ARPA Funding Recap

- County to receive ~\$216 million
 - Distributed in two tranches, with 50% being delivered in May 2021, and remainder delivered one year later
- General Purposes for This Funding:
 OVID-19 response and addressing its economic effects
 - Providing government services affected by a revenue reduction from the pandemic
 - o Water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure
- Deadline to Spend CRF Dollars: December 31, 2024
 Can encumber by this deadline and have two additional years to spend

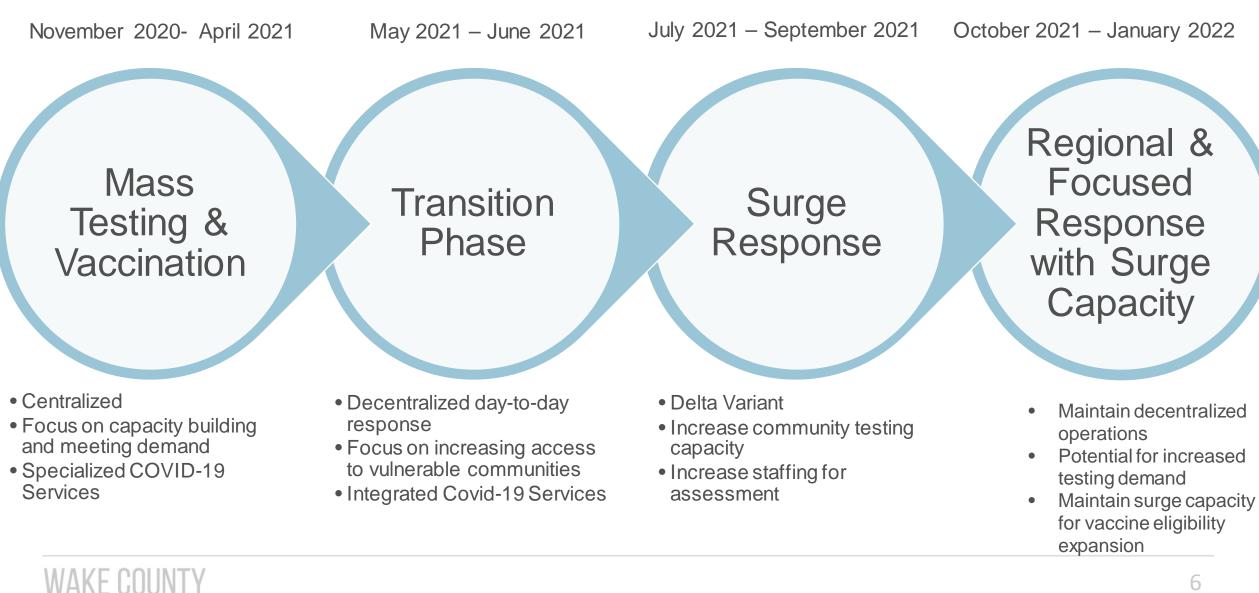
ARPA Funding Process Recap

- May/June 2021: BOC appropriated \$52.7 million to cover:
 - o \$42.1 million for Public Health and County support services
 - o \$4.9 million to close out Wake Forward small business loans
 - \$1.1 million to Food Security efforts
 - \$.5 million for broadband study (postponed)
 - o \$4.1 million for hospitality recovery and support
- Summer/early Fall 2021: Department project requests process
- Fall/Winter (2021-2022): Community engagement and community funding process

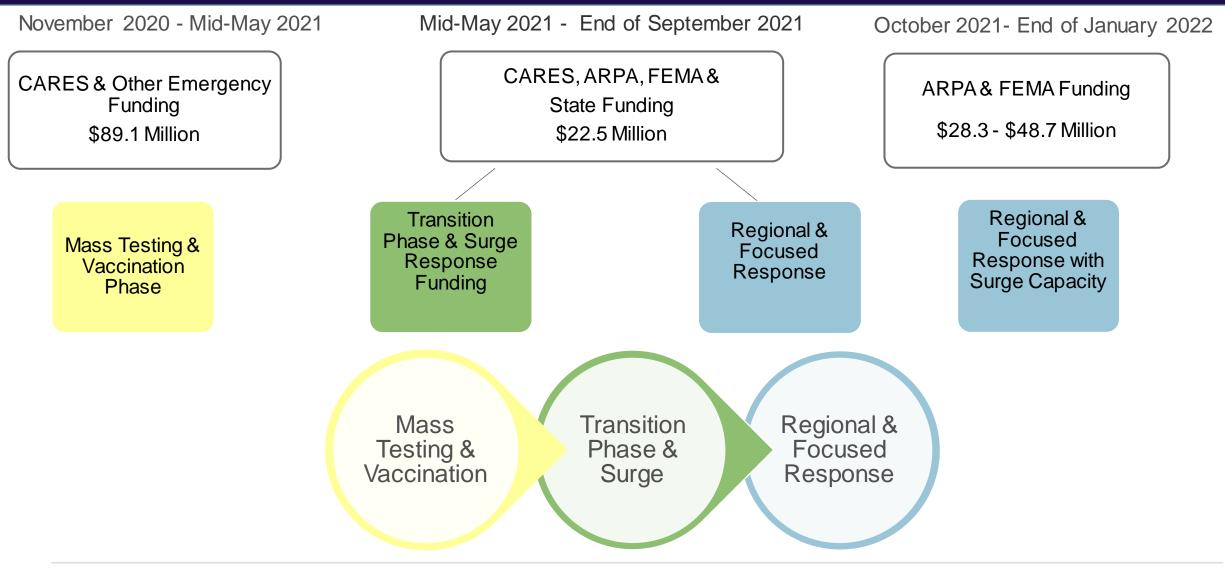
Public Health Response & Funding Update

County Operations & Needs Assessment

County's priority with ARPA is County functions

Understand operational and capital needs and how APRA can be used to:

- Fund continued or concluding COVID-19 emergency response operations
- Address systemic community issues through improved service delivery
- Address how COVID-19 has changed the way the County operates
- Plan and prepare for future events that cause disruptions in normal service

Based on these principles shared with the Board in April, departments asked to submit projects and programs for ARPA funding consideration

Departments submitted 110 projects totaling \$236 million

Assessment

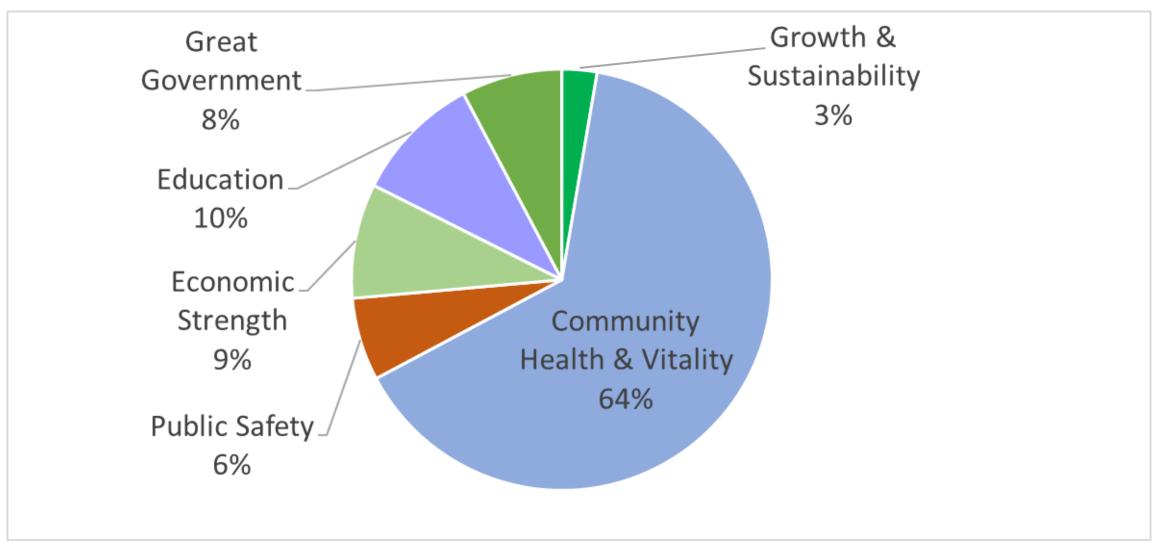
After the initial review for ARPA eligibility, team from CMO and Budget reviewed **55** *projects* on the following criteria:

Alignment with Board Goals	Mitigate Community, Service or Economic Impacts from Pandemic
Enhance Department Ability to Provide Services	Support Diversity, Equity & Inclusion
Creates a Future/Ongoing County Expenditures	Leverages Other Funding Sources
Support Capacity for Future County Disruptions	Affect a HUD Designated Qualified Census Tract
Have Evidence-Based Data/Need	Have Pre-Pandemic Data

Social Determinant of Health Network

Highlights

- Provides comprehensive, person-centered approach to address the social barriers that negatively impact health in targeted census tracts
- Conduct two-year pilot to align funding for services addressing social determinants of health with Medicaid model being piloted at the State level
- Positions participating community-based organizations to align with Medicaid funded services following the conclusion of the statewide pilot 2024/2025
- Builds capacity and interconnectedness of community-based organizations
- Population supported with this program includes uninsured, Medicaid, Medicare individuals in qualifying census tracts
- Launch workgroup in Summer 2022 to initiate program in FY2023

Transportation to appointments

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- Duke Health serve as backbone organization
 - Operated a smaller but similar program during pandemic
 - Provide organizational support and technical assistance to communitybased organizations
 - $\circ\,$ Qualify referrals and track outcomes
 - o Authorize services
 - Provide invoice and payment to community-based organizations
 - o Establish monitoring, evaluation tools and system metrics



Work Session Follow Up HACR – Increased Homeless Services



A Two-Fold Approach

Addressing the deficit in emergency shelter due to COVID-19 will require a two-fold approach:

1. Increasing Emergency Shelter Capacity: This funding will allow current shelter and non-shelter homeless service providers to offer re-housing assistance by reimbursing costs associated with the use of hotel units as individual temporary shelters

AND

2. Reducing a Client's Length of Stay in Homelessness: This funding will support agencies to fill critical programmatic gaps, providing a more robust service array. This will ensure that clients have access to in-depth wrap-around services and light touch financial assistance to exit homeless more quickly. This Rapid-Exit Approach reduces the length of time a resident experiences homelessness, increasing bed-turnover rate so more individuals and families are served annually



Eligible Services Include:

- **1. Comprehensive Case Management**
- 2. Flexible Financial Assistance
- 3. Access to Benefits
- 4. Transportation
- 5. Health Care Connections
- 6. Housing Navigation
- 7. Permanent Home Furnishing

Service Provider Eligibility

- Interested agencies are required to align services with a Low-Barrier Shelter Model using:
 - Housing First
 - Safe Appropriate Homelessness Diversion
 - Immediate & Low-Barrier Access
 - Housing-Focused, Rapid Exit Service
 - Data to Measure Performance



Community Engagement & Community Funding Process



Community Engagement

County Survey

- Will engage County residents to identify their funding priorities
- Survey will launch October 18
- Results will be shared with BOC to help inform upcoming funding decisions
- Work with WCED and existing faithbased networks to reach underserved communities

Multi-Jurisdictional

- Staff will participate in and collect survey data from municipal community engagement
- Feedback gathered at municipal level will be consolidated with survey data
- Some municipalities awaiting final guidance prior to initiating/continuing community engagement

Community Funding Process

- Application period will open October 25 November 30
- Short application:
 - o Project description, amount requested, and projected timing of use
 - o Choose Board goal(s) in alignment with project alignment
 - Choose how project mitigates COVID-19 impacts or improves service
 - o Choose how project aligns with priorities of ARPA funding
 - Preference toward one-time projects
 - o Must be able to track and report demographic data and measure outcomes
- Staff will review applications and bring forward recommendations for Board consideration in January 2022

Community Funding Available

Staff recommends allocating \$20 million to this process:

- \$16 million for general community projects
- \$4 million equity fund targeted to projects in HUD-designated Qualified Census Tracts or historically underserved areas

Depending on the number of applications received, during review and recommendation, staff may suggest the following:

- Maximum funding amounts
- Cost-share percentages
- Phased funding approach
- Awarding less than the \$20 million available

 - o County receives community feedback and community funding requests
 - o Community funding requests are reviewed and presented to BOC for consideration
- Ongoing:
 - o Continue to monitor US Treasury guidance and present future updates
 - o Review County's major CIP programs for potential use of ARPA funding
 - Departments to provide specific project updates, as requested by BOC
