#### Manager's Report

**10.** Special Recognition for Emergency Operations Center Staff

Manager David Ellis shared a special recognition for the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) staff. His comments follow.

- It's my pleasure to be here tonight to update you on our ongoing response to COVID-19.
- We've reached a major milestone in our efforts to combat the pandemic, and I've come before you tonight to celebrate and honor all the amazing Wake County employees who helped us get to this point.

#### An Historic Milestone

- Last Wednesday marked Day 204 in the Emergency Operations Center.
- 204 days.
- That's 7 months of hard work and dedication to a single effort keeping our community safe from a virus that's already taken more than 250 lives in our county alone.
- It's also the longest emergency activation in Wake County history.
- Typically, our E-O-C stints number a week or two at most.
- Our COVID-19 response has been dramatically different in comparison.

#### Transitioning to a Public Health Event

- After 204 days, I can say with confidence that this operation runs like a well-oiled machine.
- We know how to investigate positive cases, conduct contact tracing and provide testing for those who think they may have been exposed to the virus.
- That's why last week we transitioned our response from an "emergency" operation, because unfortunately, we'll be dealing with COVID-19 for some time, and we must incorporate it as a function of "normal, continuing operations."
- Let me be clear this in no way means we're giving less effort to the fight against COVID-19.
- It remains the county's top priority, and we are not taking our foot off the gas in our push to protect the community.
- COVID-19 is still a public health emergency, and we take management of that very seriously.
- But, now that we have the processes and procedures established and working well, we no longer need the oversight that the EOC structure provides.
- And, just like the other programs and services, we now turn the management of direct COVID-19 operations over to our Public

Health Division, since this is - at its core - a public health issue.

- I have complete confidence in our Public Health team to continue leading us in the right direction to combat COVID-19 while we wait for a vaccine.
- But they will not be alone.
- Many departments, along with the County Manager's Office, have signed a formal agreement to support the COVID-19 Operations Unit until its work is no longer needed... and we all hope that will be soon.
- Additionally, in our response to COVID-19, we created many programs over the past 204 days that have become part of our on-going services.
- They include: House Wake!, WakeHELPS, food security efforts, job training programs and more.
- Our departments have stood up these much-needed services and will continue to operate them in our community.

### Recognizing the EOC Staff

- I would be remiss if I didn't take a few minutes to talk about the incredible employees who helped us get to this important point.
- My original plan had been to have their names scroll you know, like at the start of a Star Wars movie while I talked about them.
- But, honestly, there are so many names to highlight that I would've had to talk for a LONG TIME to get through them all, and we figured you probably didn't want that!
- All joking aside, I do think that is telling.
- Hundreds of members of our workforce dedicated time to the E-O-C from March to September.
- Never before have we had to call on that many people to help out in an emergency.

- For the first few months of this operation, they worked 12-hour shifts.
- From 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., they plugged away, developing workflows and establishing plans around a constantly evolving virus.
- That meant long hours away from their families at a time when children were jumping headfirst into virtual school and other family members were adjusting to months of staying "safer at home."
- I know this was hard on our staff, and there are no words for me to say how much I appreciate the sacrifices they made at home to serve their community during this challenging time.

#### Departmental Acknowledgments

- I want the board to know that every department played a role in making the EOC successful.
- They all contributed staff to the effort.
- At one point, I'm sure we had most of the Human Services, EMS and Fire Services leadership teams manning critical positions within the EOC.
- Without their support, we could not have established the framework early on for the processes that are now running smoothly today.
- Community Services offered up more than 100 librarians without hesitation to serve as contact tracers.
- With their established customer service skills, they were the perfect fit to trace possible exposure from positive cases to potential contacts.
- G-S-A and Information Services worked around the clock to make sure we had the tools, space and access we needed to be productive during those long hours.
- Our Communications office sent more than 160 news releases, answered hundreds of media calls, and launched important campaigns to help those impacted financially by COVID-19, including programs that you all heartily endorsed, such as Wake Forward, House Wake! and WakeHELPS.
- As you can see, this has been a total team effort.

- And, every team needs leaders.
- I'd like to recognize several of them now, so I can specifically thank them for their dedication to this response effort.
- For the first 2 people on the list our Human Services Director Regina Petteway and our Fire Services Director Nick Campasano the event lasted so long they retired before Day 204!
- But, I still want to acknowledge them, because they were instrumental in providing leadership to our COVID-19 efforts until their respective retirements in June and August.
- To continue my list, I will start with our doctors who have led the way since Day 1:

- Each of them coordinated significant efforts throughout the 204 days, and their work hasn't slowed down, as many of these programs are now continuing as part of our new normal operations.
- I want to thank them for their leadership and hard work over late

nights, early mornings and weekends over the past 204 days.

#### Challenge Coins

- It's important to me to show our staff with more than words that we appreciate them and are so grateful for their dedication to the COVID-19 EOC response effort.
- That's why we designed these.
- It's a challenge coin.
- On one side, it says "Wake County Government. Presented by Wake County Manager David Ellis."
- On the other side, it says: "For dedicated and extraordinary service to the people of Wake County," and it has a picture of the virus in the center with the words "COVID-19 Pandemic 2020."
- We'll give one of these specially-made coins to every person who supported the EOC in its COVID-19 response.
- While we wish we could hand them out in the board chambers and let each person come by and shake your hand, we know that's not safe right now.
- So, unfortunately, they'll be distributed remotely. However, each one will come with a video message of appreciation from me.
- As always, Wake County finds new ways to do what's good and what's right in these unprecedented times.

#### Conclusion

- Our employees are what make Wake County Government great.
- I hope if there's one thing you take away from my comments today, it's this - our team is incredible, and we would not be as well-positioned as we are right now without their diligence, dedication and desire to serve our residents.
- Nothing about the past 7 months has been easy.

But, we've achieved success because of our employees.

He shared the Challenge coin that will be given to all of the volunteers that worked in the EOC.

Chairman Ford shared that Manager Ellis' leadership has been leadership in action. He shared that Manager Ellis had already put things in perspective and lead the model example of how organizations should function. He shared that he is proud of Mr. Ellis' leadership. He said that from the beginning of this crisis Manager Ellis had already put things in place to address all the needs. He said that he has not heard a single complaint from staff. He shared that this is trademark leadership and said that he will continue to support Mr. Ellis' leadership.

Commission Hutchinson shared that he is pleased that Mr. Ellis is the Manager and proud that he is a part of the team. He shared that he is proud of all of the staff and their time and efforts. He shared thoughts about the operations of the EOC and the staff that shared their time and families to make our citizens, happy, healthy and safe. He shared that today is a celebration of all of the employees for their dedication to Wake County.

Commissioner Evans thanked Manager Ellis and all of the staff that participated in the EOC. She shared how citizens would be impacted during the virus. She shared thoughts on housing and other programs that have taken place during the pandemic. She thanked Manager Ellis for his leadership.

Commissioner Holmes shared that Manager Ellis began the meeting singing and she is glad to have Mr. Ellis' voice. She shared that Manager Ellis leads with humbleness and integrity. She thanked the staff and the leadership team.

Commissioner West shared a quote from Oliver Wendell Holmes, "what lies behind us and what lies before us are tine matters compared to what lies within us." He shared that a character of a person comes out strong during challenges and difficulties. He shared that he is thankful and full of pride and thanked the Manager and the staff for their hard work during the pandemic. He shared that he hopes that the entire team can continue to work from the heart.

Commissioner Calabria shared that we don't spend enough time thanking people that dedicate their lives and careers keeping us healthy and safe. He congratulated Manager Ellis and all of the people who stepped up and answered the call. He shared that Wake County has has an opportunity to affect individual lives and how lives have been changed. He shared that the numbers are substantially greater than other counties and he is proud of Wake County. Vice-Chair Adamson shared her thoughts on the EOC. She shared that lives were saved, prevented people from being ill, and that people have been protected. She said most people have no idea how much work and effort it takes to operate at this level.

Manager Ellis thanked Scott Warren and the attorney's office for all of their behind the scenes. He also thanked Gary Sims, Election Director and the Sheriff's office for their work on the ground and support.

Chairman Ford shared that the least that the board could do is share their thanks and gratitude.

Accept and Appropriate One-Time CARES Act Grant Funds from the North Carolina Department of Transportation to Human Services GoWake Access

That the Board of Commissioners accepts and appropriates an additional \$283,306 of revenues and expenditures into the Human Services Transportation Fund from the NC Department of Transportation to continue operating services in rural communities.

Item Title: Accept and Appropriate One-Time CARES Act Grant Funds from the North Carolina Department of Transportation to Human Services GoWake Access

# Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners accepts and appropriates an additional \$283,306 of revenues and expenditures into the Human Services Transportation Fund from the NC Department of Transportation to continue operating services in rural communities.

### Item Summary:

- Purpose: In accordance with the North Carolina Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the Board of Commissioners must approve all amendments that increase the budget for a fund.
- Background: The CARES Act provides emergency assistance and health care response for individuals, families and businesses affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and provides emergency appropriations to support Executive Branch agency operations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The State of North Carolina received funding under the CARES Act and is making grants to rural and small urban public transportation systems, to assist with operating expenses, support capital, and other expenses to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19.

These funds will allow GoWake Access to enforce the Center for Disease Control recommendations for COVID-19 safety protocols as outlined by the Community Transportation Association of America. GoWake Access will make purchases as outlined under eligible activities for reimbursement such as personal protective equipment supplies (for passengers and drivers), driver compartment barriers, vehicle/transit facility cleaning and disinfecting, and fuel costs.

Board Goal: This action supports routine County operations.

Fiscal Impact: The grant will provide an additional \$283,306 of revenues in the Human Services Transportation Fund to support increased expenses as a result of COVID-19. There is no matching funds requirement

# Additional Information:

GoWake Access intends to allocate the CARES Act grant funds as follows, to ensure continued operating services in rural communities and prevent, prepare, and respond due to the COVID-19 public health emergency:

Budget Category	Amount
Temporary Services	\$50,000
Protective Equipment / Cleaning Supplies	\$130,000
Contractual Services	\$70,000
Other Operating Costs	\$33,306
Total	\$283,306

CARES Act funding will be provided at a 100% federal share with no local match required. There is no limit on the percentage of funding that can be used for operating purposes. Expenses are eligible retroactively to January 20, 2020 through June 30, 2021. Transit systems are encouraged to spend funds expeditiously to respond to local needs.

### Item Summary:

- Purpose: In accordance with the North Carolina Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the Board of Commissioners must approve all amendments that increase the budget for a fund.
- Background: In September, Wake County applied for grant funding from the National League of Cities Local Democracy Initiative to further efforts on community engagement stemming from the 2020 Census. Although the census ended on September 30<sup>th</sup>, the grant will support continued community engagement activities in two historically undercounted and hard-to-count communities in rural eastern Wake County with the infrastructure already built for the 2020 census. Staff will use tools, like newsletters, social media, and virtual community meetings to engage and inform residents on community initiatives that impact their area.
- Board Goal: This action supports routine County operations.

Fiscal Impact: National League of Cities Local Democracy Initiative is awarding \$10,000 in one-time funding. There is no matching funds requirement. The funds will be appropriated in the Grants and Donations Fund.

# **Additional Information:**

The National League of Cities' Local Democracy Initiative awarded Wake County a onetime \$10,000 grant to increase the census count among historically undercounted and hard-to-count (HTC) communities, and support the human and financial investments already made with the infrastructure built for the 2020 Census by a prior \$5,000 grant award

Generally, this initiative's objective is to support continued 2020 Census get-out-the-count (GOTC) outreach work, and commitment to permanent, year-round civic engagement activities.

More specifically the grant will be used to:

1. Extend the relevance and role of the census in communities beyond the count.

2. Support work on civic engagement like voter participation and volunteerism by repurposing your census partnerships, lessons learned, best practices, and even additional headcount or hardware like tablets and kiosks.

Wake County's project proposal primarily focuses on eastern Wake County residents and community partners servicing two census tracts that are part municipal and part unincorporated. The current 2020 census response rates for the tracts of interest are 50-56%. These tracts' 2020 rates lag those of 2010 by 15 percentage points.

The funds will be used to inform and engage each household, business, educational and civic organization in the Riley Hill and Hopkins community, both in rural eastern Wake County. Staff will use tools like newsletters, social media, and virtual community meetings to engage and inform residents of upcoming opportunities to participate in community initiatives that impact this area. Examples of initiatives include GoWake Access micro-transit pilot service; PLANWake; and municipal and regional comprehensive plans for Wendell, Zebulon and CAMPO.

- 2. Authorizes the County Manager to execute a grant agreement with the Center for Tech and Civic Life, subject to terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

# Item Summary:

- Purpose: In accordance with the North Carolina Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act, the Board of Commissioners must approve all amendments that increase the budget for a fund.
- Background: As with many other urban areas responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, Wake County faces challenges carrying out a number of mandated services in a safe and effective manner, including the November 2020 general election. Earlier this summer, the County appropriated approximately \$885,000 to support the anticipated additional costs associated with conducting the 2020 general election. The Board of Commissioners has also supported the elections process through increased hourly wages for workers and other policy changes. This additional grant from the Center for Tech and Civic Life will help the County cover costs associated with additional staffing, PPE, cleaning, and facility modifications.
- Board Goal: This action supports mandated County services, to fund costs associated with elections.
- Fiscal Impact: This agreement provides up to \$1,000,000 to support staffing and other additional costs associated with carrying out mandated elections services. There are no matching funds requirement. The funds will be appropriated in the Grants and Donations Fund.

# Additional Information:

For the general election, the number of total registered voters is approximately 765,000 (as of August 1, 2020), casting ballots split between the modes of voting.

The County anticipates absentee-by-mail turnout to be somewhere around 306,000 (or up to 40% of registered voters). Automation will be critical to efficiently and accurately manage ballot envelopes and ballots in the weeks leading up to Election Day and in the canvassing process afterwards.

To promote absentee by mail and early voting ahead of the November election, the NC State Board of Elections is planning a mailing to every North Carolina household in late September. As with any election, the Wake County Board of Elections works with the County's Communications Department to provide uniform communications to the entire community throughout the voting period.

Wake County plans to have 20 full-time early voting locations. These will be sufficiently staffed to limit worker turnover, handle a surge in voters before polls open, and manage sites in a pandemic environment.

Wake County is committed to working to ensure polling places are fully staffed on election day. In the General Election on November 3, we are planning to have approximately 206 in-person polling locations that will be staffed with approximately 2,400 poll workers.

Earlier this summer, the County appropriated approximately \$885,000 in funding from state Emergency Management Performance Grants and the County's allocation of Help America Vote Act funds to support anticipated additional costs associated with conducting the 2020 general election. Since that time, the State Board of Elections has notified local boards of elections of other grant opportunities, including the grant considered in this agenda item.

These grant funds will help the County cover costs associated with additional staffing, PPE, cleaning, and facility modifications.

# Item Title: Agreement for Wake County's Operational Support of Receipt of the Strategic National Stockpile

# **Specific Action Requested:**

That the Board of Commissioners authorizes the County Manager to sign the multiyear Contract between Wake County and North Carolina Public Health in support of Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) operations.

# Item Summary:

Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves multi-year agreements.

Background: Wake County participates in many federally sponsored emergency planning activities. In the early 2000's, Wake County, as a Metropolitian Medical Response System jurisdiction, was required to develop operational plans for direct receipt of the National Pharmaceutical Stockpile (NPS). The NPS is a mobile stockpile of pharmaceuticals and medical supplies applicable to a wide range of disasters and emergencies. In 2006, the US Public Health Service changed their operational approach to send the NPS only to State agences, who then distribute the supplies and drugs to localities across the State. This change requires states and localities to update their operating agreements. This action authorizes the County Manager to execute a new 5-year agreement outlining the responsibilities of both parties regarding receipt, staging and storage of materials.

Board Goal: None.

Fiscal Impact: This item has no immediate financial impact. Should an emergency event occur, the County would receive reimbursement from the State for any costs.

# Additional Information:

As Wake County had already developed a plan, and was co-located with the State Capital and NC Public Health offices, the State asked if they could adopt Wake County's plan with modifications to reflect primary responsibilities lying with the State. Since 2008, Wake County and NC Public Health have been cooperatively operating the Receipt, Staging & Storage (RSS) site within Wake County. This partnership proved effective and beneficial during the H1N1 Outbreak in 2009 and more recently, during the ongoing COVID-19 response.

This robust partnership also includes participation from the US Marshal's Service, Raleigh Police Department, Wake County Sheriff's Office, Wake County Public School System, Wake County Public Health, NC Highway Patrol, North Carolina National Guard, NC Office of EMS, NC Emergency Management and Wake County based fire departments. This Agreement is for a 5-year term expiring June 30, 2025.

No funding is provided up front to Wake County. All equipment, planning and material training costs are paid for directly by NC Public Health. All maintenance, repairs and damage are paid directly by NC Public Health. However, whether a State of Emergency is declared or not, Mutual Aid Agreements are in place with the State of North Carolina that permit the reimbursement of personnel, supplies and material costs incurred by the County. The Contract specifically states that under non-emergency conditions, such as exercises, State PH shall amend the contract to cover personnel and related costs to the County.

Item Title: Approval of 6<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Tri-Party Agreement Regarding PNC Arena

# Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners approves the 6<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Tri-Party Agreement with Centennial Authority and the City of Raleigh regarding PNC Arena, subject to the terms and conditions acceptable to the County Attorney.

# Item Summary:

- Purpose: The Board receives and appropriates all revenues and expenditures.
- Background: In 1997, the City of Raleigh, Wake County and the Centennial Authority entered a Tri-Party Agreement regarding the construction and operation of PNC Arena. Since that time, the five amendments to the Tri-Party Agreement have been approved to allocate additional funding, address operational needs and provide for the long-term success of the facility. The 21st Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement regarding Room Occupancy and Prepared Food and Beverage Taxes approved by the City of Raleigh and Wake County committed an additional \$9 million annually for the ongoing support of PNC Arena to allow it to host major events that generate significant economic impact for our region. The 6<sup>th</sup> Amendment will address the terms of that funding and other minor changes to improve operational flexibility for the facility.
- Board Goal: This action supports routine County business.
- Fiscal Impact: The \$9 million for PNC Arena in FY 2021 was included in the FY 2021 Adopted Budget. Future allocations are incorporated into the Major Facilities Fund Cash Flow Model.

# Additional Information:

The 21<sup>st</sup> Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement regarding Room Occupancy and Prepared Food and Beverage Taxes approved by the City of Raleigh and Wake County committed \$9 million annually for the ongoing support of PNC Arena to allow it to host major events that generate significant economic impact for our region. The Centennial Authority has reached a preliminary agreement with the Carolina Hurricanes on a five-year lease extension through the 2028-29 season. The lease extension term sheet is predicated on the \$9 million allocation through 2029. In the 22<sup>nd</sup> Amendment, it was identified that the funding committed for the period after the lease extension, 2030 through 2045, will be reserved for future sports/entertainment facility capacity to provide the opportunity for the community to determine a long-term plan on an arena solution.

The City of Raleigh, Wake County and the Centennial Authority have a Tri-Party Agreement and 5 Amendments in place that govern the use of hospitality tax funds that

support the arena. To utilize the \$9 million committed above, the parties have worked to develop the terms of the 6<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Tri-Party Agreement. The Board received a presentation on the proposed use of the funds and next steps at the September 14 Board Work Session.

Key terms of the agreement include:

- Establish use, term and timing of \$9M allocation for 2020 2029
- Establish joint review of facility, leases, etc. to determine path forward beyond 2029
- Amend payment timing for existing 7% administrative allocation to support cash flow
- Clarify sponsorship revenue language from prior agreements

The Centennial Authority has approved the agreement. The City of Raleigh will vote on the agreement at their October 6 meeting.

## WAKE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PROCLAMATION Recognizing October 2020 as Domestic Violence Awareness Month

**WHEREAS**, domestic violence is a pattern of intentionally violent and/or controlling behavior to gain power or control over a family member or fating/intimate partner that violates an individual's privacy, dignity, security, and humanity; and

**WHEREAS**, according to the Center for Disease Control, 1 in 4 women and nearly 1 in 10 men in the United States have experienced contact sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner during their lifetime; and

**WHEREAS**, domestic violence spans gender, age, sexual orientation, and religion, and affects people of all socioeconomic backgrounds and education levels; and

**WHEREAS**, some of the biggest victims of domestic violence are the smallest, with approximately 22 million children exposed to domestic violence every year, 90% of which are eyewitnesses to the violence; and

WHEREAS, this year's COVID-19 pandemic has led to a significant increase in domestic violence cases around the world, as a result of movement restrictions and quarantines. Isolation is a major risk factor in domestic violence and COVID-19 has increased isolation both physically and socially for so many people. This, coupled with other external factors such as stress and financial strain have contributed to making violence in homes more frequent, more severe and more dangerous; and

**WHEREAS**, healthy families are indispensable to a stable community, and they should be a place of support to instill responsibility and values in the next generation; and

**WHEREAS**, domestic violence is a serious public health and safety concern, requiring a coordinated community response of partnerships that must be formed among criminal and civil justice agencies, healthcare providers, allied professionals, and victim service providers;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Wake County Board of Commissioners does hereby proclaim October 2020, as **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH** and urges the residents of our community, and communities across the country, to work together to break the cycle of violence in our community to rebuild lives and help secure safer futures for the victims of these types of violence.

#### Item Summary:

- Purpose: The Board of Commissioners approves all tax relief actions requested by taxpayers. On a monthly basis, the Tax Committee meets to consider taxpayer requests and makes recommendations to the Board.
- Background: If a taxpayer believes they have been billed incorrectly, wish to appeal a decision of the Tax Administration, seek relief of penalties or submit a late request for exemption, exclusion or deferment, they can request a hearing before the Tax Committee.

The Tax Committee meets monthly and makes recommendations to the Board of Commissioners. The Board approves all tax relief actions. The Tax Committee meets on the third Thursday of each month at 1 p.m. in the Tax Administration's Conference Room to review requests and make a recommendation to the Board of Commissioners. This meeting is publicized and open to the public.

The Tax Committee presents information to the Wake County Board of Commissioners each month for review, showing the name of the taxpayer, description of property, account number, tax year, relief sought, and recommended action.

- Board Goal: This item supports routine business of the County as required by North Carolina General Statutes and does not relate to a specific Board initiative.
- Fiscal Impact: The fiscal impact of this item varies from month to month based on requests but is generally negligible as a percent of the total County budget.

#### Additional Information:

The Tax Committee is comprised of Kim Lorbacher, Financial Services Manager with Wake County Finance; Natasha Baldwin, Finance Manager with the City of Raleigh and Jessica Murphy-Rhem, Accounting Supervisor with the Town of Cary. Marcus Kinrade, Wake County Tax Administrator, serves as the clerk to the Tax Committee.

Some reasons a property owner may request a hearing before the Tax Committee are:

- They were penalized for listing personal property after January 31.
- They take exception to the value placed on their property and received notice of the value after the Board of Equalization and Review adjourned.
- Their personal property listing was audited and they are seeking relief of discovered value or applicable penalties.
- They filed a late application for an exemption, exclusion or deferment on a property.
- An application for exemption, exclusion or deferment was denied by the Tax Administration and the wish to appeal that decision.
- A penalty was imposed for the late filing or late payment of a gross receipt tax and penalty relief is requested.
- A refund has been requested for a tax imposed through a clerical error, an illegal tax, or a tax levied for an illegal purpose.
- A refund exceeding the threshold the finance officer is authorized to issue has been requested.

The tax committee has adopted criteria that may provide partial or full relief of late list penalties applied to personal property discoveries if one of the following criteria is met:

- 1. The property owner is new to North Carolina.
- 2. The property owner inadvertently neglected to list equipment in the first year of ownership.
- 3. Prior year property listings were timely filed.
- 4. Items were inadvertently omitted from a listing filed timely.
- 5. The property owner was on military deployment or medically incapacitated.
- 6. The property owner self-reported assets that were not listed properly in prior years.
- 7. The property owner was cooperative with an audit and no property tax was lost due to being beyond the five-year audit period.

The Tax Committee follows the North Carolina General Statutes or previously established general guidelines in their recommendations of relief for assessed late list penalties (no relief, partial relief, full relief). The committee also considers late filed exemption and exclusion applications, and makes recommendations regarding requests for relief of interest.

Consideration of relief of late list penalties:

- If a taxpayer is new to North Carolina and fails to list the first year required, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has property that should have been listed and is unaware of the tax laws, he may be granted one-time relief for late list penalties, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer has listed timely in at least two consecutive years immediately prior to the year for which a penalty is assessed, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer inadvertently omitted items from his timely listing, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was involved in military deployment and was unable to list timely, the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- If a taxpayer was unable to list due to circumstances beyond their control (e.g. hospitalization), the penalty may be relieved, partially or in full.
- Guidelines have been established for companies with penalties assessed as a result of audits. Relief may be granted partially or in full if it appears there was no willful attempt to understate value, if the taxpayer was cooperative and forthright during the audit and if there were no significant issues with their previous listings. The recommendation of the auditor is carefully considered in making this determination.

## Consideration of late-filed applications for exemption or exclusion:

- The tax committee will recommend approval of late filed exemptions or exclusions as long as the request complies with the general statutes, or if case law exists that is clear and generally supports the request. Late filed applications must be hand-delivered by December 31 or postmarked by December 31 of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested.
- The tax committee will recommend denying any applications received after December 31<sup>st</sup> of the calendar year for which the exemption or exclusion is requested. There is no statutory authority to exempt or exclude property if the application is made outside the calendar year for which the exemption is sought.

#### Consideration of requests for relief of interest:

 Once interest accrues, it is considered tax per NCGS 105-273(15). Tax cannot be compromised per NCGS 105-380. Therefore the tax committee typically recommends denial of requests for relief of interest. Should a situation arise in which the committee determines that interest should be relieved, the Assessor will request the item be removed from the consent agenda and considered separately by the Board of Commissioners.
