Ms. Annemarie Maiorano, Human Services Deputy Director, introduced Ms. Leigh Duque, Executive Director, InterAct, to accept the Proclamation.

Ms. Duque thanked the Commissioners for their leadership. She shared information about domestic violence and said InterAct is the only provider of comprehensive, emergency, and long-term domestic violence support in Wake County. She told a story of cross stitch in her home that is a reminder of her grandmother. She said a home should be a place of love, but that is not the case when domestic violence is an issue.

Ms. Duque shared statistics of InterAct and the services for Domestic Violence Prevention that are in place. She shared the various agencies that partner with protective orders. She said through the e-filing program, a victim is now able to apply for a protection from abuse order online from their office.

Ms. Duque thanked the Commissioners for allowing InterAct staff to work on-site at the Human Services Work First program as well as the Children and Youth office.

She said that the Family Justice Alliance for Hope International is conducting a community meeting November 27th and 28th and performing a study tour to develop a multi-agency center response. She said there will be discussions about a new multi-agency center in Wake County. She said men and women are victims of domestic violence and more individuals are seeking help than ever before.

Chair Holmes commended InterAct for their work in Wake County. She read aloud the Proclamation.

Chair Holmes moved, seconded by Commissioner Calabria, that the Wake County Board of Commissioners receive a brief presentation from InterAct and proclaim the month of October as Domestic Violence Awareness Month. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Frank Lawrence, South Wilmington Street Center, shared the services that will be offered at the upcoming Capital Area Veterans Stand Down event to be held on November 2, 2018 at the South Wilmington Street Center. He said this is an annual event where veterans can receive various services all in one place.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson said he attends the event each year and asked Mr. Lawrence to share the services that will be available. Mr. Lawrence said that housing, health care, food resources, and other services will be available.

Chair Holmes said twelve percent of men in county shelters are veterans. She said the board looks forward to working with the Wilmington Street Homeless Shelter in order to meet the goal of ending homelessness by 2021.

Commissioner West said that ending homelessness is a goal of the board. He read aloud the Proclamation.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Burns, that

Ms. Eleanor Oakley, President/CEO, United Arts Council of Raleigh and Wake County, said that we live in a culturally rich county. She shared the number of grants awarded to schools in Wake County for art projects. She said since July 1st, the Arts Council has awarded 50 programming grants to 32 non-profit arts organizations, 8 municipalities and 10 schools. She said they have also awarded funds for 67 arts and cultural field trips for elementary schools, offered master classes at 22 high schools and provided other grants to 130 schools. She said they have implemented a mural program with Fuquay-Varina, Garner, Wake Forest, Zebulon, Knightdale and Wendell. She said once the murals are completed, they will be placed in the schools.

Commissioner Ford thanked Ms. Oakley and her staff for all their work. He said Ms. Oakley does an amazing job of promoting arts and culture in Wake County.

He read aloud the Proclamation.

Chair Holmes said that the arts celebrated every day of the year.

Commissioner Ford moved, seconded by Commissioner Calabria, that the Board of Commissioners recognize the month of October as Arts and Humanities Month and adopt the proclamation. The motion passed unanimously.

Schools. Mr. David Ellis, County Manager, confirmed that any children that are currently in Wake County Schools that are affected by the boundary change can remain in the Wake County Public School System.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, to approve the consent agenda. The motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Accept the sealed bid amount of \$15,000.00 and designate that amount into the Parks Recreation and Open Space unallocated account; and

#### **Public Comments:**

Ms. Karen Bearden, 1809 Lakepark Drive, Raleigh, NC, said she and her spouse are the 350 Triangle Coordinators. She said she introduced the 100 percent clean energy by 2050 Resolution to Vice-Chair Hutchinson. She said it was heard by the Growth, Land Use, and Environment Committee and then by the full board at a Work Session. She said that it is important that the board that act quickly on the Resolution.

Mr. Jihad Shawwn, 3605 Gladens Court, Raleigh, encouraged approving

the Resolution of the Resettlement of Refugees to Wake County. He said he will return on November 7 when the board provides the Resolution on the agenda.

Mr. Harry Richmond, 200 Ingreen Chase Court, Apex, thanked the Board of Commissioners for considering the 100 percent clean energy resolution. He also thanked the Growth, Land Use, and Environment Committee for bringing the Resolution forward. He shared the areas that have adopted the Resolution and asked the board to partner with the municipalities in Wake County to accomplish this goal.

Mayor Frank Eagles, Town of Rolesville, said that female veterans were not mentioned in the Veterans Stand Down presentation. He said that many female veterans are single moms and should be remembered.

Ms. Alicia Arnold, Human Services Division Director, shared the background of the Ryan Springs development. She introduced Mr. Tim Morgan, Vice-President, Evergreen Construction. She shared the information about the increased cost of the project. She shared the request for funding information. She said Evergreen Construction requested additional funding from the Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTC) grant, the Integrated Supportive Housing Program (ISHP) and the Town of Cary Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). She said while they all support the project, they do not have funds available at this time.

Chair Holmes asked who is charging the impact permitting fees. Mr. Morgan said the Town of Cary regulates the impact permitting fees.

Ms. Arnold shared the information about the reallocation of CDGB funds. She shared the takeaways for the request. She shared the recommendation for the request.

Commissioner West said that he supports the project. He asked who decides what population a complex will target to accommodate a request.

Ms. Arnold said that is determined by the developer.

Commissioner West asked how the mixture of median income households are determined for a new development. Ms. Arnold said it is determined by the tax credit financing rules and no units can be above 60 percent of the average median income (AMI). Ms. Arnold said that this development has 28 percent of the units at 30 percent of the AMI, which is significant. She said the developers try to serve as many population groups as possible to make it a viable project.

Commissioner Burns asked what can be done to encourage developers to build units for families with children. Ms. Arnold said the tax credit request for proposal process is being revised, which should address the issue. She said significant revisions were made last year, but more improvements will be made this year.

Commissioner Burns asked if any projects are receiving less funding to make this money available. Ms. Arnold said no other projects will be affected. She said there were projects that did not come to fruition, which resulted in the additional funding.

Commissioner Burns asked about impact fees and whether there are communities that waive the fees for affordable housing.

Mr. Morgan said that impact fees from the Town of Cary are not waived and he is not aware of any community that will waive those fees. He said the type of housing is dictated by the size of the land. He mentioned a seven- acre, 42-unit track that he is looking to develop in Garner that will be family housing. He said the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency has strict requirements on sites and asked that the Commissioners discuss the revision of these requirements with the Housing Finance Agency. He said increasing the distance requirements from 1 mile to 1.5 miles would make Wake County more competitive for affordable housing.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson asked if the distance requirements were locally or federally mandated. Mr. Morgan said the Raleigh Housing Finance Agency revises the plan each year and makes amendments to the criteria as necessary.

Commissioner Portman said there must be leveraging effectiveness of funding for the public investment for affordable housing. He said the public should be able to see the return on investment figures.

Chair Holmes said that certain municipalities are more open to affordable housing.

Chair Holmes thanked Mr. Morgan and his team for partnering with Wake County on affordable housing projects and for serving on the Affordable Housing Committee.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Amend the FY 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan and the FY 2018-2019 Action Plan to reprogram up to \$750,000 of prior year Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) public facilities funds to be used as acquisition for the development of affordable housing; and
- 2. Approve up to an additional \$700,000 in Federal CDBG funds for Ryan Spring Apartments, an affordable senior housing development in Cary, NC.

All funding commitments are subject to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney. Awards are also contingent upon the development receiving local approvals including site plan approval, all necessary permits from the local municipality and an award of tax credits from the NC Housing Finance Agency. In addition, all awards are contingent upon the basic terms as identified in the project descriptions, including funding commitments from the financial partners as identified. The motion passed unanimously.

14. Public Hearing on a Request for Disinterment, Relocation, and Reinterment of

Approximately Two (2) Graves Located at 2520 New Hill-Olive Chapel Road to Oakwood

Cemetery (Petition GR-02-18)

Mr. Keith Lankford, Planner III, said the purpose of the grave removal was to accommodate the sale of the property to allow for development by others and to move the remains to a property maintained cemetary where they will receive perpetual care. He shared the cemetery history.

- There are 2 graves marked by uninscribed tombstones.
- Three deeds for the property (1897, 1900 and 1964) contained references to a cemetery.
- The petitioner was unable to conduct any direct genealogical research due to the lack of inscribed tombstones.
- · The petitioner conducted extensive genealogical research of the

- previous owners of the property and identified a distant relative of one of the previous owners, but he indicated that he did not know about the cemetery and had no opposition to relocating the graves.
- No records, or historical significance, was found, and no opposition to this petition has been received.
- Review by other resources
  - Capital Area Preservation
  - Irene Kittinger, Wake County Cemetery Survey Group
  - Town of Apex planning staff

He shared the grave removal process.

- Under NCGS, the remains are required to be reinterred in a suitable cemetery.
- Work shall be performed by a licensed funeral director.
- Wake County Environmental Services staff will observe the disinterment.
- The petitioner (or funeral director) must record the Removal of Graves Certificate at the Register of Deeds Office after completing the reinterment.

He shared the compliance with North Carolina General Statutes.

- Legal notices appeared in the News and Observer newspaper on May 21st and 28th, and June 4th and 11th, 2018.
- The remains will be reinterred in Oakwood Cemetery at 701
   Oakwood Avenue, where they will receive perpetual care.
- Planning staff posted the required notification signs at the property on October 3rd, 2018 (and ran 2 N&O legal ads).
- No opposition has been received.

He shared a map of the cemetery site. He shared the staff findings.

- The petitioner has fulfilled all of the requirements as outlined by the North Carolina General Statutes.
- Removal of the cemetery is necessary to accommodate the sale of the property for development by others.
- The remains will be reinterred in Oakwood Cemetery where they will receive perpetual care.
- No evidence of any historical significance and its removal and relocation would not be detrimental to the general welfare of the County

Chair Holmes opened the public hearing.

No one came forward.

Chair Holmes closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Ford asked about the future use of the property. Mr. Lankford said that the owners seek to sell the property to another developer.

Commissioner Ford said he is of the opinion that a final resting place is permanent. He said that he opposes the proposal due to his beliefs.

Chair Holmes said that morally she disagrees with the proposal but respects that on occasion, changes must be made since it is a legal action.

Commissioner West asked if this type of request has been denied in the past. Mr. Scott Warren, County Attorney, said that years ago, a request was denied because of the possibility that an African American Cemetery was located on the property.

Commissioner Ford asked if perspective owners are notified that a cemetery was located on the property when they make a purchase. Mr. Warren said that an attorney should identify this on a title search and real estate agents should disclose this information.

Commissioner Ford said that he recently visited Oakwood and was impressed with their perpetual care.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Hutchinson, that the Board of Commissioners approve the disinterment, relocation, and reinterment of approximately two (2) graves from a 13-acre property located at 2520 New Hill-Olive Chapel Road to Oakwood Cemetery. The motion passed by the following vote.

Mr. Dave Goodwin, Director, General Services, shared information about why clean energy is being discussed. He said the Growth, Land Use, and Environment committee and the full board had discussed the goal and resolution in a recent Work Session.

He shared information on the process and the objectives of the initiative.

The GLUE Committee (Growth Land Use and Environment) recommends the endorsement of a 100% clean energy by 2050 goal

- · Objective to:
  - Embolden Wake County's commitment to sustainability and energy conservation
  - Reduce effects of climate change and benefit low-income communities affected by fossil fuel pollution
  - Improve local economy through the creation of green jobs
- Full Board Reviewed @ October 8, 2018 Work Session
- Today: Consideration of Approval of Resolution

He shared the way county operations would support 100% clean energy for county departments.

County Operations transition to 100% Clean Energy Sources through:

- On-site Solar
- Off-site Solar

- Electric / Fuel Cell Vehicles
- Efficiency
- New Innovative Technologies

He shared how the resolution supports county actions. He said this board of commissioners has encouraged the clean energy conversion process.

- Strengthens County's commitment to sustainability and energy conservation.
- Supports investment in clean energy systems
- Aligns with County Energy Guidelines
- Provides an aspirational goal to guide staff and Energy Advisory Commission

He introduced staff and others present that assisted with the process. Mr. Robert Hinson, Chair, Wake County Citizens' Energy Advisory Commission; Mr. Kevin Witchger, Wake County Energy Manager; Ms. Kelli Braunbach, Deputy General Services Director; Mr. Mark Dubois, Physical Plant Director; Mr. William Hamilton, Senior Facilities Engineer; and Mr. Jeffrey Merritts, Facilities Engineer.

He shared the board action.

Chair Holmes thanked Commissioner Burns for chairing the Growth, Land Use, and Environment Committee.

Commissioner Burns thanked Vice-Chair Hutchinson, Commissioner Calabria, and Ms. Karen Bearden, Citizen Advocate for the earth and environment, for bringing this forward to the Growth, Land Use, and Environment Committee. He thanked Mr. Goodwin for his help and support with the resolution. He said clean energy is an issue that needs to be addressed soon to avoid disastrous effects from global climate change. He

asked the board to support the Resolution and requested staff lobby the state government to work with Duke Energy to allow public entities to benefit from the cost saving measures for converting to solar power and to purchase more solar power.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford to amend the last paragraph of the resolution to read "that the Wake County Government will commit itself in its own operations, policies, and guidelines to continuing its efforts towards clean energy, sustainability, reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, energy efficiency, and the reduction fossil fuel use."

Vice-Chair Hutchinson said this is an important issue. He commended staff, the Citizens' Energy Advisory Commission, and the GLUE Committee for their work and for making the first step toward this goal.

Commissioner Portman said that he is proud of the board for pursuing this effort. He thanked the people that live in Wake County for adapting and exploring opportunities to grow the economy.

Commissioner Calabria commended staff and the GLUE Committee for a workable, feasible, wise and practical work toward the clean energy efforts. He said the proposal was not easy but moves Wake County forward. He said the threat of global change is real and needs to be addressed.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Hutchinson, that the Board of Commissioners adopt a Resolution endorsing the goal of achieving 100% clean energy by 2050 and 80% clean energy by 2035. The motion passed unanimously.

He shared the suggested pilot project for the new Fuguay-Varina Library.

- Increase native plant species to 70% minimum
- Provide educational signage
  - Use of native plants on site and storm water wetlands

He shared a summary of the board resolution.

Wake County Board of Commissioners will review and revise the Wake County UDO and the Wake County Design Guidelines and Standards ensuring that Wake County government projects use Native Plants to the greatest extent possible.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson recognized Mr. Tom Earnhardt, Host, Exploring North Carolina, for his guidance on this initiative. He said there are more native species in North Carolina than any place on the planet. He said there is diversity and Wake County needs to celebrate the uniqueness of natural infrastructure as well as the built infrastructure. He said that it is important to bring this forward to WCPSS, private developers, nurseries, golf courses, and private homeowners.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson moved, seconded by Commissioner Burns, that the Board of Commissioners approve a Resolution endorsing the increased use of Native Plants for Wake County Government projects.

#### The motion passed unanimously.

Chair Holmes noted that Commissioner Portman asked that the item be added to the agenda. He said that the public needs to be aware of the issues that occurred that changed the terms of commissioners in Wake County. He shared information about the lingering on uncertainly from legislation. He shared maps of residency districts that are on a two-year term instead of a residency basis. He spoke of the state-wide gerrymandering that has occurred. He shared the votes of the House and Senate.

- In a 50D /50R state we have
- A 77%/23% congressional house delegation
- A 70%/30% state senate
- And a 62%/38% state house

He shared information about the gap. He shared a map of the county commission races.

Commissioner Portman said that Wake County is the second largest in the state. He shared information on the make-up of other county election methods. He said only three percent of the counties in the state elect commissioners on district only. He shared a map of how county boards are elected state-wide. He asked the board to consider that local control be respected. He said that voters should elect the board, the board should not elect its voters. He said that the process does not need to be partisan and gerrymandered. He suggested forming a bipartisan task force to evaluate the pros and cons and bring a recommendation back to the board. He said that when he served on the Cary Town Council, they followed the same process. He said that staggered election terms should be returned as well as four-year terms.

Commissioner Burns thanked Commissioner Portman for raising the issue. He said that the 2020 Census will dictate action. He expressed concern with the timing since the prime mover will be in office until January. He said having staggered terms is the only efficient way to operate this county. He asked Commissioner Portman if it is his desire action be taken today. Commissioner Portman said he would defer to the will of the board.

Commissioner Burns said that more discussion may be needed by the

board and suggested a future Work Session may be needed on the issue.

Commissioner West expressed his concern about the timing, distractions, and unintended consequences of moving forward at this time. He said that there was a resolution adopted and discussion made by the board in 2015. He said there were 72 responses by citizens at that time. He agrees with the staggered terms and further discussion may be needed. He echoed Commissioner Burns comments to discuss this action and lay out a plan to move forward for continuity, sequence, and integration.

Commissioner Ford agreed with the high importance and said the General Assembly and the state have a hold on the process. He is open to discussion on the item, but the timing and next steps is important.

Mr. Warren said tabling the issue and consideration at a later meeting is in order.

Commissioner Burns agreed to revise the motion to table the issue.

Commissioner West said that looking at road blocks is important. He asked whether legal action is necessary before discussion is made.

Chair Holmes said a timeline showing the next option to re-district would be helpful.

Mr. Warren said the board can act at any time. He said no finality can be made until the legislature takes the issue up before 2020 or the Wake County Board of Elections moves forward with the issue in court to redraw districts.

Commissioner Portman said that it is unknown what will happen in 2020 and his recommendation is for the board's strongest review and a recommendation for resolution be brought forward. He said what is not urgent today is important, but may become urgent. He said he wanted to bring forward discussion.

Commissioner Calabria said the issue is worth highlighting and the legislature has created uncertainty. He said that Wake County is the only county that has no control of electoral process by 2022. He said that the last decision was made too quickly for discussion. He said discussion should occur and a thoughtful approach is needed.

A brief recess was taken for a press conference for 100 % Clean Energy and Native Plants.

Commissioner Burns moved, seconded by Commissioner Ford, that the Board of Commissioners table the matter for discussion at a later date. The motion carried by the following vote.

The meeting went into recess and then reconvened.

#### **Committee Reports**

#### 19. Transit Committee

Vice-Chair Hutchinson said Bus-Rapid Transit (BRT) was discussed at the October 8th Transit Committee meeting. He said the BRT is a new 20-mile transit method that was made possible with the 1/2 cent tax increase last year. He said there is a comprehensive plan to review all four of the corridors. He said reaching out to the Federal Transportation Organization for grant funding is the beginning of 2019 will be important. He said creating fare strategies is complicated by the number of service providers. He said that fare strategies will be coordinated for vulnerable communities. The Youth Fare Program has been successful. He said the first mile/last mile was discussed and all options are being considered. He said there was discussion about a partnership with the City of Raleigh for a new ADA compliant facility. He said funding was not approved for the triangle bikeway and improving the project to reduce the cost will be later discussed at a future Work Session.

#### 20. Human Services Committee

Commissioner West said Chair Holmes, Commissioner Ford, and Vice-Chair Hutchinson attended the recent meeting held October 11th. He commended Vice-Chair Hutchinson and Dr. Stuart Levin, Chair, Population Health Task Force, for their input on the Population Health Task Force report. He shared the staff that prepared guidance toward the completion of the report. He said integration of the Community Needs Assessment was discussed and key questions were asked. He said exploring existing strategies is important. He said a presentation was given by the Human Services Board. He said a staff process will occur by the Human Services Board that will come before the full Board of Commissioners. He said it was a productive meeting and working together is important.

#### **Other Business**

Commissioner Burns thanked staff for the "Imagine A Day Without Water" event that was held last week.

Vice-Chair Hutchinson said he attended the Water Partnership Meeting last week. He shared the four sub-committees that have been formed by the Water Partnership. He said the sub-committees focus on education and outreach, comprehensive planning, coordination and green infrastructure. He said there is a groundwater study being completed for the first time. He said A Day Without Water was discussed in order to highlight clean water. He commended Commissioner Burns and Commissioner Calabria for their work on the GLUE Committee. He said there was discussion regarding well regulation rules to ensure county well water is safe.

Chair Holmes commended the Communications Department for their work toward the recent State of the County event at the NC Museum of Sciences.

Chair Holmes said the Elected Officials Build Day was held this past Saturday and thanked officials for their support. She thanked Habitat for Humanity for working with county officials. She commended all local officials who participated. She said the legislative delegation was included this year for the first time and thanked Ms. Gale Adcock, Senator Jay Chaudhuri and Senator Tamara Barringer for their participation.

Commissioner West commended Chair Holmes for the State of the County presentation.

The motion passed unanimously.

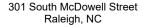

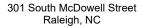
Kim is a general instructor for the Sheriff's Office and teaches the mental health training for the Basic Law Enforcement Training academy.

# Resolution Reaffirming Support for the Resettlement of Refugees to Wake County

**WHEREAS**, there are more refugees in the world today than at any time since World War II, and more than half of the world's refugees are children; and

**WHEREAS**, refugees are fleeing armed conflict and human rights abuses in many areas around the world; and

**WHEREAS**, more than half of the world's refugees are hosted by only ten countries, and many of these countries do not have adequate resources to keep refugees fed, housed, or safe, leaving some refugees to survive on less than fifty cents a day; and

**WHEREAS**, refugees who need to be resettled include torture survivors, people with severe medical conditions, LGBTI individuals, children alone, and women and children at risk – all of whom can neither return home nor stay in their host country due to their extreme vulnerability; and

**WHEREAS**, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) has determined that 1.2 million refugees are in need of immediate resettlement, but fewer than 150,000 resettlement places are available worldwide; and

**WHEREAS**, we applaud the historic, bi-partisan tradition of the United States in welcoming refugees, in keeping with our national values and respect for human rights; and

**WHEREAS**, the United Nations resettlement process does not allow refugees to choose the country to which they will be sent; and

**WHEREAS**, even if a refugee is a candidate for resettlement in the United States, he or she must still be found admissible under U.S. immigration law; and

**WHEREAS**, every single refugee must undergo a security vetting process that is lengthy, extremely detailed, and very safe, taking 18 to 24 months and involving multiple law enforcement and intelligence agencies; and

**WHEREAS**, refugees are the most vetted individuals to enter the United States and are not permitted to travel to the U.S. until all security screenings have been successfully completed; and

**WHEREAS**, Lutheran Services Carolinas and the US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants (USCRI), the organizations responsible for resettling refugees in this community, as well as numerous other community organizations and religious institutions, have declared their support for resettling refugees in Wake County; and

WHEREAS, Lutheran Services Carolinas and the US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants (USCRI) have resettled over 1,000 refugees in the Wake County area since 2015 from more than 17 countries; and



**WHEREAS**, the month of October has been recognized as National Arts and Humanities Month by thousands of arts and cultural organizations across the country, as well as by the White House and Congress for more than two decades; and

**WHEREAS**, the arts and humanities embody much of the accumulated wisdom, intellect, and imagination of humankind; and

### RESOLUTION OF AMENDMENT AND CONFIRMATION OF REASSESSMENT FOR BANKS POINTE SUBDIVISION

WHEREAS, by Resolution adopted by the Wake County Board of Commissioners on March 19, 2018, the assessment associated with subdivision road improvements for Banks Pointe Subdivision was confirmed and a lien was placed on all lots listed on the final assessment roll in accordance with Article 9 of Chapter 153A, Section 205, of the North Carolina General Statutes; and

WHEREAS, following confirmation of assessment, an error was discovered in the project costs resulting in an overassessment on the respective Banks Pointe lots; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.C.G.S. 153A-198, a reassessment is necessary to correct the total amount of the assessment and to issue refunds and credits to the Banks Pointe lot owners made subject to this special assessment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Wake County Board of Commissioners:

- 1. That the Banks Pointe subdivision roads, Phases 1, 2, and 3 (Chelsea Drive, Sorrell Brothers Court, Bankshire Lane, Cotten Road, Banks Stone Drive, Bankscrest Drive, and Bankswood Drive), have been repaired and improved in accordance with the standards of the North Carolina Department of Transportation and have been accepted into the statemaintained highway system.
- 2. That the Wake County Board of Commissioners ("Board") makes assessment of 100% of the total cost of the improvements described herein against the lots and parcels abutting the improvements at an equal rate per lot. A table and map depicting all lots and parcels abutting the improvements subject to said assessment is attached hereto as *Exhibit A*.
- 3. An error was discovered in the original assessment computation of \$863,674.00. The corrected, total assessable cost of the improvements has been computed pursuant to N.C.G.S. 153A-193 and is hereby declared to be \$837,814 ("Total Project Cost/Amount of Reassessment") inclusive of consulting fees, construction costs, publication and notification costs and other miscellaneous expenses incurred by Wake County. A table depicting the amended Total Project Cost is attached hereto as *Exhibit B*.
- 4. The Total Project Cost equates to a final assessment of \$9,413.64 ("Amended Assessment") per lot identified in *Exhibit A*, reflecting a difference of \$290.56 from the original assessment.

- 5. Upon confirmation of the amended assessment by the Board by this Resolution, the terms and manner of payment of assessments to the Wake County Revenue Department shall remain in full force and effect unless otherwise stated herein.
- 6. In accordance with N.C.G.S. §153A-199, the amended payment terms, including refund provisions are as follows:
  - a. *Payment in Full*: All accounts for which the lien has been satisfied by payment of the original assessment (\$9,704.20) on or before the date of this Resolution, will receive a refund in the amount of \$290.56. Said refund will be issued to the original payor within thirty (30) days of confirmation of this reassessment.
  - b. *Installment Payments*: For those remaining accounts that are not yet fully satisfied, the total lien amount shall be adjusted in accordance with the corrected assessment of \$9,413.64 by issuance of a credit on each account in the amount of \$290.56 within thirty (30) days of confirmation of this reassessment. Any interest accrued on the original assessment amount will also be corrected and a credit will be issued on each account for any interest overpayment. The installment lot accounts shall continue to pay their assessments in installments which shall not exceed ten (10) annual installments and shall bear interest at the rate of 3.5% per annum on the unpaid balance. All installment payments shall be paid in accordance with the following terms:
    - i. The amended minimum annual installment payment ("Amended Annual Installment") shall be adjusted to \$941.36 together with accrued interest.
    - ii. Interest will continue to accrue on any unpaid balance of the Amended Assessment established herein at a rate of 3.5% per annum.
    - iii. In the next annual billing cycle, all installment payment accounts will receive a modified billing statement reflecting the Amended Assessment as set forth herein, together with the corrected interest amount that has accrued from the date of initial assessment.
    - iv. Each consecutive amended annual installment payment shall be paid on June 1<sup>st</sup> of each successive year until the assessment is paid in full. If the minimum annual amended installment amount of \$941.36 plus accrued interest is not paid in full each year on or before the due date set forth herein, the assessment may be declared in default and all of the remaining unpaid installments may be accelerated and become immediately due, with interest.
    - v. Installment payments shall first be applied to accrued interest on the unpaid balance of the assessment.
    - vi. Assessments paid by installments may be paid in full, inclusive of interest, any time before the expiration of the ten (10) year term.

- vii. Interest and all costs borne by the County associated with collection of annual installments shall accrue on all arrearages which shall constitute a lien on the lot or parcel in accordance with law.
- 7. That the revised reassessment roll ("Reassessment Roll") attached hereto as *Exhibit A* was filed in the Wake County Clerk's Office for public inspection and notice was duly mailed to each property owner listed on the roll at least 10 days before the meeting scheduled in this matter in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 153A-194.
- 8. That a public hearing was held on the 19<sup>th</sup> day of March, 2018, at 2:00 PM in room 2700 of the Wake County Justice Center located at 301 S. McDowell St., Raleigh, NC for the purpose of hearing all interested persons in respect to the special assessments made by this Resolution.
- 9. That the reassessment made by this Resolution are hereby confirmed by the Wake County Board of Commissioners pursuant to Article 9, Chapter 153A, Section 195 of the North Carolina General Statutes and the Wake County Clerk is directed to record said confirmation in the minutes of the Board and deliver a copy of the same to the Wake County Revenue Director for collection in accordance with this Resolution.
- 10. From the time of confirmation, each reassessment is a lien on the lot assessed to the same extent as a lien for county or city property taxes, under the priorities set out in N.C.G.S. § 153A-200 and the County shall have the authority to foreclosure on any unpaid or delinquent assessments in accordance therewith. Notwithstanding the above, for those lots that have paid in full, there will be no new lien placed on their lot.
- 11. That the Amended Assessment Roll attached hereto as *Exhibit A* and reconfirmed by the Board herein shall replace the original Assessment Roll of March 19, 2018.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Wake County Board of Commissioners confirms this reassessment roll in accordance with North Carolina General Statutes Article 9 of Chapter 153A *Special Assessments*.







WHEREAS, N.C.G.S. § 153A-18 provides that if two or more counties are uncertain as to the exact boundary between them, they may cause the boundary to be surveyed, marked and mapped; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a Joint Resolution with Wake County, Harnett County and Chatham County approved by the Harnett County Board of Commissioners and Wake County Board of Commissioners on or about April 16, 2018, North Carolina Geodetic Survey was authorized to locate and survey the boundary line between Wake County and Harnett County; and

WHEREAS, as part of the preliminary survey work completed by North Carolina Geodetic Survey, it was determined that Wake County and Chatham County had been using a boundary corner established by survey in 1961 that differed from the actual location of the Wake/Chatham/Harnett tri-county boundary corner; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to SL2018-62 ratified by the North Carolina General Assembly on or about June 25, 2018, the tri-county corner boundary between Wake, Chatham and Harnett County was established in accordance with N.C.G.S. § 153A-17; and

WHEREAS, now that the tri-county corner has been established, Wake County and Harnett County mutually desire to finalize the location of the common boundary shared between them; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina Geodetic Survey has prepared an official survey of the Wake County and Harnett County common boundary for adoption and ratification by the Wake County and Harnett County Boards of Commissioners.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS AND THE HARNETT COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS that the survey completed by the North Carolina Geodetic Survey attached hereto as *Exhibit A* is hereby adopted for the purpose of locating the common boundary between Wake County and Harnett County.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that upon adoption of this Joint Resolution, Wake County and Harnett County will work together to reconcile county services to affected properties such as board of elections, zoning, building permitting, emergency response, and tax assessments.



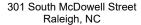

### A RESOLUTION ENDORSING THE GOALS OF ACHIEVING CLEAN ENERGY BY 2050

**WHEREAS**, The Wake County Board of Commissioners have a long standing, proactive position toward the conservation of energy and the protection of natural resources for the betterment of the citizens of Wake County; and

**WHEREAS**, climate change is expected to increasingly impact North Carolina's temperatures, precipitation and sea level with harmful consequences in coming years; and

**WHEREAS**, a just transition to 100% renewable energy can benefit low-income communities and communities of color that are disproportionately impacted by fossil fuel pollution;

**WHEREAS,** in September 1978 the Wake County Board of Commissioners established the first Energy Policy and Created the Citizens' Energy Advisory Commission; and

**WHEREAS**, in May of 1992 the Board of Commissioners adopted by resolution the first Energy Conservation and Management Policy that authorized the County Manager to establish design, construction and management standards, declared that all employees share in energy conservation and encourage future guideline revisions; and

**WHEREAS**, in June 2004 the second energy guideline titled "Guidelines for Design and Construction of Energy-Efficient County Government Facilities and Schools" was established in partnership with the Wake County Public School System; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2015 the Board of Commissioners established under the goal of Growth and Sustainability, and the objective of Promoting Sustainability efforts throughout the County, the initiative to 1) review supporting advisory groups and their missions, 2) assess Wake County's Energy status among its peer groups, and 3) update its 2004 Energy Design Guideline.

**WHEREAS**, the United States Conference of Mayors in 2017 passed a resolution supporting 100% clean renewable energy community-wide for cities by 2035;

**WHEREAS,** in June 2017 the Board of Commissioners endorsed the Paris Climate Agreement in order "... to continue its efforts towards sustainability and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions..."; and

- WHEREAS, Wake County, WCPSS, and Wake Technical Community College staff have met and created common and distinct guidelines that meet the needs of their respective governing bodies and have resolved to meet and report energy information annually to the Energy Advisory Commission to learn and to leverage research and development; and
- WHEREAS, in March 2018 the Energy Advisory Commission endorsed and recommended the 2018 Energy Design and Management Guideline update by consensus; and
- WHEREAS, in April 2018 the Board of Commissioners subcommittee on Growth Land Use and Environment received and recommended to the full Board of Commissioners the 2018 Energy Design and Management Guideline update by consensus; and
- **WHEREAS**, in May 2018 the Board of Commissioners adopted the 3rd update of the Energy Guideline named the "Energy Design and Management Guideline" and directed the County Manager to implement this guideline consistent with existing policy effective immediately; and
- **WHEREAS**, the May 2018 Energy Design and Management Guideline requires that all new facilities shall be "**Solar Ready**" and renewable energy planning shall begin early in building design to accelerate solar technology installation when economic payback is favorable; and
- **WHEREAS**, in July 2018 the Board of Commissioners adopted a budget authorizing two Solar Photovoltaic (PV) Pilot projects so that staff might establish the necessary design, construction and energy management skills; and
- **WHEREAS**, 350 Triangle, an affiliate of 350.org, has identified a target of 80% clean energy by 2030 and 100% clean energy by 2050; and
- **WHEREAS**, Clean Energy by 2050 is defined as transitioning 100% of energy consumed and stored by County operations from fossil fuel-based energy to renewable energy including Solar, Wind, Tidal & Wave, Hydroelectric, and Geothermal; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Wake County Board of Commissioners believes that achieving Clean Energy by 2050 requires also having a goal of transitioning 80% of energy consumed by County operations from fossil fuel-based energy to such renewable sources by 2035; and
- WHEREAS, in September 2018 the Board of Commissioners subcommittee on Growth Land Use and Environment deemed it would be in the interests of Wake County citizens for the Wake County Board of Commissioners to join in the effort to achieve Clean Energy by 2050 to reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and
- **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Wake County Board of Commissioners endorses the goal of 100% Clean Energy by 2050 and joins its fellow state and local governments in advocating for the use of Clean Energy where such action results in reasonable and foreseeable economic payback and is subject to budget

availability; that the Wake County Government will commit itself in its own operations, policies, and guidelines to continuing its efforts towards clean energy, sustainability, reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, energy efficiency, and the reduction fossil fuel use; and that the County Commission does hereby authorize the County Manager to support efforts toward the Clean Energy by 2050 goal through fiscally responsible budget expenditures, and encourages all energy sectors of Wake County's economy to adopt similar goals in their own operations.

# RESOLUTION BY THE WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS SUPPORTING INCREASED USE OF NATIVE PLANTS ON WAKE COUNTY GOVERNMENT PROJECTS

**WHEREAS,** the Wake County Board of Commissioners have a long standing and proactive position toward the protection of natural resources to protect and preserve the health, safety and welfare of the residents and property owners of Wake County; and

**WHEREAS,** North Carolina's Piedmont region native plants, provide unique and environmental values to the region and the use of Native Plants helps preserve our natural heritage.; and

**WHEREAS**, the use of Native Plants helps restore the ecological balance that has been lost through development; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2006, the Wake County Board of Commissioners adopted revisions to the Wake County UDO establishing guidelines for the use of native plants in landscape buffers and providing information on invasive plant species; and

**WHEREAS,** in 2008 Wake County became a founding and committed partner of WakeNature in an effort to organize and provide resources to identify ecologically valuable, publicly owned open spaces within Wake County, NC, and to build capacity for appropriate management and long-term stewardship of those areas; and

**WHEREAS**, in 2017 the Wake County Design Guidelines and Standards were established as a guidance document on materials, including landscaping for all Wake County Government CIP projects; and

WHEREAS, in 2017 the Wake County Open Space, Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee (OSAPAC) recommended strongly supporting the use of native species in open space and public access project areas except for gardens for historic and educational purposes; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the Board of Commissioners subcommittee on Growth Land Use and Environment received a presentation on use of Native Plants and recommended to the full Board of Commissioners revisions to the Wake County Unified Development Ordinance and the Wake County Design Guidelines and Standards, as well as establishing a pilot project that will utilize native plants to a greater extent; and

**WHEREAS,** Wake County contends with invasive plants, which compete with native species, degrade soil, facilitate erosion, alter the regions natural landscapes and should be prohibited in all landscape plans; and

**WHEREAS**, Native Plants, which are plants and trees that are localized and well adapted to the soils, topography, hydrology and climate of the region, are of substantial aesthetic and ecological benefit to the County; and

WHEREAS, wildlife such as birds, insects, butterflies, mammals, reptiles and other native species are more attracted to the Native Plants with which they coevolved, and use such plants for food, cover and rearing their young; and

**WHEREAS**, the use of appropriate Native Plants in local landscaping, can help achieve water conservation, preserve and encourage habitat and reduce the maintenance costs for landscaping;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, in an effort to protect our natural resources Wake County will review and revise the Wake County Unified Development Ordinance and the Wake County Design Guidelines and Standards ensuring that Wake County Government projects utilize Native Plants to the greatest extent possible; and that the County Commission does hereby authorize the County Manager to support efforts toward the increased use of native plants on Wake County Government projects.



Prior to January 1, 2015, these liabilities were shared and consequently absorbed by all agencies participating in the Retirement System. This legislation applies to members who retire on and after January 1, 2015, with an average final compensation of \$100,000 or higher (adjusted annually for inflation), and will only directly impact a small number of those individuals. It requires the member's last employer to pay the additional contribution required to fund the member's benefit in excess of the cap. [G.S. 135-5(a3); 135-4(jj); 128-27(a3); and 128-26(y)]

In order to assist employing agencies with planning and budgeting to comply with the contribution-based benefit cap provisions, we are required to report monthly to each employer a list of those members for whom the employer made a contribution to the Retirement System in the preceding month that are most likely to require an additional employer contribution should they elect to retire in the following 12 months. This letter and the attached report serve as our required monthly notification to your agency under this provision. [G.S. 135-8(f)(2)(f) and G.S.128-30(g)(2)(b)]

The chief financial officer of your agency is required to provide a copy of the attached report to the chief executive of your agency, as well as to the governing body, including any board which exercises financial oversight. Additionally, the chief financial officer of a public school system is required to provide a copy of the report to the local board of education and notify the board of county commissioners of the county in which the local administrative unit is located that the report was received and how many employees were listed in the report. [G.S. 115C-436(c); 135-8(j); and 128-30(j)]

The attached report lists employees of your agency who may be eligible to retire in the next 13 months, and whose salary is \$90,000 or greater based on information in the employee's most recent annual benefits statement. Your agency may be required to submit an additional amount to the Retirement Systems in the form of a lump-sum payment, due after the employee retires, to cover these unforeseen liabilities should the employee elect to retire in the next 12 months.

Benefit Formula = AFC X Multiplier X Service

CBBC Formula = Contributions / Annuity Factor X CBBC Factor

If Benefit is greater than CBBC, the difference is multiplied by the Annuity Factor

You can contact the Retirement System for assistance in calculating the likelihood of a potential CBBC liability for a particular member.
