Ms. Sonya Reid, Program Manager, Wake County Human Services, introduced Ms. Emmeline Madsen, Director of Cancer Outreach and Support Services, UNC Rex. She said the county partners with UNC Rex to provide services to those in need.

She recognized stakeholders present, which included members of the Wake County Human Services Breast Health Team, UNC Rex, and the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

Ms. Reid said one in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime. She said breast cancer is the second deadliest cancer among women in the United States. She said that breast cancer affects men as well as women.

Ms. Madsen said that UNC Rex has a long-standing relationship with Wake County Human Services for care of low income clients. The Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program assists with diagnosis, needs, and care for underserved women. She said the nurse navigation team can assist these women with finding the resources necessary to receive treatment. She said they provide assistance in eliminating barriers to treatment for these women. She said there is collaboration with patients to receive lifesaving treatment.

Chair Holmes asked individuals in support of raising awareness for breast cancer to stand together for the reading of the Proclamation. She said the issue is pressing in the country.

### **Public Comments**

Ms. Brenda Buchanan, 1018 Dominion Oak Circle, Cary, NC, said that she is a member of the Wake County Commission for Women and is supportive of a Homeless Shelter for Women. She recanted a story from a homeless woman that she encountered during Hurricane Florence.

Ms. Jennifer Shewmaker, 1516 Gracie Girl Way, Wake Forest, NC, thanked the Board of Commissioners for increasing the per pupil spending for the students in Wake County Public Schools. She said that school safety is top priority and expressed her concern about safety at Jones Dairy Elementary. She said that she supports the upcoming bonds. She asked the board to provide more funding for school security.

Ms. Addie Ries, 3533 Trawden Drive, Wake Forest, NC, asked for the Board of Commissioners to look at the security needs at Jones Dairy Elementary. She encouraged the board to look at the threats that have taken place. She said Jones Dairy Elementary has a specific need and asked the board to provide additional funding for school security. She

encouraged the board to complete a security assessment on Jones Dairy Elementary.

Ms. Chanel Harris, 623 Carolina Avenue, Raleigh, NC, said that she supports the arts in education for the community and bringing additional grants to the area.

Ms. Erin Parks, 5824 Springflow Circle, Wake Forest, NC, expressed her concern about the security at Jones Dairy Elementary. She asked for an armed guard at the door of the school and a vestibule to allow for a two door entry.

Mr. David Blackwelder, 213 Cottesbrook Drive, Wake Forest, NC, shared his concern about school security and asked the board to consider public/private partnerships in order to develop cost savings.

Mr. Steve Rao, 128 Gratiot Drive, Morrisville, NC, thanked the board for funding affordable housing. He shared information about the recent Cricket activities taking place in the Town of Morrisville. He thanked the board for their support of the activities for the town.

Mr. Jeff Patterson, 1225 Heritage Heights Lane, Wake Forest, NC, thanked the Commissioners for their support of education. He said that the children at Jones Dairy Elementary have received death threats. He said that security is important and encouraged the board to increase security at all Wake County schools.

Ms. Shannon Beach, 1541 Lindenberg Square, Wake Forest, NC, thanked the board for supporting the school's budget. She asked for continued support of mental health services for children and adults in the county. She noted that she has a son attending Jones Dairy Elementary. She asked the board to fund an armed guard, modify the school building entrance vestibule with two layers of security, and classroom doors that can be locked from the inside. She asked the board to reallocate funds to the schools for security upgrades.

Commissioner Burns said the Board of Commissioners provide funding to the schools, but it is up to the Board of Education to allocate the funds. He asked the County Manager if the Board of Education has made a request for additional funding from the county.

Mr. David Ellis, County Manager, said that the Board of Education has not requested funds to be moved. He said the Board of Education is aware of the situation and said he would speak with Ms. Kathy Moore, Superintendent, Wake County Public Schools, to see if there is anything the county can do to help.

Chair Holmes said the county is not authorized to re-allocate Board of Education funds within the school budget. She said the concerns have been heard and will be addressed. She said if a request is received from the Board of Education, it will be considered. She said the Board of Education is working closely with the Sheriff's department regarding this issue.

Commissioner Calabria asked for a summary from the Wake County Board of Education on what has been done toward security and what, if anything, the County can do to help. Mr. Ellis said he would provide that information to the board as soon as he receives it.

Commissioner Portman expressed concern about a lack of a plan for a security. He asked for an estimate of what each item would cost and what the Board of Education priorities are.

Chair Holmes asked for the Manager to place school security on the agenda of the next joint meeting with the Board of Education.

Ms. Shewmaker clarified that the request is for an independent security assessment of Jones Dairy Elementary.

Commissioner Ford said that there is a bond question on the ballot that will support school security.

**10.** Affordable Housing Funding Request from Urban Ministries of Wake County for the Acquisition and Rehabilitation of a Women's Shelter

Ms. Alicia Arnold, Human Services Division Director, shared that the Board of Commissioners has consistently supported policies to encourage business development in areas of the county. She said that since 2014, there has been a need for a shelter to accommodate single women with no children, which this project will do. She shared information about the history of shelter projects.

 Between 2014 and 2016, shelter utilization data of more than 900 women annually suggested a need for increased capacity for unaccompanied (single) women

- In calendar year 2016, Triangle Family Services' Coordinated Intake Call Center logged 571 calls requesting emergency shelter for single women, averaging 48 calls monthly
- The 2018 Point-in-Time Count showed 31 unsheltered single women, an increase from 26 the previous year

Ms. Arnold commended Ms. Annemarie Maiorano, Human Services Deputy Director, for her work toward the Business Development Policy.

Ms. Arnold shared a chart of the sources of funding.

- Capital Financing: \$2,399,967
  - The capital funding source will be CIP Housing Reserve for Future Projects
- Operating Funding: \$301,125
  - The County provides \$133,915 to achieve successful housing outcomes through the operation of Helen Wright
  - Urban Ministries requests an increase of \$167,210 in this operating funding for the additional 37 beds

She shared the takeaways for the project.

- Relocates women's shelter program from Helen Wright
   Center for Women at 401 Cabarrus St, Raleigh to new facility
   at 3603 Bastion Ln, Raleigh approximately 5 miles away
- Project will increase single women shelter capacity by 37 beds with space for additional 20+ mats during White Flag
- Builds upon existing partnership between County and Urban Ministries for sheltering of single women which cost the County 32% less annually
- Addresses Social and Economic Vitality Board Goal and FY 2019 Budget Initiative

Ms. Arnold recognized Dr. Peter Morris, Director, Urban Ministries. Mr. Morris said he is delighted to partner with the county on this project.

Commissioner West asked about the previous use of the facility. Ms. Arnold said that the previous use was a strip mall with various shops.

Dr. Morris said the City of Raleigh obtained a special use permit and this will be the first shelter of its kind and design.

Commissioner Portman thanked Urban Ministries for the innovative approach for capacity. He asked Mr. Ellis if the additional funding is in the budget. Mr. Ellis confirmed that it is.

Commissioner West commended the project.

Commissioner Burns commended Ms. Annemarie Maiorano, Human Services Deputy Director, and her efforts and said that a women's shelter has been a long-time vision of the board. He said the level of service is exciting and this service has been needed for some time.

Commissioner Calabria thanked everyone involved and echoed other board member's comments. He said that the project has been a priority of the commission and he is excited to see it moving forward.

Commissioner Ford said that the project has been an initiative of the board. He thanked Dr. Morris, community partners, and staff for their work. He said equity and parity are necessary in terms of men's and women's needs. He said that Bastion Lane is the location of the new shelter and the meaning of the word Bastion is "fortification or defensive institution, place or person strongly defending or upholding particularly stringent principals, attitudes, or activities."

Commissioner West said that there is hope tied to the word. He quoted Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. "The poor should not be maintained, they should be transformed."

Chair Holmes thanked Ms. Arnold, Ms. Maiorano and Ms. Regina Petteway, Human Services Director, for their work. She said this project was a vision for former Commissioners Betty Lou Ward and Caroline Sullivan. She said the vote today will be a step in the right direction in addressing the county's inequity as it relates to the homelessness of single men and single women.

Chair Holmes thanked the Wake County Women's Commission for their support of the project.

Chair Holmes moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Authorize the County Manager to approve a funding agreement for a grant of up to \$2,399,967 in County CIP funds to Urban Ministries of Wake County (Urban Ministries) for the acquisition and rehabilitation of a property in Raleigh, NC to be used as a homeless shelter for women, subject to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.
- 2. Reallocate \$2,399,967 from the Housing CIP Reserve for Future Projects to Urban Ministries Grant for Women's Shelter project.

Awards are contingent upon the basic terms as identified in the project descriptions, including funding commitments from the financial partners as identified, and upon the project receiving local approvals including site plan approval and all the necessary permits from the local municipality The motion carried by the following vote:

11. Update of Wake County Business Development Policy

Mr. Chris Dillon, Assistant County Manager, shared the background on vulnerable communities.

- Board of Commissioners goal of "Social and Economic Vitality"
- Some communities not growing as fast as others
- County staff created the Wake County Vulnerabilities Index
  - Unemployment
  - Age Dependency
  - Low Educational Attainment
  - Housing Vacancy
  - Below Poverty Level

He said RTI completed a vulnerability study and staff used that information to create a map of the vulnerable and newly expanding areas in Wake County.

Mr. Michael Haley, Director of Economic Development, Greater Raleigh Chamber of Commerce, thanked the Board of Commissioners for their leadership. He shared overlays of the communities where land is available for industrial sites. He said this information is important in identifying potential areas for economic development. He said that Greenfield Park North, Garner has great potential for economic development and this policy will allow resources to be used to continue economic development in that area.

Mr. Dillon said that since the Board of Commissioners' Work Session in April, there has been a proposed targeted growth area for the communities. He shared a chart of the targeted growth area tier. He said that the Town of Zebulon is looking at a new incentive model as a result of this study.

He shared the staff recommendations.

- Board of Commissioners amends the Wake County Business
   Development Grant Policy to include the recommended "Targeted Growth Areas / Vulnerable Communities Tier"
- "Targeted Growth Areas / Vulnerable Communities Tier" does not require any state participation
- Tier does require some local municipal participation

Commissioner Calabria commended the opportunity and initiative. He acknowledged Ms. Amanda Zink, former intern and UNC student, who prepared research for incentives in Wake County. He commended Mr. Danya Perry, Equitable Economic Development Director, for his work on this project. He said the City of Austin has a bonus points program for recruiting companies and encouraged the county to follow these types of incentives. He said that policies are needed for high end companies and for the lower income population.

Commissioner West said that when he joined the board, there was a committee formed on social and economic vitality and discussion about a Human Services model. He said there is an economic development strategy with the proposal. He shared a story about a citizen that approached him about starting a business and said that making a greater community should be a goal.

Commissioner Portman acknowledged the business owners who do not request an incentive. He charged the board to present the merits first and respond to questions with the policy as opposed to leading with the policy. He said that including municipalities is important and asked if the municipalities are all in agreement with this revision.

Mr. Dillon said that most of the municipalities have economic development policies and this policy is encouraging the municipalities to partner with the county. He said the municipalities are very receptive to the revision of the policy.

Commissioner West commended Ms. Petteway and Ms. Katherine Williams, Director, Wake County Extension Services, for leading these efforts.

Ms. Annemarie Maiorano, Human Services Deputy Director, said that some grant programs require funding plans and a public hearing to allow citizen input on services. The Community Transportation Program (CTP) has these pre-approval requirements.

She shared the services provided by the GoWake Access Transportation

Program.

- Non-Emergency Medicaid: Medicaid recipients receive transportation to and from medical appointments. This is a mandated service.
- Elderly and Disabled: A grant to provide operating assistance for the transportation of the state's elderly and disabled citizens.
- Employment: A grant to provide services to those who have transitioned off Work First or Temporary Assistance to Needy Families in the previous 12 months. Funds can also be used by the members of the general public to travel to work, and employment related services.
- Rural General Public: A grant to provide transportation services for individuals from the County who do not have a human service agency or organization that will pay for transportation service. The passenger's origin or destination must be in a rural area.

Ms. Maiorano said the grant is used to purchase vans as well as cover administrative costs of the program.

Chair Holmes asked why the award amount was down in Fiscal Years 2017 and 2018. Ms. Maiorano said that is due to the number of vans requested in those years.

Commissioner Portman asked if these funds cover the entire operating cost of the program.

Ms. Anita Davis, Transportation Program Manager, Wake County Human Services, said the CTP grant covers administrative and capital costs but there is another grant that covers the cost of the trips.

Ms. Maiorano said nearly one half of the \$6.4 million transportation budget comes from Medicaid and those trips are needed to keep the cost affordable.

Commissioner Calabria asked if this replaced the TRACS Program. Ms. Maiorano said that it is similar to the TRACS Program.

Commissioner Calabria asked about the ROAP funding, which is provided by the state. Ms. Davis said that rural and urban funding qualifications changed, and the funding was decreased from \$300,000 to approximately \$90.000.

Commissioner Calabria said that demand is greater than supply. He said the community is paying the cost for the decrease in state funding. He commended staff for their work on this program and encouraged staff to continue to seek funding for these services.

Commissioner Portman said the cost of operating the current services should be evaluated to ensure it is the most cost-efficient means of providing these services.

Chair Holmes asked for clarification of transportation services that are offered versus utilizing Uber and Lyft services. Ms. Davis said that the Uber and Lyft vehicles are typically not equipped to handle the needs of the elderly and disabled. She said since the program is federally funded, there are strict guidelines that must be followed to receive the funding. She said drivers for the county program must go through extensive training and testing.

Commissioner Burns said that the county should always evaluate the cost of services to ensure cost effectiveness.

Mr. Ellis said if Medicare funding does not continue, it will have impacts on the countys ability to provide these services.

Commissioner Calabria said that Wake County contracts to provide these services and there are logistical barriers. He asked if staff encounters problems with maintaining the cycle of the vehicles. Ms. Davis said that vehicles have a life cycle of 115,000 miles. She said the state requires documentation for the use of these vehicles. She said vehicles are ordered and received in the same year.

Chair Holmes noted that Uber Eats may be a possibility for delivery of food to the vulnerable population.

Chair Holmes opened the public hearing.

No one came forward.

Chair Holmes closed the public hearing.

Mr. Chris Snow, Wake County Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Director, shared the purpose of the Open Space Preservation Program. He said to date, the county has protected 6,360 acres through partnership. He shared the information about the Beaverdam Lake/Smith Creek Open Space Partnership.

Mr. Snow said staff recommended funding of \$100,000, which was based on paying the proposed per acre price of \$7,436 for the approximately 13 acres of land in Wake County. This was because the County has traditionally not purchased property outside of Wake County. However, at the August 2015 work session, the Board suggested funding in the amount of \$250,000 which was the amount requested by The Conservation Fund (TCF) and the City of Raleigh. Staff notified TCF so they could finalize the acquisition but the acquisition was put on hold while the TCF awaited word on a North Carolina Clean Water Management Trust Fund grant for the project. The State eventually approved the grant, but at a lower funding amount than TCF requested. As a result, the City of Raleigh and TCF proposed a restructured funding request for Wake County's consideration.

Mr. Snow shared the Smith Creek Open Space Partnership - Current Request Summary

- •\$1.3 M request (16%)
- •1,083 acres of forest and streams that buffer Falls Lake
- •Falls Lake is Raleigh's primary drinking water supply
- •Source of County's funding is the Little River Reimbursement funds
- •Reimbursement for land acquisition of the future Little River Reservoir
- •Restricted by Inter-Local Agreement \$3.6 M balance
- •Tar River Land Conservancy -own and manage long term
- State and Granville County will hold conservation easements

Vice-Chair Hutchinson said that the water is split between Granville and Wake County and 7,500 acres, if approved, will be protected. He said the protection of water quality is valuable. He asked for elaboration of recreational opportunities.

Mr. Snow said public access has been discussed and final plans have not been made.

Commissioner Ford asked for explanation of the staff recommendation and the funding number change over the years for the project. Mr. Snow said originally staff was not prepared to address the land acquisition. He said that staff believes the project is worth while. Mr. Snow said the price per acre was outstanding.

Commissioner Burns said that water resource protection is always considered. He said that the Wake County Water Partnership has provided great information toward these efforts. He said pollution by sedimentation is always of concern. He said that Beaver Dam is the cleanest arm of the lake. Mr. Snow said he could confirm this information. Commissioner Burns thanked staff for their efforts.

Commissioner Portman said Wake County said that Wake County is one of the second fastest growing counties in the country, does not have a 50 year water supply, and is impaired by the EPA. He said that the state has avoided adoption of the Lake Jordan rules.

Commissioner West asked about the results of the water quality if it was owned by the county. Mr. Snow said he was unsure of the potential development since it is owned by Creedmor Investments LLC. Commissioner West challenged the board to look at other funding opportunities in a similar fashion.

Commissioner Burns echoed Commissioner West's comments and said there is a dedicated source for funding for the Smith Creek Project. He suggested staff should look at other dedicated sources of funding for other projects. He said this project is not a case of misplaced priorities.

Commissioner Portman said that Commissioner West's concerns are valid and the upcoming retreat of the Board of Commissioners will assist with addressing concerns in other areas.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson moved, seconded by Commissioner Burns, that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Approve and authorize the County Manager to sign a funding agreement with the City of Raleigh (City) for the acquisition of 1,083 acres of open space on Smith Creek in Granville County pursuant to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney;
- 2. Appropriate \$1,300,000 in open space funds from the Little River Reimbursement Fund for the acquisition, subject to terms and conditions of the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Raleigh for said funds; and

- 3. Approve and authorize County staff to negotiate conservation agreements with other stakeholders that will ensure the property will be maintained for conservation purposes in perpetuity pursuant to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. The motion passed unanimously.





#### OPERATING BUDGET ORDINANCE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Board of County Commissioners of Wake County, North Carolina, that the following budget ordinance for the General Fund is hereby adopted:

**Section 1: TAX LEVY.** There is hereby levied a tax at the rate of sixty-five and forty-four hundredths cents (65.44¢) per one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of property that is located within Wake County and listed for taxes as of January 1, 2018. The revenue from this source is included in real, personal and public service property in "Ad Valorem Taxes" in Section 2 of this Ordinance.

This rate is based on estimated valuation of property, for the purpose of taxation of: (1) 100% of total assessed property tax value of real, personal and public service valuation of one hundred thirty-six billion, seven hundred twenty-five million (\$136,725,000,000) and an estimated collection rate of 99.65%; and (2) 100% of total assessed property tax value of vehicle valuation of eleven billion (\$11,000,000,000) and an estimated collection rate of 99.50%.

The Revenue Director of Wake County is hereby authorized, empowered, and commanded to collect the taxes set forth in the tax records filed in the office of the Wake County Revenue Department in the amounts and from the taxpayers likewise therein set forth. Such taxes are hereby declared to be a first lien upon all real property of the respective taxpayers in the County of Wake, and this order shall be a full and sufficient authority to direct, require, and enable the Revenue Director to levy on and sell any real or personal property of such taxpayers, with or without the assistance of the Wake County Sheriff, for and on account thereof, in accordance with law.

**Section 2: GENERAL FUND REVENUES.** (A) It is estimated that the following revenues will be available in the General Fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2018 and ending June 30, 2019:

**Section 2(B):** Thirty percent (30%) of the proceeds from the local half-cent sales and use tax authorized July 1, 1984 under authority of Article 40 of the North Carolina General Statutes and sixty percent (60%) of the local half-cent sales and use tax authorized October 1, 1986 under the authority of Article 42 of the North Carolina General Statutes are hereby declared to be included in the appropriation for school capital outlay, capital projects, and/or school debt service.

**Section 4: WCPSS APPROPRIATION.** (A) **Purpose and Function.** The appropriation to the Wake County Public Schools System (WCPSS) is hereby allocated by purpose and function as defined by NCGS 115C-426 and as authorized by NCGS 115C-429(b).

**Section 4(B): ACTUAL ENROLLMENT RESERVE.** A reserve is hereby established in Non-Departmental of \$5,404,578 to hold back an appropriation amount equal to \$2,702.29 per pupil times 2,000 students. The per pupil funding is based upon an estimated appropriation of \$438,654,536 which excludes estimated payments to charter schools of \$37,256,464, divided by projected WCPSS enrollment of 162,327. Upon determination of the actual 40<sup>th</sup> day WCPSS enrollment numbers reported to the state and the Charter enrollment as of the same period, the WCPSS appropriation will be recalculated based on the actual enrollment counts and an item brought forward to the Board of Commissioners for purposes of determining of setting the final FY 2019 appropriation for WCPSS.

**Section 4(C): SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING RESERVE.** A reserve is hereby established of \$2,000,000 in Non-Departmental as a hold back of WCPSS appropriation. Appropriation of the reserve is contingent upon the Board of Education taking formal action to utilize the \$2,000,000 to increase the funding for school support for social emotional learning of students as described on page 150 of the Board of Education Proposed Budget. Following an action taken by the Board of Education, the County, by action of the Board of Commissioners, will appropriate the \$2,000,000 as a recurring increase in WCPSS appropriation.

**Section 4(D): WCPSS AMENDMENT NOTIFICATION.** The Wake County Board of Education will notify the Board of Commissioners of amendments to the WCPSS budget. For amendments which would increase or decrease the amount of the County appropriation allocated to a purpose and function by more than fifteen percent (15%) of the adopted appropriation the WCPSS will notify the Board of Commissioners at a public meeting of the Board of Commissioners.

**Section 5: RESEARCH TRIANGLE PARK.** There is hereby levied a tax at the rate shown below, per one hundred dollars (\$100) valuation of property listed for taxes as of January 1, 2018, located within the Wake County portion of the Durham-Wake Counties Research Triangle Park Research and Production Service District for the raising of revenue for said district. The estimated total of valuation of property for the special district for the purpose of taxation is as follows:

There is hereby appropriated to the Durham-Wake Counties Research Triangle Park Research and Production Service District from the net proceeds of this tax the amount for use by said district in such manner and for such expenditures as is permitted by law from the net proceeds of this tax, including a tax collection rate of two-tenths of one percent to be paid to Wake County for collecting the tax. The anticipated revenue from this tax rate is \$1,187,675. The actual net proceeds from the tax shall constitute the appropriation from said tax levy.

**Section 6: AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER APPROPRIATION.** The County Manager, or his designee, is hereby authorized to transfer appropriations within a Fund as contained herein under the following conditions:

- A) He may transfer amounts between appropriations within the same Fund. For transfers exceeding \$75,000 he shall make a report of the transfer to the Board of Commissioners at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board following the transfer.
- B) He may transfer amounts from the salary and benefits reserve to individual departmental appropriations following adoption of the budget in order to properly fund salary and benefit amounts within departments.

**Section 7: AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE CONTRACTS.** The County Manager, or his designee, is hereby authorized to execute contractual documents under the following conditions:

- A) He may execute contracts for construction or repair projects that do not require formal competitive bid procedures.
- B) He may execute contracts for: (1) purchases of apparatus, supplies, and materials, or equipment which are within budgeted appropriations; (2) leases of personal property for a duration of one year or less and within departmental appropriations; (3) lease of personal property for more than 12 months if the annual expense is less than \$50,000; and (4) service contracts within appropriations or contracts for 12 months or less.
- C) He may execute grant agreements to or from governmental units and other public, private, and non-profit organizations that are within budgeted appropriations, unless a grantor requires approval and execution by the Board of Commissioners.
- D) He may execute contracts, as the lessor or lessee of buildings, land, equipment, vehicles, heavy equipment and other property provided that such leases are of one-year duration or less and that funds therefore are within budgeted appropriations.
- E) He may, within budgeted appropriations, approve all change orders and amendments to contracts previously approved by the Board of Commissioners.

**Section 8: AUTHORITY TO SETTLE CLAIMS.** The County Manager, or his designee, may authorize payment in an amount not to exceed \$100,000 in settlement of any liability claims against the County or against any of its officers or employees as provided by Resolution of May 20, 1985 and Resolutions of October 6, 2003. The County Manager shall make quarterly reports to the Board of Commissioners of any such payments.

**Section 9: ENCUMBRANCES AT YEAR END**. Operating funds encumbered by the County as of June 30, 2018 are hereby appropriated to this budget. Multiple year grants unexpended by the County as of June 30, 2018 are hereby appropriated to this budget.

**Section 10: WHITE GOODS.** Funds provided by the State of North Carolina for disposal of white goods that are not spent as of June 30, 2018, are designated for future year expenditures on white goods programs and are hereby appropriated to the Solid Waste Enterprise Fund budget.

**Section 11: FEE CHANGES.** As authorized in Section 153(A)-102 of the North Carolina General Statutes, the following fees are hereby established or amended, effective on July 1, 2018.

#### **BUDGET BY PURPOSE AND FUNCTION (UNIFORM BUDGET FORMAT)**

#### NCGS EXCERPT

#### § 115C-429. Approval of budget; submission to county commissioners; commissioners' action on budget.

- (a) Upon receiving the budget from the superintendent and following the public hearing authorized by G.S. 115C-428(b), if one is held, the board of education shall consider the budget, make such changes therein as it deems advisable, and submit the entire budget as approved by the board of education to the board of county commissioners not later than May 15, or such later date as may be fixed by the board of county commissioners.
- (b) The board of county commissioners shall complete its action on the school budget on or before July 1, or such later date as may be agreeable to the board of education. The commissioners shall determine the amount of county revenues to be appropriated in the county budget ordinance to the local school administrative unit for the budget year. The board of county commissioners may, in its discretion, allocate part or all of its appropriation by purpose, function, or project as defined in the uniform budget format.
- (c) The board of county commissioners shall have full authority to call for, and the board of education shall have the duty to make available to the board of county commissioners, upon request, all books, records, audit reports, and other information bearing on the financial operation of the local school administrative unit.
- (d) Nothing in this Article shall be construed to place a duty on the board of commissioners to fund a deficit incurred by a local school administrative unit through failure of the unit to comply with the provisions of this Article or rules and regulations issued pursuant hereto, or to provide moneys lost through misapplication of moneys by a bonded officer, employee or agent of the local school administrative unit when the amount of the fidelity bond required by the board of education was manifestly insufficient. (1975, c. 437, s. 1; 1981, c. 423, s. 1.)

#### **AUTHORITY:**

- G.S. 115C-429(b) allows the board of County Commissioners to allocate part or all of its appropriation by purpose, function, or project as defined in the uniform budget format.
- G.S. 115C-426 directs the State Board of Education, in cooperation with the Local Government Commission, to prepare and promulgate a standard budget format for use by local school administrative units throughout the State.

**PURPOSE:** The State Board of Education's Uniform Budget Format (Budget by Purpose and Function) contains the following purposes:

5000: Instructional Services

6000: Systemwide Support Services

7000: Ancillary Services

8000: Non Programmed Charges

9000: Capital Outlay

**FUNCTION:** The "purpose dimension" is further broken down into function levels. For example, 5000 (Instructional Services) includes 5100 (Regular Instructional Services), 5200 (Special Populations Services), 5400 (School Leadership Services), etc. Another example, 6000 (Systemwide Support Services), includes 6100 (Support and Development Services), 6500 (Operational Support Services), 6900 (Policy, Leadership and Public Relations Services), etc.

#### TRANSFERS BETWEEN PURPOSE AND FUNCTIONS

- G.S. 115 C-433(b) requires that if Board of County Commissioners allocates part or all of its appropriation by purpose and function, that the Board of Education must obtain approval of the Board of County Commissioners for an amendment to the budget that increases or decreases the amount of the county appropriation to a purpose or function by 25 percent or more from the amount contained in the budgeted ordinance adopted by the Board of Commissioners.
- G.S. 115C-433(b) also specifies that the Board of Commissioners can specify in its ordinance a lower percentage threshold as long as that lower percentage is not less than ten percent.


**Section 7: LIVING WAGE POLICY.** It is the policy of the County of Wake that persons working for the County as regular employees whose scheduled hours exceed 1040 annually be paid as further described in this section.

#### Section 7(A): PAYMENT OF MINIMUM COMPENSATION TO EMPLOYEES.

- a. Eligibility: The County shall pay all regular employees an amount equal to or greater than the Minimum Wage Rate as defined in Section 7.A(c). A regular employee is defined as being in a Board authorized position and having regularly scheduled straight-time hours in excess of 1040.
- b. Emergency Medical Positions: Employees working in emergency medical positions with scheduled overtime will be considered to have met or exceeded the Minimum Wage Rate if their calculated gross annual salary (i.e. straight-time hourly rate times scheduled straight-time hours plus one and one-half times straight-time hourly rate times scheduled overtime hours) is greater than or equal to the Minimum Wage Rate times 2080 hours.
- c. Wage Rate Calculation: The Universal Living Wage Formula Calculation used by the County is based on the average housing cost of a Studio / Efficiency and a One Bedroom according to Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Fair Market Rents in the Raleigh Cary MSA. As of April 1, 2018, the housing costs were \$14.25 for a Studio / Efficiency and \$17.17 for a One Bedroom. The average of these amounts is \$15.71, to which a \$1.50 an hour credit for health insurance is applied resulting in a Living Wage Formula Calculation of \$14.21. On an annual basis, the County current Living Wage Rate is compared to the April 1 calculated amount to determine if an adjustment is needed. For FY19, no adjustment is needed as the current rate exceeds \$14.21.
- d. The Living Wage Rate for fiscal year 2019 shall be fifteen dollars and six cents (\$15.06) per hour (\$16.56 less \$1.50 credit for health insurance).
- e. Annual Adjustment: The County Manager shall calculate or cause to be calculated the Minimum Wage Rate for employees on an annual basis and shall make such adjustments in the County's pay plan to ensure the Minimum Wage Rate as stated herein is paid to all eligible employees
- **Section 8: ELECTED OFFICIALS COMPENSATION.** Funding is provided for a 3.00% compensation adjustment for the members of the Board of Commissioners, the members of the Wake County Board of Education, the Register of Deeds and the Sheriff effective July 1, 2018.

**Section 9: ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL BOARD OFFICIALS COMPENSATION.** The Board of Commissioners authorizes the compensation for the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board within Wake County. Compensation will be set at \$400 per meeting for Alcoholic Beverage Control Board members and \$500 per meeting for the chair of the Alcohol Control Board, effective July 1, 2018. The ABC Board revenues from alcohol sales will provide for this compensation, not Wake County property taxes.

Tax Committee Recommendations for Value Adjustments, Penalty Waivers, Tax Relief Applications, Refund Requests and Various Reports

That the Board of Commissioners approves the attached recommendations by the Tax Committee

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

### Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result
  of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful
  attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the
  audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The
  recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

### Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be handdelivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31st of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

# Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.
