Commissioner Evans shared the invocation.

Items of Business

1. Approval of Agenda

Commissioner Holmes asked that the Juneteenth item be moved up on the agenda.

Commissioner Holmes moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Adamson, to approve the Agenda as edited by Commissioner Holmes to move Item 24 to be heard immediately after the Resolution Recognizing Systemic Racism and Discrimination. The motion passed unanimously.

2. Approval of the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of June 15, 2020 and the Work Session of June 8, 2020

Commissioner Evans moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Adamson, to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of June 15, 2020 and the Work Session of June 8, 2020. The motion passed unanimously.

Chair Ford said that this is an issue that the board has worked with directly and indirectly.

Commissioner Holmes shared that the reason for the resolution coming at this time is due to COVID-19. She shared statistics for the reason for bringing the resolution forward. She shared that the Hispanic population and African Americans make up approximately 30 percent of the population in Wake County but together represent 70 percent of the positive COVID-19 cases. She shared that it was important to bring the resolution to the table for the reason mentioned and that Mecklenburg County and the City of Charlotte have also presented a resolution recognizing systemic racism and discrimination.

She shared action steps she wants implemented:

- recognize bias and require racial equity training for the board, sheriff's department and other staff
- distribute PPE to 27610 zip code and other areas of high need
- evaluate names of all county buildings to ensure they are in keeping with the current sentiments
- full funding of for schools from CAREs Act
- · improve the infant mortality rate for babies of color
- place social workers in schools
- develop a public relations team in regard to evictions within the county

Vice-Chair Adamson said that this resolution has been a long time coming

and it is way past due.

Chair Ford made comments to the county manager about names on monuments, statutes, etc.

Manager Ellis shared that none of the statutes, buildings, or monuments to date have names that are discriminatory in nature.

Commissioner West read the resolution aloud.

Commissioner West moved, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, that the Board of Commissioners adopt the resolution. The motion passed unanimously.

4. Adoption of June 19, Juneteenth, as a Paid County Holiday

This item moved up after the resolution was read.

Trinijah Martin, Deputy HR Director, presented the item.

Commissioner Holmes shared history of Juneteenth. She shared that Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated recognition of the end of slavery.

Vice Chair Adamson shared that times are changing. She said that this is a symbolic opportunity to do the right thing. She shared that she hopes it is celebrated appropriately.

Commissioner Evans shared sentiments of Vice-Chair Adamson. She shared the moments from the meeting with the law enforcement earlier today. She shared that she lived through the Civil Rights movement and we have a long way to go. She shared that she recognize the holiday for employees, but the community does not, and it is important to educate the public.

Commissioner Calabria echoed his colleagues. He said that he is proud to be a part of a board that does the hard work in an intentional and focused way. He said recent events are a reminder to us that action is needed. He said the he gratified to be a part of a county that does not look the other way. He said that there is more to do and that we can not separate ourselves from the community. He quoted Mark Twain "the man who does not read good books has no advantage over the man who can't read them."

Commissioner Hutchinson honored his colleagues on this resolution. He shared that this is critical and he supports the motion.

Commissioner West thanked Commissioner Holmes on her leadership. He shared reflections of the protest in Wake County.

Chair Ford shared that several of the board members attended and participated in the protest. He shared that the resolution sends a message of significance. He shared that if you don't know why dates such as this one are significant it is an example of how racism works its' way into our lives. He asked educators to find a way to add this to their curriculum.

Commissioner Holmes shared her thoughts that Wake County has just declared Juneteenth as a holiday. She shared that she is proud of the board today and thanked her colleagues. She read the proclamation aloud. She said that this is a historic day for Wake County. It's not just for Blacks but for all Americans. She shared that other municipalities will be joining in declaring Juneteenth a paid holiday.

Chair Ford said this is a significant moment in the county's history.

Commissioner Holmes moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Adamson, that the Board of Commissioners:

Mr. Chris Dillon, Assistant County Manager, shared that a public hearing will need to be opened and closed tomorrow at 5:00 pm. It will be on the August 17th agenda for approval.

He shared Bandwidth, Inc.

- Bandwidth, Inc is a communications software company that has proudly called Raleigh home for the past 18 years.
- Specializing in CPaaS (Communications Platform as a Service), Bandwidth powers some of the most innovative communication solutions from brands like Google, Microsoft, Cisco, Zoom and many others. The company is competing and winning against its Silicon Valley-based competitors every day.
- Over the last 18 years in Raleigh, Bandwidth has growth to 700+ employees, an IPO in November of 2017, and current market cap of \$2B.

He shared Project Athens.

Project Athens

- The company will need to accommodate and enrich the lives of 1150+ future co-workers (and their families) which it plans to hire over the next 7 years.
- \$106,426,500 million in new investment, not including the purchase of a 40 acre lot from the State of NC for \$30 million.
- Bandwidth's great success is a shining example of what can be done in this market with homegrown NC talent alongside those who have moved to the area to join in the company's mission.

He shared incentives.

Chair Ford shared that this is huge opportunity for Wake County.

Vice Chair Adamson thanked Mr. Dillion. New growth even during the pandemic proves Wake County is a great place to live.

Commissioner Hutchinson congratulated Bandwidth for their service to Wake County.

Commissioner Evans shared that she is glad that Bandwidth is coming to District 4 in Cary.

Chair Ford thanked Mr. Dillon for his work on this project. He asked Mr. Dillon to explain business development grants processes.

Mr. Dillon shared information on the incentive grants.

Commissioner Holmes shared thoughts about small business loans and whether grants could be provided versus loans to small businesses. She asked what distinguished New Hanover County to provide grants and not loans.

Mr. Dillon said that he is aware that local governments will step out and not follow the rules, but in the end have been asked to pay the funds back.

Commissioner Hutchinson asked about the building taxes and incentive grants.

Mr. Dillon said that based on valuation, the company pays taxes on the building and 50 percent goes toward reimbursement of the grant.

Vice Chair Adamson shared that there has been a lot of growth during her tenure. She asked what is the environment in Wake County looking like presently for economic investment.

Mr. Dillon said that the talent is needed to build the platform in order to attract commercial investment.

Commissioner West shared an article about black businesses being closed. He ask for thoughts and impacts on the pandemic and the recovery.

Mr. Dillon shared that programs like Wake Works that train citizens, programs that pay while you learn would help to get on the path to success. He shared that partnering with Wake Tech would help to get the education and training that residents need.

Commissioner West asked if leverage would help for those that have been left behind.

Mr. Dillon said investments and mentoring programs would be a benefit.

Vice Chair Adamson read the motion.

Chair Ford opened the public hearing. There were 2 comments that will be submitted to the Commissioners.

Vice-Chair Adamson moved, seconded by Commissioner West, that the Board of Commissioners:

- 1. Hold a public hearing and approve a Business Development Grant Agreement with Bandwidth, Inc., subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

Mr. Gary Sims, Board of Elections Director, shared the Board of Elections Update and Acceptance of One-Time CARES and HAVA Funds. He asked the board to accept and appropriate an additional allocation of

\$885,927 of revenue and expenditures.

Chair Ford thanked Mr. Sims. He said that the board wants to make sure everyone has what they need for voting purposes.

Vice Chair Adamson said that citizens are lobbying for paid postage and there are rumors that armed vigilantes will prevent people from entering the polling places.

Mr. Sims said that statute has not changed as it relates to postage and the postage is the expense of the residents. He said that they can not apply any actions that are not already policies as it relates to weapons that are not part of the law. He said that the policies still apply on election day. He said that working with state and local partners, they are privy to information about issues and that they protect the citizens.

Chair Ford said that postage can not be expensed on the county's end. He shared his thoughts on taxes paying for postage.

Commissioner Calabria thanked Mr. Sims and the Board of Elections for their work. He asked about the changing landscape at the General Assembly and if things would change and affect anything at the Board of Elections as it relates to federal funding.

Mr. Sims said that there are bi-partisan teams that go out in the community especially to the nursing homes to assist them with voting but COVID has added new layers to how to best approach this outreach program due to budget constraints.

Commissioner Hutchinson thanked Mr. Sims for his work. He asked are there any concerns or needs he has that the board needs to know.

Mr. Sims said that they had been proactive about getting PPE in for staff so they were prepared at the outset. They continue to recruit workers and manage locations for voting, as with every department funding is a concern.

Commissioner Calabria said that promoting voting in the county is important. He said he would like to consider making election day a holiday and he encourages all Wake county employees to volunteer for election day assistance.

Commissioner Holmes noted the conversation she had with Mr. Sims about voting. She shared comments about pay raise for the elections department. It is slated to be on the August 17, 2020 agenda. She read a quote from Mr. Sims about the importance of participation in work at voting locations. "Yes its worth it, its a good investment especially in our younger

workers. Many of our seniors do it out of commitment to community and patriotism, but we need diversity of age and otherwise need to attract the next generation of officials."

Mr. Sims said that he is humbled for the concern to increase the pay for the Board of Elections. He shared that there are generations of families working at the Board of Elections. He said Wake County School System is offering the opportunity for students to be volunteers at voting locations for the process.

Commissioner Holmes shared that when the item is brought to the board that Vice Chair Adamson will read the motion as she was the person who first brought this issue forward.

Commissioner West echoed his colleagues. He said that he is concerned about the senior citizens and how COVID will affect their participation.

Mr. Sims shared that in NC there is an option for voting by absentee mail ballots. He shared that other options will be in place for voting.

Commissioner Evans made comments about the communications department partnering with the Board of Elections for videos etc.

Chair Ford echoed his colleagues.

Commissioner Hutchinson moved, seconded by Commissioner Evans, that the Board of Commissioners receive a Board of Elections update and accept and appropriate an additional allocation of \$885,927 of revenues and expenditures into the Grants Fund from the State of North Carolina to prepare for and respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) for 2020 elections related matters. The motion passed unanimously.

Chair Ford shared that this was a continuation from the work session today.

Mr. Ben Canada, Assistant to County Manager, shared the four options from the earlier meeting. He provided charts of each option listed below

and discussed the differences.

He shared there was another version of B but he did not have a chart for that.

Commissioner Hutchinson made the motion to accept proposal B.

Commissioner Holmes offered a friendly amendment. She stated that staff should acknowledge that there are other organizations that fit the criteria, i.e. Hope Center, Justice Served, and Wake Smiles. She asked that all organizations that fit ABC funding criteria be considered and the remaining funds be spread equally among the other organizations.

Chair Ford asked for direction on a motion and amendment.

Commissioner Hutchinson wanted clarification about what the new figures would be reflecting the amendment and how it would change the allocations to the current list of organizations.

Commissioner Evans asked a clarifying question to Commissioner Holmes amendment regarding evenly spreading additional funding.

Commissioner Holmes said it would only be to organizations that were on the list.

Mr. Canada said that the Hope Center and Wake Smiles would qualify, he did not find that Justice Served meets the criteria but if the board chooses to include them that can be done.

Manager Ellis said that Wake County ABC funds come from the ABC Board.

Recessed at 7:11 pm Reconvened at 7:28 pm

Mr. Canada shared the option B and explained the revisions to the chart of funding as requested by the amendment request by Commissioner Holmes.

He shared the new chart.

Commissioner Calabria asked for clarification on changes.

Mr. Canada asked Commissioner Holmes if the changes were what she had intended.

Commissioner Holmes reiterated her proposal that all the funds be distributed equally.

Commissioner Hutchinson shared that he does not accept Commissioner Holmes amendment.

Commissioner Holmes requested a roll call vote.

The motion passed 4-3.

Hutchinson - Yes Calabria - Yes Holmes - No Evans - Yes West - No Ford-Yes Adamson - No

Commissioner West said the way this was set up poorly. He said there was no direction or shift to better ways of doing things like we had agreed upon earlier.

Commissioner Holmes shared her frustrations along with Commissioner West. She said this is a step backwards. She requested again that the other organizations that fit ABC criteria be funded.

Commissioner Hutchinson said that funding these organizations was a long process and it was good to finish it and move the budget along.

Approved Motion: The attached handout shows the final allocation. The Board approved a motion to take the starting point allocations, then take three organizations out of the process and fund those with ABC fund balance. Those three organizations, and funding in the motion, were Dorcas Ministries (\$83,500), Step Up Ministry (\$27,000), and Green Chair (\$26,500).

Removing those three organizations from the process left \$137,000 available in the community organization funding process. Of this amount, the motion allocated \$118,000 to Marbles, bringing their FY21 amount to \$450,000. And, the motion allocated \$19,000 to Symphony, bringing their FY21 allocation to \$81,000.

In a separate Board action last night, \$125,000 from ABC fund balance was awarded to Triangle Family Services.

The Board expressed interest in possibly awarding ABC fund balance, a one-time funding source, to other community organizations. The approved motion did not approve additional awards. These funding decisions can be taken up at the August 10 work session or the August 17 regular meeting.

Contracts with Organizations Awarded Funding: County staff will immediately begin setting up contracts with the organizations awarded funding.

Board's Next Steps: Here are some possible next steps, following last night's discussion about community organization funding

- The Board expressed interest in discussing the uses of ABC fund balance (a one-time source of funding) at the August 10 work session or the August 17 regular meeting.
- Consider discussing the County's future financial and ownership model with Marbles at an upcoming meeting



WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Resolution Recognizing Systemic Racism and Discrimination, Our Shared Duty to Address it, and Declaration of Racism as a Public Health Crisis

WHEREAS, racism is rooted in the foundation of the United States of America, beginning with chattel slavery in 1619; the largest portion of the Black experience in America has been endured under slavery - originally enshrined in the Constitution of the United States itself - and subsequent Jim Crow laws, which allowed preferential opportunities for White Americans while subjecting people of color to hardships, disadvantages, and violence in every area of life and creating a legacy of inherited trauma across generations; and

WHEREAS, racism and discrimination manifests in distinct ways across other social intersections including gender identity, sexual orientation, class, disability, immigration status and age, and collectively reinforces the racial hierarchy throughout these intersections which weakens the strength of our entire humanity; and

WHEREAS, the Wake County Board of Commissioners recognizes that racism and discrimination are detrimental to our society and therefore are critical priorities necessitating systemic changes in all areas of local government. Racism and discrimination cause harm to individuals and communities, and Wake County's collective prosperity depends on equitable access to opportunity for every resident; and

WHEREAS, racism and discrimination weaken all of society by producing and perpetuating poverty through intentional and unintentional policies that create barriers to economic mobility; and

WHEREAS, racism and discrimination have multiple dimensions, including individual racism that is internalized or interpersonal, and systemic racism that is institutional, intergenerational and structural; and

WHEREAS, structural racism has resulted in race as a social determinant of health, with persistent racial disparities in housing and food security, criminal justice, education, healthcare, employment, worker protections, climate, and technology; and that data shows race, income, and ZIP Code have a bigger impacts on health than behavior, medical care, or genetic code; and

WHEREAS, social determinants of health have a disproportionate impact on communities of color, including food deserts, lack of safe places to recreate, lack of mental health services and lack of equitable educational and career opportunities; and

WHEREAS, the adverse impacts of racism and discrimination on health are well-documented. Chronic stress caused by racism and discrimination triggers many adverse health outcomes, including high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes, and accelerated aging, all of which are high in the Black and Brown community. There is also evidence suggesting that the racism endured by Black mothers contributes to the high maternal and infant mortality rate. In Wake County, Black babies are more than twice as likely to die as White babies in infancy; and

WHEREAS, Black people in Wake County are nearly twice as likely not to have health insurance, and Latinx/Hispanic persons are roughly four times more likely not to have health insurance; and

WHEREAS, research shows that social determinants — the conditions in which an individual is born and in which he or she lives, works, and recreates — are key drivers of health inequities. It has been proven that significant gaps in life expectancy exist among various zip codes in Wake County. For generations, communities of color have faced vast disparities in job opportunities, income, and inherited family wealth. They are less likely to have housing security, healthy food, and green spaces, ultimately leading to otherwise preventable deaths; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has further exposed systemic issues in our society related to health access, housing and food insecurity. As of June 30th, our Latinx/Hispanic population makes up about 10% of our population but 45% of our confirmed cases. Our Black population comprises 20% of our population but 24% of our confirmed cases. Accordingly, Black and Latinx/Hispanic persons account for approximately 30% of Wake County's population but yet 69 % of our confirmed cases; and

WHEREAS, Wake County strives to serve vulnerable populations in an equitable manner--as demonstrated by our investments in public education, housing affordability, social and economic vitality programs, and our recent initiatives on maternal and infant mortality, the WakeWorks program, and Live Well Wake--we are committed to the ending systemic racism and discrimination in our communities; and

WHEREAS, Wake County is a model employer, providing benefits such as parental leave, paid family illness leave, a living wage policy, in addition to strong health insurance and retirement benefits, which help lower-income and underserved populations. In the pursuit of social justice, Wake County has also enacted policies such as "Ban the Box" and a strong anti-discrimination and equal employment opportunity policy; and

WHEREAS, although there is no epidemiologic definition of "public health crisis," the health impacts of racism clearly exemplify the definition proposed by experts from the Boston University School of Public Health, which is that "The problem must affect large

numbers of people, it must threaten health over the long-term, and it must require the adoption of largescale solutions"; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS RESOLVES that racism is a pubic health crisis and must be treated with the same urgency and funding as any other public health crisis. The Wake County Board of Commissioners is committed to dismantling racism and discrimination by promoting racial equity through board goals and policies developed through a lens of diversity, inclusion, and equity and encourages other local, state, and federal entities to do the same.

Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners must approve funding for land

acquisition by the Wake County Board of Education.

Background: On April 28, 2020, the Board of Education approved the terms and

conditions for an offer to purchase all or a portion of three tracts of land containing a total of 5.762 acres located in the Western Wake County/Apex (adjacent to the E-41/ Apex Friendship Elementary School site ("AFES") from (1) 1071 Classic Road LLC, a North Carolina Limited Liability Company; (2) 3 Boys Capital LLC, a North Carolina Limited Liability Company, and (3) the Heirs of Maude Harris Stewart and the heirs of Floya Harris Richardson (hereinafter "Harris Heirs"), for a total price of \$624,420.00, subject to approval of funding by the Board of Commissioners. This land acquisition provides additional acreage necessary to support design and construction of a standard elementary school planned on this property, resulting in increased capacity beyond that of the smaller

school originally planned due to site constraints.

Board Goal: This Board action supports routine County operations.

Fiscal Impact: Funding is available from the Land Acquisition Component of the

Board of Education's Capital Improvement Plan Funds for the purchase price together with closing costs in an amount not to

exceed \$649.685.00.

Additional Information:

Need for Acquisition:

The Board of Education utilizes ongoing data-driven processes to identify school site locations needed to address growth and crowding in the Wake County Public School System. Acquisition needs were identified in the western Wake County area for additional capacity. Given the growth and development in the area, current utilization levels in area schools, the distance to existing and planned schools, and specific regional instructional program, the need to expand the land banked elementary school site in the area is well supported. In response to then current and projected school needs, the Board

of Education acquired a 108.456 acre site for a future middle and high school on May 13, 2011, which acquisition was approved by the Board of Commissioners on April 18, 2011. Thereafter, to enlarge the site to facilitate addition of an elementary school site, the Board of Education acquired an adjacent 3.919 acre site, which acquisition was approved by the Board of Commissioners on February 20, 2012. Apex Friendship High School and Middle School have been constructed on the three school site. E-41/AFES entered its design phase in the summer of 2019, and due to site constraints was planned as a small 528 student capacity school. The subject parcels are adjacent to the Board of Education's E-41/AFES on its western side. Their acquisition will be beneficial to design flexibility and will facilitate enlargement of the school program to a standard school size with a 736 student capacity to help meet growth needs. The ongoing AFES project, including the additional costs associated with enlargement of the program for the building and requisite site elements, is funded in the ongoing Capital Improvement Program.

Land Acquisition Criteria:

The proposed acquisition consists of all or a portion of three parcels located on the eastern side of Richardson Road south of its intersection with Humie Olive Road in Apex, Buckhorn Township, Wake County, NC. They include: (1) a 0.914 acre portion located on the eastern side of a parcel of land owned by 1701 Classic Road, LLC having PIN 0720-49-6990; (2) a 1.824 acre portion of a parcel of land owned by 3 Boys Capital, LLC having PIN 0720-49-3535; and (3) a 3.024 acre parcel of land owned by the Harris Heirs having PIN 0720-59-0123. The parcels are located immediately adjacent to the E-41/AFES site, and lies along the western boundary of the school site. The parcels are located within the Town of Apex and are currently zoned Planned Unit Development - Conditional Zoning (PUD-CZ), and are identified as being within the Friendship Station PUD. The subject property assemblage location is depicted below:



Other Due Diligence and Site Assessment:

Due diligence studies procured included a Geotechnical subsurface exploration study, streams and wetlands delineation, survey and appraisal. WCPSS staff has also had collaborative discussions with Town of Apex staff to review and discuss the acquisition of the subject property. Upon acquisition, the subject property will be recombined by survey with the E-41/AFES site.

Appraised Value Information:


An appraisal for the subject property was prepared by Neil Gustafson, MAI of Worthy & Wachtel Appraisers. Mr. Gustafson concludes that the market value of the land is \$634,000 (± 5.75 acres x \$110,000 per acre). The appraised value supports the total purchase price if \$624,420.00. Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners accepts all grant funds allocated from

the Federal Government. HUD has allocated additional ESG funds

to Wake County.

Background: Following Congress' appropriation of CARES Act funds, HUD

announced in early April its first round of special allocations under the CARES Act to respond to the growing effects of the historic public health crisis. The Board of Commissioners approved the acceptance and appropriation of \$2,018,046 of CARES Act funding on May 4,2020. Of that total, \$626,800 was for the ESG program, which

funds homelessness support and prevention programs.

In June, HUD announced the allocation of \$2.96 billion in ESG funding to support homeless Americans and individuals at risk of becoming homeless because of hardships such as job loss, wage reduction, or illness due to COVID-19. This funding is in addition to \$1 billion of ESG grants announced within a week of President Trump signing the CARES Act. Wake County will receive an additional \$1,709,995 in Federal ESG funds from HUD for homeless

populations amid coronavirus recovery.

Board Goal: This Board action complements housing affordability initiatives in the

Social and Economic Vitality goal area.

Fiscal Impact: The County will receive an additional \$1,709,995 in Federal ESG

funds from HUD under the CARES Act. The funds will be budgeted in the Housing Affordability and Community Revitalizations Special Revenue Fund. HUD has waived the matching requirement for these

funds.

Additional Information:

The FY 2019-2020 Action Plan was approved on June 3, 2019 by the Board of Commissioners. The Annual Action Plans describes the way Wake County Housing Affordability and Community Revitalization will use funds from HUD to help meet the housing and community development needs of low-moderate income families.

A substantial plan amendment, related to the CARES Act, requires public notice, a public comment period, and approval by the Board of Commissioners. The substantial amendment is forthcoming for BOC approval at a future meeting.

The CARES Act program funding proposed below, is to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and to facilitate assistance to eligible communities and households economically impacted by COVID-19 and requires BOC acceptance.

Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves and appropriates all grant

sources.

Background: In April, the U.S. Department of Transportation announced the

release of \$25 billion in CARES Act emergency grant funding to help municipal and regional transit providers cope with rising costs and falling ridership occurring because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Raleigh Urbanized Area's (UZA) apportionment totaled \$36.4 million.

Of this amount, Wake County's allocation is \$3,347,971.

Wake County will use these funds to provide critical transportation services to elderly and disabled citizens of Wake County, which may include medical trips, recreational trips, and trips to essential locations, such as pharmacies and grocery stores. In addition, Wake County anticipates using the CARES Act to pay for COVID-19 cleaning supplies and protective equipment, equipment and software needs, capital projects, and planning studies to improve operations. Unlike other allocations of CARES funds to the County, there is not a time limit for when these funds must be spent.

Wake County will also use CARES funding to offset lost ROAP funding of \$670,000. ROAP funding provides for approximately 25,000 GoWake Access trips to the elderly and disabled people living in rural parts of Wake County without access to public transportation. The State removed all ROAP funding from the state public transportation program budget for the state FY21.

Board Goal: The action complements initiatives in the Social and Economic

Vitality and Growth and Sustainability focus areas.

Fiscal Impact: The grant will provide an additional \$3,347,971 in revenues and

expenditures for the Human Services Transportation Fund for project participation. \$670,000 of these funds will offset lost ROAP funding.

There is no matching funds requirement.

Additional Information:

Because these CARES funds fall under the umbrella of federal formula transit grants apportioned to the Raleigh UZA, they are governed by a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between CAMPO, the City of Raleigh, Town of Cary, GoTriangle and Wake County. The MOU establishes the methodology or sub-allocation policy of federal formula transit grants. In the MOU, Wake County (GoWake Access) is designated a sub-recipient of the City of Raleigh for FTA purposes. Accordingly, a grant agreement needs to be approved between the County and the City for these funds. The Raleigh City Council Approved the agreement at its meeting on June 16, 2020.

The MOU identifies the City of Raleigh as the designated recipient with pre-award spending authority of federal formula transit grants and the City distributes funds to eligible sub-recipients as approved by a formal authorization of the CAMPO Executive Board. The City, as the UZA's designated recipient, has been allocated FTA CARES Act funding in the amount of \$36.4 million. Of this amount, \$3.347 million is Wake County's allocation which is anticipated to be distributed into the following expense categories:

On Friday, June 19, the NC Senate passed H77 with no change in the bill's language removing all funding from the state public transportation program budget for the Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) in state FY21. These funds are used to provide trips to the elderly and disabled and people living in rural parts of the county without access to public transportation. This results in the loss of approximately \$670,000 to

Wake County for GoWake Access which translates to approximately 25,000 trips annually. CARES funds will be used to backfill the loss in state funding and keep the current service level. The funds will be used to provide critical transportation services to elderly and disabled citizens of Wake County, which may include medical trips, recreational trips, and trips to essential locations, such as pharmacies and grocery stores.

In addition, Wake County anticipates using the CARES Act to pay for COVID-19 cleaning supplies and protective equipment, software needs, Capital projects such as updated vehicle security equipment, vehicle radios, and planning studies to improve operations such as; Zone Based Scheduling, and Transfer Station Safety. Unlike other allocations of CARES funds to the County, there is not a time limit for when these funds must be spent.

GoWake Access staff have made extensive plans to operate safely in the present environment. Specific safety measures include the following:

- Plexiglass shields are scheduled to be installed on all vehicles by the end of August.
- Vendor will continue to promote social distancing by limiting the number of people scheduled to ride in vehicles
- Sanitizing stations are currently being upfitted in service vans
- Masks will be provided to any rider that requests one
- Drivers are provided gloves, masks, sanitizer, disposable sleeves, face shields, and additional cleaning supplies in order to sanitize the vehicle and all vehicle components accessible to the public
- Vehicles are cleaned at the end of each shift
- Staff arriving to the Operations Center will have their temperature checked prior to entry as well as asked a series of questions to determine possible exposure

OTHER PROGRAM COMPONENTS

Partial Renovation and Improvements (PRIMP)

This item also includes appropriations to address individual building needs or improvements that would not otherwise be addressed because the total needs analysis does not warrant a major renovation to an entire campus. A \$4.2 million allocation is included in this item to address these projects.

Technology – Devices

The \$18.55 million appropriation covers staff device replacements, student devices, and classroom technology. The specific details of the spending are unknown at this time due to the rapidly changing situation surrounding the coronavirus.

Other Ongoing Program Support Items

The item also includes ongoing program support appropriations for management on the school system's building program, land acquisitions, facility assessments, and mobile/modular relocations.

REALLOCATIONS

A reallocation of \$5,000,000 from West Millbrook Middle to H-12 (\$1,777,661) and Swift Creek Elementary (\$3,222,339) is needed to refund a previous reallocation for an early site package. The previous reallocation was approved by the Board of Commissioners on January 21, 2020 and allowed work to begin in spring/summer 2020 on West Millbrook Middle, which mitigated some schedule risks with no impact to H-12 or Swift Creek Elementary.

A reallocation of \$500,000 from Fuquay Varina High to E-51 is needed for an early site package. To support emerging dewatering scope related to the breaching of existing ponds on site.

A reallocation of \$5,000,000 of unused FY 2020 program contingency to property acquisition is needed to meet reductions to the FY 2021 plan as requested by the County. This reallocation was discussed and agreed upon by the WCPSS-County facilities core team during the FY 2021 budget development process.

Staff Comments

Staff recommends approval of the appropriations and reallocations as requested. The actions are in accordance with the planned funding schedule and accounted for in the County's financial model.

<u>Item Title</u>: MOA for Disposition and Development of Affordable Housing on

County-Owned Property in Holly Springs

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners authorizes the County Manager to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between Wake County, the Town of Holly Springs, DHIC and MyComputerCareer (MyCC) represented by Savills USA, to participate in a process coordinating the disposition and development of real property at 1317 N. Main St. in Holly Springs, subject to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves all Wake County real estate

transactions and related agreements.

Background: Effective September 1, 2019, the Wake County Evaluation and

Disposition of County-owned Land for Affordable Housing Policy was approved. In accordance with this policy and in consultation with the Town of Holly Springs, a Request for Proposals (RFP #20-006) was released on January 1, 2020 for property located at 1317 N. Main St., Holly Springs, NC. This is the first development project stemming

from the Evaluation and Disposition Policy.

Upon closing of the Request for Proposal period, DHIC and MyComputerCareer (MyCC), represented by Savills USA, were recommended as the lead applicants and Project Sponsors. Prior to conveyance of the property, Wake County, the Town of Holly Springs, and the Project Sponsors will enter into an Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to meet mutually agreed upon milestones during a period of due diligence prior to contract execution and disposition

of the property from the County.

Board Goal: This Board action complements housing affordability initiatives in the

Social and Economic Vitality and Economic Strength goal areas.


Fiscal Impact: Disposition of the property will occur at a later date upon satisfactory

completion of terms identified in the MOA.

Additional Information:

The Wake County Evaluation and Disposition of County-owned Land for Affordable Housing Policy established uniform procedures for the evaluation and disposition of available County-owned property to develop affordable housing. The Housing Affordability & Community Revitalization (Housing) Department evaluated properties for

potential development of affordable housing. The property located at 1317 N. Main St., Holly Springs is a priority property for disposition and development of affordable housing.



On January 1, 2020, RFP #20-006 was released to the disposition the 19.89-acre tract of undeveloped land (REID # 0414978). The RFP sought a forward-thinking development team to purchase and develop a mixed-income, mixed-use project that included legally-binding, affordable rental or ownership housing as a portion of the total development, as well as uses that meet the needs of the Town of Holly Springs and its residents.

A review committee comprised of Wake County and Town of Holly Springs staff considered the RFP submission. DHIC and MyCC, represented by Savills USA, was recommended as the lead applicant and Project Sponsors with a responsive and responsible proposal. DHIC, Inc., is a non-profit affordable housing developer that have partnered with the County on multiple development projects. MyComputerCareer, Inc., was founded in Holly Springs in 2008 and currently employs over 250 residents in the Triangle area as an adult technical school with courses taught online and at seven campuses in North Carolina, Indiana, Ohio, and Texas.

The proposed development would consist of approximately 125 units of family-oriented and senior affordable housing apartments serving an average of households with incomes less than 60% of Area Median Income (AMI), which is \$39,540 for an individual or \$56,460 for a family of four. Across Wake County, an average of current rental rates for 60% AMI households is \$915 for a one-bedroom or \$1,303 for a three-bedroom. Rental

rates are determined by the rental product and local market; however, an individual or family should pay no more than 30% of their income on housing costs to be considered affordable.

In addition, the development would offer a multistory office building to be occupied by MyComputerCareer to support an anticipated 525 employees. In addition, approximately 10,000 square feet of retail space would be located near the office building designed for businesses that can service office employees, residents of the housing development, and the community at-large. It may also include a state-of-the-art performing arts theatre capable of providing local, regional, and nationally acclaimed programming.

As outlined in the MOA, the Project Sponsors will take the lead on all development aspects including project delivery and design and achieving the development goals as outlined in the County RFP and project proposal. The Town will work to identify opportunities to ensure optimal progression of the development proposal through the Town's entitlement approval process, as well as any economic incentives offered for business retention and expansion. The County will take the lead on property disposition and process facilitation.

During the Term of the MOA, all parties agree to work together according to the mutually developed work plan with targeted dates of achievement of significant milestones. Should all parties satisfactorily complete the scope of work in the attached MOA, this item may come back to the Board of Commissioners for approval to disposition the property.

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves all Wake County real estate

transactions, including ownership transfers of properties that have received loans from the County. Approval by the Board of Commissioners is necessary prior to the conversion for DHIC to

remain compliant with the Wake County's Deed of Trust.

Background: In November 2002, Wake County issued a \$290,000 loan to DHIC,

Inc. on behalf of the ownership entity, Highland Seniors Limited Partnership, to develop The Commons at Highland Village, a 68-unit affordable senior development in Cary, NC. This project has completed the 15-year compliance period under the low-income housing tax credit program. DHIC's non-profit affiliate, Community Revitalization and Preservation Corporation (CRPC) will assume management of the project to keep the development affordable for 15 more years and satisfy the terms of the loans to the project from

the County and other lenders.

Nationwide Affordable Housing Fund IX and RBC Community Investments Manager II, Inc. (the Special Limited Partner) wish to transfer 100 percent of their ownership interest to Community Revitalization and Preservation Corporation ("CRPC"), a non-profit affiliate of DHIC, Inc. in order to preserve the long-term affordability of the development. The ownership entity, Highland Seniors Limited Partnership, will convert to The Commons at Highland Village, LLC.

Board Goal: This action complements housing affordability initiatives in the

Social and Economic Vitality goal area.

Fiscal Impact: This item has no financial impact on the County. The County will not

contribute funding, issue new debt, and annual debt service

payments remain consistent.

Additional Information:

The Commons at Highland Village is a 68-unit affordable senior property located at 1500 Highland Village Drive in Cary, NC. In November 2002, Wake County issued a \$290,000 loan to DHIC, Inc. on behalf of Highland Seniors Limited Partnership to develop the property. The Commons at Highland Village has met its 15-year low-income housing tax credit compliance period. As a result, the original equity investors - Apollo Tax Credit Fund – XXXI Limited Partnership and RBC Community Investments Manager II, Inc. – no longer have a role to play in management of the property and will exit the partnership. This is a normal and common occurrence in the life cycle of tax credit properties when the compliance period has been met. CRPC, a non-profit affiliate of DHIC, Inc. will assume management of the property and will be sole member of the new ownership entity, The Commons and Highland Village, LLC.

The Board of Directors of CRPC is made up of the executive committee members of the DHIC Board of Directors. DHIC has completed this same transaction with fifteen properties in the past; only Weston Trace, Beechridge Limited Partnership, Madison Glen, Beechridge II, and Lennox Chase required consent by Wake County. The other properties do not contain County funds, so no County approval was required for the Conversion. The conversion of The Commons at Highland Village will make the ownership structure consistent with these other properties, allowing DHIC to manage all of them more consistently and cost-effectively. The Village at Highland Commons, LLC will continue as the borrower under the County's loan and no action will be required to cause the loan to continue to be in full force and effect. There will be no changes to the loan terms, lien position, or repayment of the County loan.

Purpose: Federal law requires that the recipient jurisdictions, the Board of

Commissioners in this case, approve the plans on how the Home

and Community Care Block Grant funds will be allocated.

Background: The Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG) for Older

Adults is federal funding made available to the local community from the Division of Aging and Adult Services, through the Triangle J Council of Government Area Agency on Aging. The allocations per county have been released and \$3,527,334 has been apportioned for Wake County for Fiscal Year 2021. The funds are used to purchase services such as home-delivered and congregate meals, transportation, case assistance, respite care, adult day care, housing counseling, senior centers, etc. Upon approval, the funds will be sent directly from Triangle J Council of Governments to Resources for

Seniors, Inc. and Meals on Wheels of Wake County.

Board Goal: Great Government: Promote a vision of a county government that

partners with all levels of government to empower, protect and serve its citizens through a culture of respect, collaboration and innovation.

Fiscal Impact: The \$3,527,334 apportionment will be sent directly from Triangle J

Council of Governments to Resources for Seniors, Inc. and Meals on Wheels of Wake County. The FY 2021 County Funding Plan for the HCCBG requires a local match of \$391,926. A total of \$384,759 is appropriated in the Wake County Human Services General Fund FY 2021 budget for project participation. The benefiting community

partners will contribute the difference of \$7,167.

Additional Information:

The allocations per county have been released and \$3,527,334 has been apportioned for Wake County for Fiscal Year 2021. Wake County does not operate as a pass-through agent for these funds. Agencies receive their designated allocations directly from Triangle J. However, the County does match each of these allocations with local dollars. The County's total share of the match is \$391,926 but due to budget shortfalls, Wake County will contribute at FY20 levels of \$384,759. External funds of \$2,723 will be secured by

Meals on Wheels of Wake County and \$4,444 by Resources for Seniors, Inc. to meet the required local match. The funds have been identified in the Human Services' General Fund Fiscal Year 2021 Adopted budget. The breakdown per agency is as follows:

Purpose: The local Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) develops

the annual plan, setting priorities for funding in the next year. The Department of Public Safety (DPS) requires the Board of Commissioners in each County to approve the Council's annual

plan before releasing DPS funds.

Background: JCPC funds are made available to Wake County from the

North Carolina DPS Division of Juvenile Justice to provide community-based delinquency and gang prevention strategies and programs. State statute sets the intent and responsibilities for JCPCs. The statute requires representation from local government, local public and private agencies serving juveniles and their families, local business leaders, citizens with an interest in youth problems, and youth representatives to

participate in plan development.

Wake County's JCPC uses the funds to provide services such as skill building programs for youth suspended from school, afterschool and weekend life-skills programs, literacy programs, emergency residential placement, restitution and community service programming, and parenting programs. For the \$1.8 million allocated in FY 2021, the JCPC prioritized strengthening services for youth who may have been exposed

to trauma or may be serious or violent offenders.

Board Goal: This action supports routine County operations.

Fiscal Impact: The revenue and expenditures are included as part of the

annual budget process. The County will satisfy the match requirement by using funds already budgeted in the FY 2021

Human Services General Fund Adopted budget.

Additional Information:

After considering the risk and needs of Wake County youth, the JCPC prioritized strengthening services for youth who may have been exposed to trauma or may be serious or violent offenders. This includes, but is not limited to, services for gang-involved

youth. The JCPC prioritized the following risk and protective factors to address programs in the FY 2020-2021 Request for Proposals:

Background: Wake County contracts with a third party to provide:

System ambulance service billing

EMS System subscription program management and renewal process

• EMS System Debt Set-off program management

The County currently contracts with Change Healthcare Technology Enabled Services LLC and the contract was set to expire in 2020. In March of 2020, a competitive RFP process was conducted. The RFP team included EMS System Leadership, and staff from Finance and Information Services.

Seven vendors responded to the RFP process. After an initial review of the vendor responses, two vendors (Digitech, and EMS Management and Consultants, Inc.) were elevated for further interviews/demonstrations. Both of the elevated vendors were determined to be able to provide a high level of service and met the RFP requirement; however, the evaluation team felt EMS Management and Consultants, Inc. provided the best value for Wake County. This item authorizes the County Manager to execute a services agreement with EMS Management and Consultants, Inc. to provide these billing and management services.

Board Goal: This action supports routine County operations.

Fiscal Impact: At a billing rate of 3.90% the first year estimated cost for this service

will be \$819,000 with a five-year estimated cost of \$4,095,000. The first-year costs are included in the EMS FY 2021 operating budget. Funding for future years of the agreement will be included in EMS'

base budget.

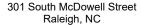
Additional Information:

The EMS Billing RFP (20-028) Team conducted online interviews/presentations with Digitech and EMS Management and Consultants Inc. The Team met to review our combined scores and discuss our selection, and though it was extremely close the team felt that EMS Management and Consultants, Inc. was our best choice. The RFP Team recommends entering into a three-year contract with two one-year extensions for a potential five-year total term.

The Department of Emergency Medical Services has begun the contract process as well as the transition process from the current vendor to the new vendor. The transition is anticipated to take through September 30th therefore, a one-month extension contract will need to be signed with the current vendor to allow for the transition period.

The Triangle Trails Initiative seeks to build a regional network of connected greenways, trails and blueways across the Triangle and beyond. The Triangle J Council of Government along with representatives from the Wake County, Cities of Raleigh and Durham along with regional trail advocates first convened in Fall 2017 to discuss the growing demand for greenways and the desire for a more connected regional approach to greenway systems. Through a grant from the AJ Fletcher Foundation, Chuck Flink and Greenways Incorporated were hired to transform the concept of the Triangle Trails initiative a reality.

The Triangle Trails initiative includes 14 counties: Chatham, Durham, Franklin, Harnett, Granville, Johnston, Cumberland, Lee, Moore, Orange, Person, Vance, Wake and Warren.

In the current phase of planning, stakeholders are meeting with local governments to garner support for the initiative. The Open Space and Parks Advisory Committee received a presentation regarding the initiative at their June meeting and voted unanimously to support the initiative.

Two other regional trails initiatives, the Carolina Thread Trail and the Piedmont Legacy Trails initiatives have been created within the State.

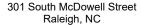

Item Summary:

Purpose: State statute requires County Commissioners to appoint a tax

administrator for the County.

Background: Marcus Kinrade has served as Wake County Tax Administrator since

2008. This action reappoints Mr. Kinrade to a four-year term extending to July 2024. Pursuant to NCGS 105-295 and 105-349(g), the Tax Administrator should take the statutory oath of office for the Assessor and Collector. The Chairman of the Board of Commissioners may administer this oath pursuant to NCGS 11-9.

Board Goal: This action supports standard County operations.

Fiscal Impact: This action has no financial impact.

Additional Information:

The Tax Administrator, as to his duties specific to the assessment of taxes per NCGS 105-294:

- 1. Must be appointed by the Board of Commissioners every two or four years, and
- 2. Must within every two-year period, attend at least 30 hours of instruction in the appraisal and assessment of property, and
- 3. Can only be terminated during his term by the Board of County Commissioners for good cause shown, and only after giving him notice in writing and an opportunity to appear and be heard in a public session of the Board.

The Tax Administrator, as to his duties specific to the collection of taxes per NCGS 105-349:

1. Must be bonded, and

2. Can only be terminated during his term by this Board of County Commissioners for good cause shown, and only after giving him notice in writing and an opportunity to appear and be heard in a public session of the Board, unless he has failed to properly settle and account for tax receipts per NCGS 105-352(b).

On September 2, 2008, Marcus D. Kinrade was appointed to a four-year term as Wake County Tax Administrator following the retirement of Emmett D. Curl. Having excelled during this initial four-year term, Mr. Kinrade was reappointed to a second term on August 6, 2012.

During his second term, the North Carolina Tax Collectors' Association named him the 2014 North Carolina Tax Collector of the year. Following the successful 2016 Countywide reappraisal, he was reappointed to a third term on August 1, 2016.

During his third term, the tax office and Mr. Kinrade earned several jurisdictional and personal awards and recognitions including: a 2018 Distinguished Large Jurisdiction award from the North Carolina Association of Assessing Officers; a 2018 Government Innovation Award from 1105 Media Inc; was a National finalist in both 2018 and 2020 for a Smart Cities of North America award from IDC; a 2019 NACO Achievement Award; a 2019 LGFCU Excellence in Innovation Award; and Mr. Kinrade was named a 2019 LocalSmart GoldenGov County Executive of the Year.

Mr. Kinrade is a graduate of Coastal Carolina Community College and the University of North Carolina at Wilmington with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Information Systems, is credentialed by the North Carolina Department of Revenue and the North Carolina Association of Assessing Officers as a certified property tax Assessor, is credentialed by the North Carolina Tax Collectors' Association as a certified property tax Collector, and has earned the professional designations of "Assessment Administration Specialist" and "Residential Evaluation Specialist" from the International Association of Assessing Officers. He previously served honorably on active duty in the United States Marine Corps and resides in Garner with his family.

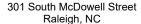

Waivers, Tax Relief Applications, Refund Requests and Various

Reports

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners approves the attached recommendations by the Tax Committee.

Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves all tax relief actions

requested by taxpayers. On a monthly basis, the Tax Committee meets to consider taxpayer requests and makes recommendations

to the Board.

Background: If a taxpayer believes they have been billed incorrectly, wish to

appeal a decision of the Tax Administration, seek relief of penalties or submit a late request for exemption, exclusion or deferment, they

can request a hearing before the Tax Committee.

The Tax Committee meets monthly and makes recommendations to the Board of Commissioners. The Board approves all tax relief actions. The Tax Committee meets on the third Thursday of each month at 1 p.m. in the Tax Administration's Conference Room to review requests and make a recommendation to the Board of Commissioners. This meeting is publicized and open to the public.

The Tax Committee presents information to the Wake County Board of Commissioners each month for review, showing the name of the taxpayer, description of property, account number, tax year, relief

sought, and recommended action.

Board Goal: This item supports routine business of the County as required by

North Carolina General Statutes and does not relate to a specific

Board initiative.

Fiscal Impact: The fiscal impact of this item varies from month to month based on

requests but is generally negligible as a percent of the total County

budget.

Additional Information:

The Tax Committee is comprised of Kim Lorbacher, Financial Services Manager with Wake County Finance; Natasha Baldwin, Finance Manager with the City of Raleigh and Jessica Murphy-Rhem, Accounting Supervisor with the Town of Cary. Marcus Kinrade, Wake County Tax Administrator, serves as the clerk to the Tax Committee.

Some reasons a property owner may request a hearing before the Tax Committee are:

- They were penalized for listing personal property after January 31.
- They take exception to the value placed on their property and received notice of the value after the Board of Equalization and Review adjourned.
- Their personal property listing was audited and they are seeking relief of discovered value or applicable penalties.
- They filed a late application for an exemption, exclusion or deferment on a property.
- An application for exemption, exclusion or deferment was denied by the Tax Administration and the wish to appeal that decision.
- A penalty was imposed for the late filing or late payment of a gross receipt tax and penalty relief is requested.
- A refund has been requested for a tax imposed through a clerical error, an illegal tax, or a tax levied for an illegal purpose.
- A refund exceeding the threshold the finance officer is authorized to issue has been requested.

The tax committee has adopted criteria that may provide partial or full relief of late list penalties applied to personal property discoveries if one of the following criteria is met:

- 1. The property owner is new to North Carolina.
- 2. The property owner inadvertently neglected to list equipment in the first year of ownership.
- 3. Prior year property listings were timely filed.
- 4. Items were inadvertently omitted from a listing filed timely.
- 5. The property owner was on military deployment or medically incapacitated.
- 6. The property owner self-reported assets that were not listed properly in prior vears.
- 7. The property owner was cooperative with an audit and no property tax was lost due to being beyond the five-year audit period.

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result
 of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful
 attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the
 audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The
 recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be handdelivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31st of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.

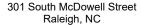

Item Summary:

Purpose:

Pursuant to State law, counties are authorized to expend funds for purposes of locating industrial and commercial facilities in the County. On April 7, 2020, Bandwidth, Inc. announced it will construct a new facility in Wake County for software engineering and development and create 1,165 new jobs with an average salary of \$96,832 and an estimated \$106,426,500 million in new investment.

Background:

Bandwidth, Inc. connects businesses and consumers with a communications platform as a service ("CPaaS"). Its networking technology is utilized by major names such as Google, Microsoft, Cisco and Zoom. The fast-growing company reported \$232.6 million in revenue for 2019, up 14% from 2018. Bandwidth has been based in Raleigh since its founding 20 years ago, and its workforce currently totals more than 750.

Partners:

- NC Department of Commerce JDIG program
- Wake County Economic Development
- City of Raleigh
- North Carolina Community College System

Board Goal:

This action supports Objective ES1: Support Wake County Economic Development's efforts to bring targeted jobs and businesses to Wake County.

Fiscal Impact:

The County agrees to an economic development grant of 50% of new tax growth over 8 years totaling an estimated \$2,554,236. Funds would be generated from property tax base growth, and the incentive would be budgeted and paid back to Bandwidth, Inc. through the Economic Development element within the County Capital Fund.

Additional Information:

On September 16, 2019, the Wake County Board of Commissioners met in closed session and authorized the County Manager to negotiate a business development grant agreement for the project.

Bandwidth, Inc. qualifies for a grant consistent with a Tier 2 Grant of the Wake County Business Development Grant Policy. In order to receive grant payment from the County, in each Grant Year, Bandwidth, Inc. must meet performance criteria as outlined in the County's agreement. These performance criteria include:

- 1. Completed New investment (> \$106,426,500 million)
- 2. New job creation (at least 1,165 new jobs with average wages of 120% of Wake County's average wage)
- 3. Payment in full of Wake County property taxes for all previous and current years in which taxes are owed
- 4. Qualification for JDIG payment

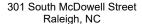
Based on the draft contract, Bandwidth, Inc. would receive their first grant payment upon submittal of appropriate documentation to the Wake County Tax Administrator. The first payments would likely be for tax year 2025 when the new investment exceeds \$106,426,500 million and all other terms of the agreement are met. The following chart is for illustration purposes only. The actual business development grant annual amount will be based on new annual assessed valuations as determined by the Wake County Tax Administrator. The draft contract with Bandwidth, Inc. is developed similar to prior Business Development Grant Agreements that provide a grant for projects in Tier 2.
