FY2022 Budget does not include a General Fund property tax increase

\$0.60

Per \$100 of property value will remain our rate

First budget allocation was to debt and capital needs

Set aside funds to pay for debt on high-dollar investments and capital projects



Must be prepared for the current pandemic and future public health needs

14 new positions

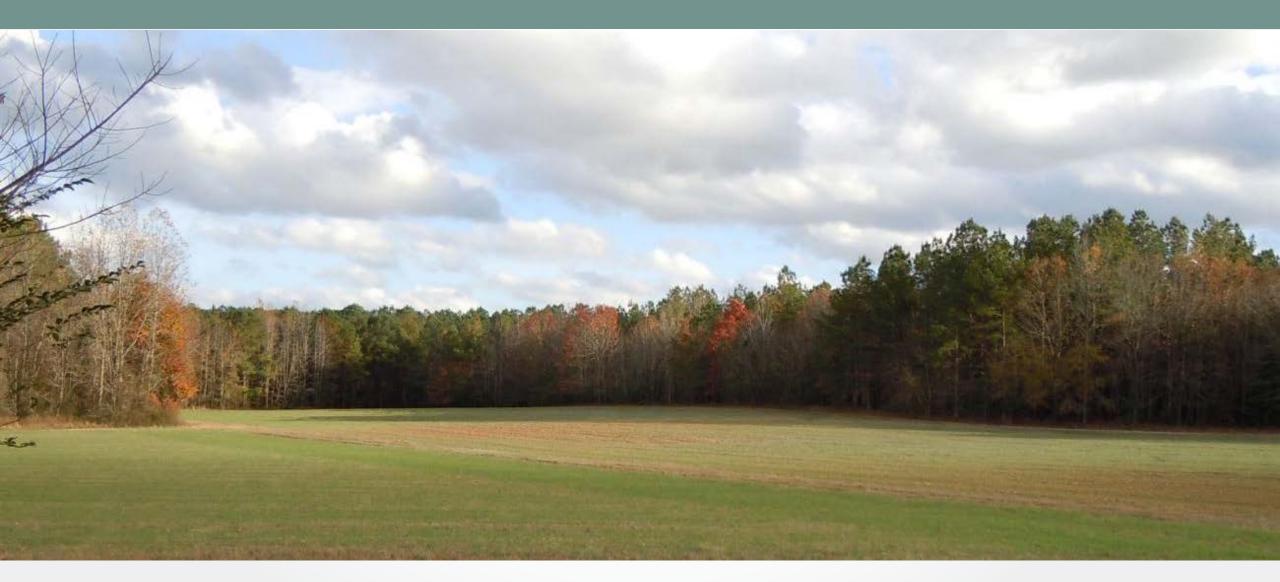

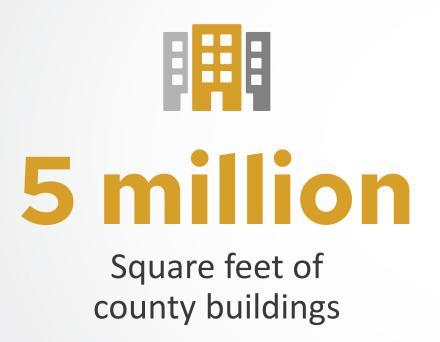

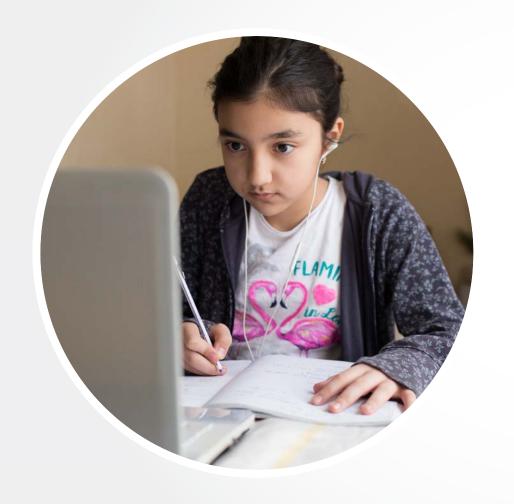
