General Fund to establish the three positions requested. The proposed increase in FY 2018 building permit revenue is sufficient to cover the projected costs of the new positions. This request will not require a change to building permit fees.

Staff will continue to evaluate and monitor workloads to determine if additional positions should be requested through the FY19 operating budget process.



Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners approves the proposed Hospitality Tax Small Capital Projects Funding process.

Item Summary:

In 1991, Wake County was authorized by North Carolina Law to levy a room occupancy tax and prepared food and beverage tax for the purposes of supporting a convention center, arena and other cultural, sports and arts activities. These funds are governed through Interlocal Agreements between the Wake County Board of Commissioners and the Raleigh City Council. In 2017, a Small Capital Projects Fund was established to assist in the development of projects throughout Wake County that can impact sports, arts, culture and convention-related activities for visitors and residents. Wake County receives \$2 million annually from the Room Occupancy and Food and Beverage Tax Revenues to support the Small Capital Projects Fund. Wake County intends to distribute these funds through a competitive process every two to three years. All funding decisions must be authorized by the Wake County Board of Commissioners.

The Arts and Culture Committee received a presentation on the proposed competitive process for award of these funds at their September 11, 2017 meeting. The feedback received has been incorporated into the process the Board is now being asked to approve.

Highlights of the process include:

- Approximately \$3.5 million is available for award (from FY2017 and FY2018)
- RFP will be released on October 9, 2017
- Required pre-submittal meeting on November 3, 2017
- Proposals due February 8, 2018
- Minimum criteria include:
 - Project fully located in Wake County
 - Consistent with statutory uses of revenues
 - Capital in nature (minimum value of \$100,000)
 - Maximum County funding of 35% of total project cost
 - Request shall not exceed \$1,500,000 per project
- Proposals will be reviewed by Evaluation Team of County staff and community representatives
- All qualifying proposals will present to the Evaluation Team
- Evaluation team will score proposals and present recommendations to the Board of Commissioners in March/April 2018
- Proposers are not to initiate contact with Commissioners during the RFP Process. Commissioners may initiate contact with proposers.

<u>Item Summary:</u>

<u>Background</u>

Since 1938, the Raleigh-Durham Airport (RDU) has played a central role in the growth of the Research Triangle Region. In 2016, over 11 million people traveled through RDU, passing the 11-million passenger mark for the first time in the airport's history.

As the Triangle region has grown, RDU has undertaken several master planning efforts designed to assess expected growth in airport activity and in the region, gauge existing facilities' ability to meet that future demand and identify development solutions; RDU's latest master plan, Vision 2040, has just recently concluded.

One area of evaluation included in Vision 2040 was the future of RDU land not currently utilized or anticipated for aeronautical use. Included in this evaluation was a portion of the land leased to the County for Lake Crabtree County Park and several tracts between Lake Crabtree County Park and William B. Umstead State Park that have been used without permission for mountain biking. Vision 2040 proposed several different uses for these areas at a schematic level, from continued recreation, office and hotel to industrial, with anticipated revenue from these uses being reinvested into the Airport.

The proposed non-recreational use of this property brought together a number of stakeholders to discuss the possibility of enhanced recreational opportunities on RDU properties and adjacent properties. At the January 23, 2017 work session, the Board of

Commissioners received a presentation describing the situation and a proposal from staff to have the University of North Carolina School of Government's Development Finance Initiative (DFI) provide options for developing recreational facilities on RDU property by identifying partnership opportunities for the County. DFI was established in 2011 to assist communities in achieving their community and economic development goals. DFI presented its Preliminary Feasibility Analysis to the Board of Commissioners at the August 14, 2017 work session.

On September 8, 2017 RDU released a Land Lease Request for Proposals with the goal to "...select the Proposal(s) that best meets the requirements of this Request for Proposals (hereinafter referred to as "RFP") to manage and use the Parcels in a manner that does not negatively affect the use, utility, safety or efficiency of the Airport and to pay at least fair market value for the land lease(s)." The deadline for proposals is October 9, 2017.

Based on the quick turn-around time, the County Manager felt staff did not have ample time to submit a meaningful proposal and stated such to Michael Landguth, President and CEO Raleigh-Durham Airport Authority in a letter dated September 15, 2017.

On September 16, 2017 Mr. Landguth responded requesting clarification on which parcels the County would be interested in leasing and where we are in the process of developing an offer.

The first step to develop a proposal would be to appraise the properties to better understand their value. Once this is done, staff would be in a better position to have the Board consider which (if any) properties to pursue, the cost to lease them, how the properties could be used and a high level estimate of the cost to develop, maintain and operate this facility.

In order to develop a proposal, the County would need a 90 day extension of the Land Request for Proposals so the Board could take action in December. This would also give the County an opportunity to work with the other airport owners and interested stakeholders.



Consideration and Evaluation of Implementing Session Law 2017-188, Civil Penalties for Passing a Stopped School Bus

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA SESSION 2017

SESSION LAW 2017-188 SENATE BILL 55

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE USE OF PHOTOGRAPHIC OR VIDEO EVIDENCE FOR THE CIVIL ENFORCEMENT OF VIOLATIONS FOR PASSING A STOPPED SCHOOL BUS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Article 12 of Chapter 153A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 153A-246. Use of photographs or videos recorded by automated school bus safety cameras.

- (a) <u>Definitions. The following definitions apply in this section:</u>
 - (1) Automated school bus safety camera. As defined in G.S. 115C-242.1.
 - (2) Officials or agents. This term includes a local board of education located within the county or a private vendor contracted with under G.S. 115C-242.1.
 - (3) School bus. As used in G.S. 20-217.
- (b) Civil Enforcement. A county may adopt an ordinance for the civil enforcement of G.S. 20-217 by means of an automated school bus safety camera installed and operated on any school bus located within that county. An ordinance adopted pursuant to this section shall not apply to any violation of G.S. 20-217 that results in injury or death. Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 14-4, in the event that a county adopts an ordinance pursuant to this section, a violation of the ordinance shall not be an infraction. An ordinance authorized by this subsection shall provide all of the following:
 - (1) The notice of the violation shall be given in the form of a citation and shall be received by the registered owner of the vehicle no more than 60 days after the date of the violation.
 - (2) The registered owner of a vehicle shall be responsible for a violation unless the vehicle was, at the time of the violation, in the care, custody, or control of another person or unless the citation was not received by the registered owner within 60 days after the date of the violation.
 - (3) A person wishing to contest a citation shall, within 30 days after receiving the citation, deliver to the officials or agents of the county that issued the citation a written request for a hearing accompanied by an affidavit stating the basis for contesting the citation, including, as applicable:
 - a. The name and address of the person other than the registered owner who had the care, custody, or control of the vehicle.
 - b. A statement that the vehicle involved was stolen at the time of the violation, with a copy of any insurance report or police report supporting this statement.
 - c. A statement that the citation was not received within 60 days after the date of the violation, and a statement of the date on which the citation was received.



- d. A copy of a criminal pleading charging the person with a violation of G.S. 20-217 arising out of the same facts as those for which the citation was issued.
- (4) The citation shall include all of the following:
 - a. The date and time of the violation, the location of the violation, the amount of the civil monetary penalty imposed, and the date by which the civil monetary penalty shall be paid or contested.
 - b. An image taken from the recorded image showing the vehicle involved in the violation.
 - c. A copy of a statement or electronically generated affirmation of a law enforcement officer employed by a law enforcement agency with whom an agreement has been reached pursuant to G.S. 115C-242.1(c) stating that, based upon inspection of the recorded images, the owner's motor vehicle was operated in violation of the ordinance adopted pursuant to this subsection.
 - d. <u>Instructions explaining the manner in which, and the time within which, liability under the citation may be contested pursuant to subdivision (3) of this subsection.</u>
 - e. A warning that failure to pay the civil monetary penalty or to contest liability in a timely manner shall waive any right to contest liability and shall result in a late penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), in addition to the civil monetary penalty.
 - f. In citations issued to the registered owner of the vehicle, a warning that failure to pay the civil monetary penalty or to contest liability in a timely manner shall result in refusal by the Division of Motor Vehicles to register the motor vehicle, in addition to imposition of the civil monetary penalty and late penalty.
- Violations of the ordinance shall be deemed a noncriminal violation for which a civil penalty shall be assessed and for which no points authorized by G.S. 20-16(c) and no insurance points authorized by G.S. 58-36-65 shall be assigned to the registered owner or driver of the vehicle. The amount of such penalty shall be four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the first offense, seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750.00) for the second violation, and one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each subsequent violation of the ordinance.
- (6) If a registered owner provides an affidavit that the vehicle was, at the time of the violation, in the care, custody, or control of another person or company, the identified person or company may be issued a citation complying with the requirements of subdivision (4) of this subsection.
- (7) The citation shall be processed by officials or agents of the county and shall be served by any method permitted for service of process pursuant to G.S. 1A-1, Rule 4 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure, or by first-class mail to the address of the registered owner of the vehicle provided on the motor vehicle registration or, as applicable, to the address of the person identified in an affidavit submitted by the registered owner of the vehicle.
- (8) If the person to whom a citation is issued makes a timely request for a hearing pursuant to subdivision (3) of this subsection, a summons shall be issued by any method permitted for service of process pursuant to G.S. 1A-1, Rule 4 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure, directing the person to appear at the place and time specified in the summons in order to contest the citation at an administrative hearing.

- (9) A citation recipient who, within 30 days after receiving the citation, fails either to pay the civil penalty or to request a hearing to contest the citation shall have waived the right to contest responsibility for the violation and shall be subject to a late penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) in addition to the civil penalty assessed under this subsection.
- (10) The county shall institute a nonjudicial administrative hearing to hear contested citations or penalties issued or assessed under this section. The decision on a contested citation shall be rendered in writing within five days after the hearing and shall be served upon the person contesting the citation by any method permitted for service of process pursuant to G.S. 1A-1, Rule 4 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure. If the decision is adverse to the person contesting the citation, the decision shall contain instructions explaining the manner and the time within which the decision may be appealed pursuant to subdivision (11) of this subsection.
- A person may appeal to the district court division of the General Court of Justice from any adverse decision on a contested citation by filing notice of appeal in the office of the clerk of superior court. Enforcement of an adverse decision shall be stayed pending the outcome of a timely appeal. Except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, appeal shall be in accordance with the procedure set forth in Article 19 of Chapter 7A of the General Statutes applicable to appeals from the magistrate to the district court. For purposes of calculating the time within which any action must be taken to meet procedural requirements of the appeal, the date upon which the person contesting the citation is served with the adverse decision shall be deemed to be the date of entry of judgment.
- (12) In the event a person is charged in a criminal pleading with a violation of G.S. 20-217, all of the following shall apply:
 - a. The charging law enforcement agency shall provide written notice to the county office responsible for processing civil citations pursuant to subdivision (7) of subsection (b) of this section containing the name and address of the person charged with violation of G.S. 20-217 and the date of the violation.
 - b. After receiving notice pursuant to this subdivision that a person has been charged in a criminal pleading with a violation of G.S. 20-217, the county shall not impose a civil penalty against that person arising out of the same facts as those for which the person was charged in the criminal pleading.
 - c. The county shall issue a full refund of any civil penalty payment received from a person who was charged in a criminal pleading with a violation of G.S. 20-217 if the civil penalty arose out of the same facts as those for which that person was charged in the criminal pleading, together with interest at the legal rate as provided by G.S. 24-1 from the date the penalty was paid until the date of refund.
- (13) If a citation is not contested pursuant to subdivision (3) of this subsection, payment of the civil penalty is due within 30 days after receipt of the citation. If the citation is contested, and the result of the administrative hearing held pursuant to subdivision (10) of this subsection is a decision adverse to the citation recipient, then payment is due within 30 days after receipt of the adverse decision, unless the citation recipient appeals the adverse decision pursuant to subdivision (11) of this subsection. If the adverse decision is appealed, and if the final decision on appeal is adverse to

- the citation recipient, then payment of the civil penalty is due within 30 days after the citation recipient receives notice of the final adverse decision on appeal.
- (14) If the registered owner of a motor vehicle who receives a citation fails to pay the civil penalty when due, the Division of Motor Vehicles shall refuse to register the motor vehicle for the owner in accordance with G.S. 20-54(11). The county may establish procedures for providing notice to the Division of Motor Vehicles and for the collection of these penalties and may enforce the penalties by civil action in the nature of debt.
- (15) The county shall provide each law enforcement agency within its jurisdiction with the name and address of the county official to whom written notice of persons charged with violation of G.S. 20-217 should be given pursuant to subdivision (12) of this subsection.
- (c) Notice. An automated school bus safety camera installed on a school bus must be identified by appropriate warning signs conspicuously posted on the school bus. All warning signs shall be consistent with a statewide standard adopted by the State Board of Education in conjunction with local boards of education that install and operate automated school bus safety cameras on their school buses.
 - (d) Application. Nothing in this section shall be construed to do any of the following:
 - (1) Require the installation and operation of automated school bus safety cameras on a school bus.
 - Prohibit the use and admissibility of any photograph or video recorded by an automated school bus safety camera in any criminal proceeding alleging a violation of G.S. 20-217.
 - (3) Prohibit the imposition of penalties, including the assignment of points authorized by G.S. 20-16(c) and insurance points authorized by G.S. 58-36-65, on any registered owner or driver of the vehicle convicted of a misdemeanor or felony violation of G.S. 20-217.
- (e) <u>Criminal Prosecution Encouraged. The General Assembly of North Carolina encourages criminal prosecution for violation of G.S. 20-217 whenever photographs or videos recorded by an automated school bus safety camera provide evidence sufficient to support such prosecution."</u>

SECTION 2. Article 17 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 115C-242.1. Installation and operation of automated school bus safety camera.

- (a) Definition. An "automated school bus safety camera" is a device that is affixed to a school bus, as that term is used in G.S. 20-217, that is synchronized to automatically record photographs or video of a vehicle at the time the vehicle is detected for a violation of (i) G.S. 20-217 or (ii) an ordinance adopted under G.S. 153A-246.
- (b) <u>Installation and Operation. Automated school bus safety cameras may be installed</u> and operated on any school bus operated by a local board of education within a county that has adopted an ordinance under G.S. 153A-246 as follows:
 - (1) A local board of education may install and operate automated school bus safety cameras without contracting with a private vendor.
 - A local board of education may enter into a service contract to install and operate automated school bus safety cameras with a private vendor. Contracts shall be let in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 143-129 applicable to purchases of apparatus, supplies, materials, or equipment. The maximum length of any contract entered into under this subdivision shall be three years. A contract entered into under this subdivision may contain an

- option to renew or extend the contract for only one additional term not to exceed three years.
- (3) Upon request by one or more local boards of education, the State Board of Education shall enter into a contract for a statewide service or contracts for regional services to install and operate automated school bus safety cameras with a private vendor. These contracts shall be let in accordance with the provisions of Article 3 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes.
- (c) Interlocal Agreements. Any local board of education, board of county commissioners, and law enforcement agency may enter into an interlocal agreement pursuant to Part 1 of Article 20 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes that is necessary and proper to effectuate the purpose and intent of this section and G.S. 153A-246. Any agreement entered into pursuant to this subsection may include provisions on cost-sharing and reimbursement to which the local board of education, board of county commissioners, or law enforcement agency freely and voluntarily agree for the purposes of effectuating this section and G.S. 153A-246.
- (d) Evidence in Criminal Proceeding. Any photographs or videos recorded by an automated school bus safety camera that capture a violation of G.S. 20-217 shall also be provided to the investigating law enforcement agency for use as evidence in any proceeding alleging a violation of G.S. 20-217."

SECTION 3. G.S. 20-54 reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-54. Authority for refusing registration or certificate of title.

The Division shall refuse registration or issuance of a certificate of title or any transfer of registration upon any of the following grounds:

(11) The Division has been notified (i) pursuant to G.S. 20-217(g2) that the owner of the vehicle has failed to pay any fine imposed pursuant to G.S. 20-217.G.S. 20-217 or (ii) pursuant to G.S. 153A-246(b)(14) that the owner of the vehicle has failed to pay a civil penalty due under G.S. 153A-246.

SECTION 4. G.S. 20-217 reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-217. Motor vehicles to stop for properly marked and designated school buses in certain instances; evidence of identity of driver.

(h) Automated camera and video recording systems Automated school bus safety cameras, as defined in G.S. 115C-242.1, may be used to detect and prosecute violations of this section. Any photograph or video recorded by a camera or video recording system an automated school bus safety camera shall, if consistent with the North Carolina Rules of Evidence, be admissible as evidence in any proceeding alleging a violation of subsection (a) of this section. Failure to produce a photograph or video recorded by an automated school bus safety camera shall not preclude prosecution under this section."

SECTION 5. A county that adopts an ordinance as provided in G.S. 153A-246, as enacted by this act, shall maintain records of all violations of that ordinance for which a civil penalty is assessed. Upon request, the county shall provide at least five years of those records to the North Carolina Child Fatality Task Force and the North Carolina General Assembly.

SECTION 6. Within 90 days of the enactment of this act, the State Board of Education shall develop a model request for proposals and a model contract that may be used by the local boards of education in letting contracts in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 115C-242.1(b)(2), as enacted by Section 2 of this act. The State Board of Education and the Department of Public Instruction shall provide technical assistance to a local board of education on this process upon a request by the local board.

SECTION 7. Section 3 of this act is effective one year after it becomes law and shall apply to the registration of any motor vehicle whose owner's failure to pay a civil penalty due under G.S. 153A-246 is reported by a county to the Division of Motor Vehicles on or after the effective date of this act. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law. The requirements in G.S. 115C-242.1(b)(2), as enacted by Section 2 of this act, shall not apply to a local board of education that, prior to the effective date of this act, entered into a contract with a private vendor to install and operate automated school bus safety cameras.

SENATE BILL 55: School Bus Cameras/Civil Penalties.

OVERVIEW: S.L. 2017-188 authorizes counties to impose a civil penalty on the owner of a vehicle that is recorded unlawfully passing a stopped school bus by a school bus safety camera, as long as that the driver is not criminally prosecuted and no injury or death occurred. Failure to pay the civil penalty will prevent the owner from registering the vehicle with the Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Counties enacting the ordinance must maintain records of all violations resulting in imposition of a civil penalty and provide them upon request to the North Carolina Child Fatality Task Force and the General Assembly. Local school boards may contract with private vendors to install and operate the school bus safety cameras. The act's vehicle registration provision becomes effective July 25, 2018, and applies to payment delinquencies reported to the DMV on or after that date. The remainder of the act became effective July 25, 2017.

CURRENT LAW:

Passing a stopped school bus is a criminal offense and subjects the offender to a minimum fine of between \$500 and \$2,500 and to potential license revocation. If the fine is not paid, the DMV does not renew the offender's vehicle registration.

BILL ANALYSIS:

Section 1 authorizes a county to adopt an ordinance permitting the issuance of a citation and imposition of a civil penalty for passing a stopped school bus when the violation is detected by the use of automated school bus safety cameras, provided that no injury or death occurred and the owner was not criminally prosecuted. Violation does not result in points being assigned for driver's license or insurance purposes. Buses equipped with the cameras must be so identified by signs complying with a statewide standard adopted by the State Board of Education (SBOE).

Any citation must be processed by officials or agents of the county and served by first-class mail or as provided under Rule 4 of the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure, and must be received by the registered owner of the vehicle within 60 days of the date of violation. To avoid responsibility for the violation the owner must establish that the citation was not timely received or that the vehicle was under someone else's care, custody, or control at the time of the violation.

An owner has 30 days after receiving a citation to request a hearing in writing, supported by an affidavit stating the basis for the challenge. The owner can appeal to district court from any adverse decision resulting from the hearing.

A citation must disclose the date, time and location of the violation, the penalty amount and the due date for payment, a recorded image of the violation, a law enforcement officer's statement that the image depicts a violation, instructions on how to contest the citation, and the consequences of failing to pay the penalty or requesting a hearing within the time required.

A charging law enforcement agency must provide the county with the name and address of anyone criminally charged with passing a stopped school bus and the date of the violation. After receiving the notice, the county is not permitted to impose a civil penalty against that person arising out the same facts as those giving rise to the criminal charge. A county must refund any civil penalty payment it receives from a person who, based on the same facts, is criminally charged for passing a stopped school bus, together with interest at the legal rate from the date of the payment.

The civil penalty is \$400 for the first offense, \$750 for the second offense, and \$1,000 for a subsequent offense. Owners who fail to pay the civil penalty without making a timely request for a hearing must pay an additional late penalty of \$100, and will be deemed to have waived the right to contest liability.

A county must provide notice to the DMV of any registered owner of a motor vehicle who fails to pay a citation when due. Criminal prosecution is encouraged whenever photos or videos recorded by a school bus safety camera provide evidence sufficient to support such prosecution.

Section 2 permits local school boards to install and operate the school bus cameras, or contract with a private vendor to do so. Alternatively, one or more local boards can request the SBOE to enter into a statewide or regional contract with a private vendor to install and operate the cameras. Any such contracts must be let in compliance with State law bidding procedures. A local board, board of county commissioners, and law enforcement agency can enter into an agreement to further the purpose of the ordinance, including an agreement for cost-sharing and reimbursements. Photographs and videos recorded by a school bus safety camera must be provided to investigating law enforcement agencies.

Section 3 prohibits vehicle registration if the DMV has been notified that the owner failed to pay a civil penalty imposed for passing a stopped school bus.

Section 4 provides that criminal prosecution is not precluded by the failure to produce a photograph or video of the violation recorded by a school bus safety camera.

Section 5 requires counties to maintain records of violations of the ordinance for which a civil penalty is assessed and provide them to the North Carolina Child Fatality Task Force and the General Assembly upon request.

Section 6 requires the SBOE to develop a model request for proposals and contract for local board use by October 23, 2017, and to provide technical assistance to any local board requesting such assistance.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Section 3 of this act becomes effective on July 27, 2018, and applies to registration of motor vehicles whose owners' failure to pay the civil penalty is reported to the DMV on or after that date. The remainder of this act became effective on July 27, 2017. The contract requirements in G.S. 115C-242.1(b)(2), as enacted by Section 2 of this act, do not apply to a local board of education that entered into a contract with a private vendor to install and operate school bus safety cameras before July 27, 2017.



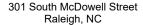


