<u>Item Title:</u> Wake County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Annual Plan and Certification for FY 2016-17

Specific Action Requested:

That the Board of Commissioners adopts the Wake County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Annual Plan for FY 2016-2017 and affix signatures on appropriate forms.

Item Summary:

Juvenile Crime Prevention Council funds are made available to Wake County from the North Carolina Department of Public Safety (DPS) Division of Juvenile Justice to provide community-based delinquency and gang prevention strategies and programs. North Carolina General Statute 143B-845 sets the intent and responsibilities for Juvenile Crime Prevention Councils and requires planning efforts that include representation from local government, local public and private agencies serving juveniles and their families, local business leaders, citizens with an interest in youth problems, and youth representatives. DPS funds are used to provide services such as skill building programs for youth suspended from school, afterschool and weekend life-skills programs, literacy programs, emergency residential placement, restitution and community service programming, and parenting programs.

The Department of Public Safety requires each county to prepare an annual plan before releasing the county's allocation of DPS funds. The annual plan is prepared by the local Juvenile Crime Prevention Council and includes results from its needs assessment and resource assessment, priorities for funding and funding recommendations.

After considering the risk & needs assessment of Wake County youth and a resource assessment in the county, the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council identified the need for the development and strengthening of effective and accessible services for youth who may have been exposed to trauma or may be serious or violent offenders, including but not limited to services for gang involved youth. As a result, the Council prioritized the following risk and protective factors to be addressed by programs in the 2016-2017 Request for Proposals:

For FY 2016-17, Wake County will receive \$1,171,637 in state funds from the NC DPS. The local match requirement (30%) has been identified by each program as well as by the Human Services Department. Both the matching funds and state revenues are included in the FY 17 budget. The following programs have been recommended for funding for FY 2016-2017:
