Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)

- Housing and County Manager staff:
 - o Created a funding "roadmap" to assist agencies in understanding available resources
 - Held a Supportive Housing Services & Coordination Provider Training for more than 60 Providers and Developers
 - $\circ~$ Held a PSH TA session with CSH for Providers, Developers and Hospitals to prepare for RFP release in the fall
 - Held a Community Engagement Session to seek community feedback and support for the RFP
 - o Released an RFP for a PSH Pilot project and is currently deliberating on next steps
