13. Public Hearing for FY2017-2018 Affordable Housing Action Plan

Ms. Alicia Arnold, Wake County Housing Director, said that the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 Affordable Housing Action Plan is a one-year plan to address the housing and community development needs of low-income families in Wake County. She said the action plan is implemented by the Housing and Community Revitalization (HCR) program of the housing division of the Human Services Department using a combination of federal and local funds. It is the third part of the Fiscal Year 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan approved by the Board of Commissioners in May 2015. The Consolidated Plan defines the housing and community revitalization needs of low-income families in Wake County for five years, 2015-2020.

She said the Action Plan will describe the way the funds will be used and will be submitted to HUD for approval in May 2017. She shared a chart of expected revenues for grants for Fiscal Year 2017-2018 for Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investments Partnership Act, Housing Opportunities for Persons with Aids (HOPWA), Emergency

Solutions Grant (ESG), and Wake County CIP. She shared the priority populations information. She shared information about the programs to assist priority populations that include: preserving existing affordable housing, developing new affordable housing, providing rental assistance and support services, fund public facilities improvements, and offer job training and employment opportunities. She shared the proposed programs and expenditures from each of the funding sources. She shared the next steps.

- February/March, 2017: Writing of the Plan
- April, 2017: 30 day public comment period
- April 27, 2017: Human Services Board for endorsement of the Plan
- May 1,2017: Board of Commissioners for approval of the Plan
- May 15, 2017: Action Plan is due to HUD

Commissioner Ford asked if the communications plan for April 2017 planned to reach out to citizens who may not have the internet. Ms. Arnold said there is advertisement in newspapers and online to be received by mail.

Commissioner Portman asked about changes in the funding of block grants under the new administration, as it relates to funding of block grants. Ms. Arnold said there had not been any changes to date. Commissioner Portman asked if the public comment notification is posted in facilities such as shelters and areas in which citizens live. Ms. Arnold said that it will be published in newspapers, and she could report back to the board as to whether there is advertisement in shelters.

Commissioner West asked about the trend of the federal administration not continuing the committment as in the past. Ms. Arnold said there had not been changes in the funding sources, processes, or planning.

Mr. David Ellis, Deputy Manager, said that HUD has made changes in funding housing units and moved toward vouchers and rapid re-housing.

Commissioner Holmes requested a letter be forwarded to the Legislative Delegation from the Board of Commissioners emphasizing the importance of the funds and advocacy toward increasing the funds for affordable housing.

Chairman Hutchinson opened the public hearing.

Ms. Shauna Overdorf. 939 St. Mary's Street Raleigh, NC, thanked the Board of Commissioners for allowing her the opportunity to speak to the board about homelessness. She shared statistics from HUD. She said there has been a shift from HUD. She said that inventory for

homelessness must be preserved. She said shelters are at 100 percent utilization. Data should determine the units needed. She thanked the Board of Commissioners, County Manager's office, and Human Services Department for their support toward these efforts.

Ms. Bage Shade, Triangle Family Services, 3937 Western Blvd. Raleigh, NC, thanked the Board of Commissioners for the support provided, supporting the families and the sacrifices made for the citizens of Wake County. She shared information about the living wage. She said that service providers want to be a village for the families served. She said there is a lack of affordable housing for families.

Ms. Kayla Rosenburg Straupe, Project Manager, DHIC, 113 S. Wilmington Street, Raleigh, NC, said DHIC has 18 affordable housing developments in Wake County. She said that there are 1215 units of affordable housing in Wake County serving low-income families and seniors. She said that all of the properties are at least 92 percent occupied. She said the wait lists are extensive. She said the rent cost of Willow Creek, in the Town of Cary is geared toward low income earners. She said Penninngton Grove in the Town of Garner will open soon and will provide 83 units of affordable housing. She said that additional development is needed. She spoke of a recent event that was held to assist homeowners with affordable housing.

Ms. Briana Warren, Women's Center of Wake County, Board of Directors, said priority should be placed for affordable development for single women. She asked the board to consider development that is available for affordable housing for single women.

Ms. Debra King, CEO, CASA, 624 W. Jones Street, Raleigh, NC, said that supporting homeless and special needs housing is supported by CASA. She explained that the affordable housing need is not being met in Wake County. She said that CASA partners with the Women's Center and Triangle Family Services. She thanked the Board of Commissioners for their support of affordable housing in Wake County.

Mr. Tim Morgan, Evergreen Construction, 7706 Six Forks Road, thanked the Board of Commissioners that recently attended the Affordable Housing Steering Committee. He said that Evergreen Construction has assisted in developing 17 rental communities for affordable housing. He said Woodspring near the Town of Fuquay-Varina opened in January 2017. He thanked the Board of Commissioners for their past support and ongoing support of affordable housing in Wake County. He said investors are large banks and insurance companies rely on the corporate tax rate of 35 percent. He said that it is unknown to investors whether the rate will remain the same. He said he is working with the Congressional Districts and the Housing Finance Agency to arrange a

tour of an affordable housing property.

Ms. Burnetta Smith, CEO, Wake County Housing Authority, 2140 Pace Farm Road Wendell, NC, said there are 345 public housing units that cover the Town of Apex, Town of Garner, Town of Fuquay-Varina, Town of Wake Forest, Town of Zebulon, and Town of Wendell. She said the Wake County Housing Authority administers the Housing Choice voucher program. She said the largest volume of vouchers are designated for veterans. She said there is a need for housing in Wake County and the Section 8 waiting list has not been open since 2009. She said that there is a new development in the Town of Garner owned by the Housing Authority that will serve the need for affordable housing.

Mayor Frank Eagles, Town of Rolesville, said that the town endorses the affordable housing plan. He said workforce housing is needed. He said the teachers in Rolesville are not moving to the town because of the housing cost. He spoke about 13 acres of surplus property in the Town of Rolesville that the Board of Education purchased that could be used for affordable housing. He said female veterans are one of the largest growing populations.

Chairman Hutchinson closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Burns complimented Ms. King for her work and said that he looks forward to the final product.

Commissioner Holmes thanked the members of the Affordable Housing Steering Committee for attending today's meeting and said that their presence matters for standing true to the mission and addressing the need of affordable housing.

Commissioner Portman said that he is looking forward to the work of the Affordable Housing Steering Committee. He said it is important to quantify the return, capture the cost, and support the political support across the spectrum.

Commissioner West said federal funds will not fully meet the affordable housing need. He said there was a mix of needs across Wake County. He said that at the Affordable Housing Steering Committee there was feedback from the citizens about the affordable housing needs including citizen engagement.

Chairman Hutchinson commended those present at the meeting that support affordable housing. He thanked staff, Ms. Regina Petteway, Human Services Director, and Ms. Annemarie Maiorano, Human Services Deputy Director, for their work toward affordable housing. He also commended Commissioner Holmes and her vision toward

affordable housing in making it a priority. He said a financial argument must be made about the cost savings to find housing for those in need and to find a solution to homelessness.

14. Approval of Wake County's 2017 State Legislative Goals and NCACC Legislative Goals

Mr. Chris Dillon, Intergovernmental Relations Manager, said the county commissioners discussed the draft Wake County 2017 Legislative goals at the January 23, 2017 Work Session. Wake County's 2017 local legislative goals include:

- Prevent the relaxation of environmental protections for drinking water supplies
- 2. Increase access to healthcare for County residents through Medicaid expansion or similar alternatives
- 3. Improve economic development and social vitality through the repeal of HB2

Additionally, the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) met on January 12 and 13 to approve their 2017-2018 Legislative Goals. Included in the NCACC Legislative Goals were specific items requested by the Wake County Board of Commissioners, including:

- GG-1: Support increased state funding for transportation construction and maintenance needs, and support legislation to ensure that the STI funding formula recognizes that one size does not fit all and that projects in both rural and urban areas are prioritized and funded.
- GG-2: Seek legislation to authorize counties to require HOAs or developers to post maintenance bonds for publicly dedicated subdivision roads, require DOT to expedite acceptance of subdivision roads into the state road system, and implement a statewide approach to maintaining pre-subdivision ordinance roads.
- GG-3: Seek legislation, funding, and other efforts to expand digital infrastructure/broadband capability to the un-served and under-served areas of the state.
- HHS-1: Support increased state funding for behavioral health services and facilities at the state and local level, including dedicated resources for community paramedicine projects.
 Support Medicaid reimbursement to EMS for behavioral health transport to crisis centers and structure appropriate county

- participation in behavioral health program governance.
- JPS-2: Support increased state funding for NC courts, including reinstating funding for drug treatment court.
- PE-3: Support legislation to provide for an overall increase of funding based on average daily memberships outside of the current formula system.
- TF-1: Support efforts to preserve and expand the existing local revenue base of counties, and oppose efforts to divert to the state fees or taxes currently allocated to the counties to the state. Oppose efforts to erode existing County revenue streams and authorize local option revenue sources already given to any other jurisdiction.

The Commissioners are asked to approve Wake County's 2016 State Legislative Goals and endorse the goals identified in the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners 2017-2018 Legislative Goals.

Commissioner West asked if the Board of Commissioners are scheduled to meet with the Wake County Delegation. Mr. Dillon said there will be a meeting scheduled in the coming weeks with the Senate and House representatives. Commissioner West asked if the there would be opportunity at the 2017 NACo Legislative Conference in Washington D.C. to meet with Wake Delegation members. Mr. Dillon said that there would be meetings at the upcoming conference.

Commissioner Burns said that the Alliance Behavioral Health Board would be circulating a letter and asking the legislature to consider restoring the cuts made to the CMOs for Medicaid behavioral health services. He asked whether this could be added to the state goals for approval. Mr. Dillon said that the Board of Commissioners has included this in the request for the 2017 Legislative Goals.

Commissioner Holmes said she is pleased that the NCACC has focused on the "Raise the Age" initiative. She said that North Carolina is one of two states in the entire country that charges youth as adults in the prison pipe line.

Commissioner Portman asked for clarification of the goal PE-3 "Support Legislation to provide for an overall increase of funding based on average daily memberships outside of the current formula system" and whether this is education funding. Mr. Dillon said this is education funding and clarifies that additional funding from the state is distributed across the state per average daily membership (ADM). Wake County receives one third compared to other counties on an ADM basis for distribution of state-wide funding.

Commissioner Ford moved, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, that

the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Approve Wake County's 2017 State Legislative Goals; and
- 2. Endorse the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners 2017-2018 Legislative Goals The motion passed unanimously.

According to the American Heart Association, heart disease remains the #1 killer of U.S. women, affecting more than one in three. The risk factors for heart disease include: smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol, overweight/obesity, physical inactivity, diabetes, age and a family history of heart disease. In Wake County, from 2011-2015, heart disease caused 18.6% (2,318) of all female deaths; in North Carolina, the rate was slightly higher at 19.7% (41,527) of all female deaths. Women's health remains a priority for families, communities, and government. Our commitment to keeping women healthy is stronger than ever.

Throughout the month, the Health Promotion Chronic Disease Prevention Section will sponsor several activities in partnership with the American Heart Association and Wake County EMS. They include a community blood pressure screening with hands only CPR training at three Wake County EMS stations; a free community Fitness Night promoting the benefits of exercise; assisting two Wake County parks in "Going Red" for the month along with facilitating walks on two park trails. We will also be partnering with Wake County Wellness to encourage staff to wear red and walk on February 3 (Go Red Day). 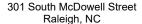

Tax Committee Recommendations for Value Adjustments, Late Filed Applications, Collections Refunds and Tax Collections

That the Board of Commissioners approves the attached recommendations by the Tax Committee

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result
 of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful
 attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the
 audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The
 recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions
 as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is
 clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be handdelivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for
 which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31st of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.

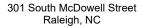

Item Summary:

The FY 2017-2018 Affordable Housing Action Plan is a one-year plan to address the housing and community development needs of low-income families in Wake County. The Action Plan is implemented by the Housing and Community Revitalization (HCR) program of the Housing Division of the Human Services Department using a combination of federal and local funds. It is the third part of the FY 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan approved by the Board of Commissioners in May 2015. The Consolidated Plan defines the housing and community revitalization needs of low-income families in Wake County for five years, 2015-2020. The 2017 Action Plan describes how HCR will use its grant funds to address these needs in the next year from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018. Public comments will be considered as staff prepares the plan. The Action Plan will be submitted to the Human Services Board for endorsement in April, and then to the Board of Commissioners for approval in May, 2017. It must be sent to the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) by May 15, 2017.

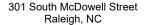

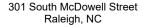
