Background

CRF Funding Plan Framework

On May 18, staff presented a funding plan framework for utilization of County's \$194 million in Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF)

- 1. Public Health Emergency Response
- 2. Community Response & Resiliency
- 3. Continuity of Operations
- 4. Economic Recovery
- 5. Miscellaneous

Board approved an appropriation of \$62.7 million of the CRF, based on estimated expenses incurred through June 30, 2020

Funding & Program Updates

Public Health Emergency Response

EOC Operations & Testing Plan

Continued 7 day/week operations

- Scheduling of staff, call center, and contact tracers
- Purchase of PPE and other medical supplies
- Manage logistical and planning issues

Began mass testing across the County on June 1

- Through June 11 2,000 individuals tested
- Training and utilization of County staff

Estimated cost through June 30 = \$17.2 million

Ambulance Purchase

Due to the increased down time of ambulances for thorough sanitizing, County has ordered 5 additional ambulances using CRF funding

• Cost = \$1.6 million

Community Response & Resiliency

Food Security

Support WCPSS efforts to serve children and leverage partnerships to support service gaps for other vulnerable populations

Results through 6/5:

- 1.7 million meals distributed
- 20,000 shelf stable or produce boxes
- 184 sites County-wide

Estimated cost through August = \$556,000

Community Response & Resiliency

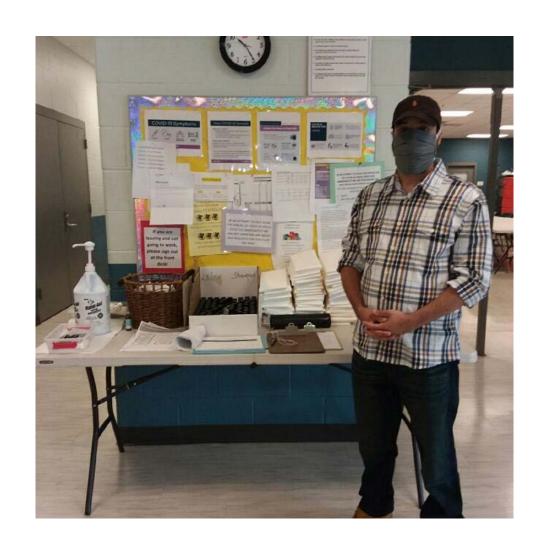
Housing & Support Services

Partnered with 13 community agencies to provide housing and related services

Services include:

- "One number" coordinated intake
- Rental assistance
- Temporary housing and case management at three hotels
- Increased shelter capacity

Estimated cost = \$5.75 million



Community Response & Resiliency

Utility Assistance Program

Payment assistance program for moderate-to-low income households impacted by COVID-19

Coordinating with water/sewer utility providers and Human Services

Planning program launch early in FY 2021

Would allow for coverage of delinquent payments that began in March 2020

PPE Distribution Pilot

Coordinating with WakeMed and City of Raleigh

Pilot distribution of face masks in SE Raleigh (but open to anyone in Wake County)

Include testing/medical information

Analyze results of pilot and determine more distribution dates and sites across County

Economic Recovery



Wake County Summary (as of 5/28/2020):

- 973 applications totaling \$32 million
- 33 loans approved totaling \$10.3 million
- Average loan = \$33,000
- Estimated 308 jobs retained
- Data includes loans through NC Rapid Recovery program

Other Economic Recovery initiatives in progress Include:

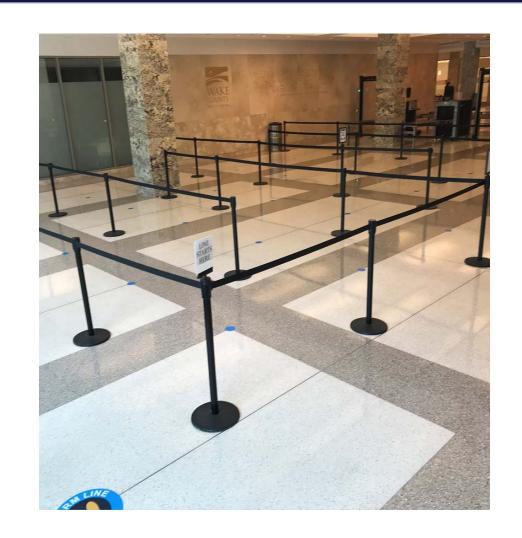
- In conversation with Wake Tech about job training programs and other needs
- Still seeking guidance on how funds may be used toward tourism efforts

Continuity of Operations

Efforts to date include:

- Hazard pay for County employees, non-profit firefighters
- Facility cleanings and modifications
- Increased cleaning for transit services
- Issued guidance to municipalities on how to get reimbursement from County for similar activities

Estimated FY 2020 costs = \$7.7 million



Continuity of Operations

WCPSS Request:

- \$45 million to conduct remote learning
- Acquire student devices, internet access, and academic content licensing
- \$14.1 million spent in 2020 School Year, using CIP funds

County Recommendation:

- Use \$14.1 million of already-appropriated CRF to reimburse WCPSS capital program
- Hold remainder of request for future determination

Summary

- County's primary responsibility is to ensure public health response is met and funded with CRF
- County also desires to support:
 - Populations impacted by COVID-19
 - Economic recovery throughout County
 - Continuity of operations for the County and its partners
 - Restoring lost revenues, if legislation for the CARES Act changes
- Providing \$14.1 million to WCPSS now allows us to support their efforts while providing additional time for County to evaluate all needs

Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF)

Wake County received approximately \$194 million in Coronavirus Relief Funds (CRF) from the federal CARES Act

- Necessary expenditures due to the public health emergency with respect to COVID-19;
- Expenditures not accounted for in the budget most recently approved as of the date of enactment; and
- Were incurred during the period beginning March 1 and ends on December 30, 2020.
- Includes expenses to "directly respond to the emergency" AND "second-order effects" including "economic support to those suffering from employment or business disruption..."

WAKE COUNTY

CRF Considerations

The State directed recipients to exhaust CRF prior to applying to FEMA (except where any direct appropriations were received); Wake municipalities should first apply to FEMA for FEMA-eligible expenses

Guidance is released frequently to clarify language in the CARES Act; not all potential uses have been verified as eligible

County continues to advocate CRF be allowed to offset revenue losses caused by COVID-19 economic downturn, *not currently eligible*

County anticipates high level of scrutiny over funding decisions, eligibility of expenses, and recordkeeping
